

He had been an inactive partner, and there was considerable doubt that he had had knowledge of his active partner's violation of the law, In sentencing him, the judge was quite lenient, and following the jurist's lead, the prison authorities were giving him preferred treatment. I read in the papers some three months later that the Governor of the state had granted him a complete pardon.

'Yes, the warden and the other officers here are most kind to me,' he said.
