Little by little, however, more and more people are coming to realize that the pledge actually is nothing but a scheme, a political trick which, if taken seriously, is a violation of the citizen's right to vote as he pleases. By the standards of common sense as well as the American constitution, the pledge has no right to a place on the primary ballot.

Burglars Break Into 5 Muenster **Business Houses**

Five Muenster business houses were burglarized Monday night, or Tuesday morning, in the big-After the business session and gest and most efficient crime installation of newly elected wave in the history of the community. Total losses in cash, other items and property damage amounted to several hundred dollars.

In the opinion of officers who investigated the five places, all jobs were handled by the same person or persons. Signs were ence with the Holy Father, his the same at each place: entry window, safe broken into, complete absence of finger prints, cash taken but checks left scattered about.

Places burglarized were Jimmy's Station, Fisher's Market, Endres Motor Co., Ben Seyler Motor Co. and J. B. Wilde Garage. Notified immediately after the first discovery Sheriff Emory Horn and Ranger Louis Rigler rushed out to investigate and learned a short time later that they had five investigations on their hands. Efforts to take fingerprints revealed that gloves had been worn on all the jobs. However the officers found other clues which they declined to reveal.

At Jimmy's Station the yeggs knocked the knob off the safe but in doing so jammed the locking bolts and failed to get inside. Their haul there amounted to several dollars in nickles from the cash register and two highly prized war souvenirs with a cash value of about \$100.

So far as J. W. and John Fisher were able to determine the burglars drew a complete blank at their store. There again they beat off the dial knob but jammed the lock. The cash register had been left empty.

At Endres Motor and Ben Seyler the culprits had better luck. They successfully beat off the dial and manipulated the bolts at Endres for a cash haul of \$108. And they used a torch to remove the door from a small cabinet safe at Seyler's for a cash haul at almost \$250.

Wilde's safe was open but had no money. For years he has used it only as a fireproof place





However, for the Federal government to be undertaking to teach its citizens thrift, sound budgeting, money management and wise spending in this week's mail an imposing cannot, under present circumstances, be taken without a grin; eral government. How To Spend Wisely?

The government's "Lessons in Arithmetic," an excellent thrift text, says: "No matter how well he learns reading, writing and arithmetic, a child will never be able to look out for himself properly unless he also learns its reading list the following several million dollars a day is how to spend wisely, how to save and what to save for." From a digest of the Hoover Commission Report: "Government hospital construction costs from \$30,000 to \$51,000 per bed, compared with \$16,000 per bed in privately constructed hospitals . . . and though there are 100,000 empty Government hospital beds, the Government is building new hospitals with 38,000 additional beds." 

That didn't mean people should not be concerned, the doctor commented, for a case of illness in any form is good reason for great concern.

"I'm talking about the fear that keeps a person or a whole community from thinking strapolio is an individual tragedy for the family involved, but is not justified."

"Every clear-thinking effort must be made to keep every vacation camp consistently clean and sanitary. Briefly, elimination of fly and insect breeding places, personal cleanliness, and getting milk, water and food from safe, approved sources will aid in preventing a number of communicable diseases.' National statistics, Dr. Cox as-

serted, show good reason for optimism in most cases of polio. According to the figures, from 40 to 60 per cent of all victims recover completely and can do anything they choose.

From 25 to 40 percent recover with minor disability, and can, within very wide limits, lead perfectly normal lives. From 15 to 20 per cent are more severely handicapped, and 5 to 10 per cent terminate fatally. First Year of New School Law Brings 1920 Consolidations

AUSTIN Texas, - Consolida tion of 1,920 school districts the first year Texas' new education laws were in effect has resulted in larger school units and a better school program, J. W. Edgar, state commissioner of education declared here today.

Consolidations have made possible better building equipment and facilities, teachers giving instruction in fewer subjects and a vastly broadened program of vocational agriculture, trades and industries, and home economic instruction which means better schools for Texas children, Edgar pointed out.

The total number of school districts dropped from 4,412 in 1948-49 to 2,492 operating districts during the last school year. A total of 1,300 of these consolidations were mandatory under new school laws.

"Six hundred and twenty school districts, however, voluntarily merged with other districts," Edgar said.

In addition, the total number of county unit systems (one school system for an entire county) doubled, making the total twenty-four.

Edgar also predicted that consolidations for the 1950-51 school year would total an additional 400, bringing the total number in the state down to approximately 2.000.

Most of the smaller schools in Feet in Eight Hours the state could not afford adequate library and laboratory facilities, or equipment and teachers for vocational agriculture, trades and industries, and home economic courses, Edgar pointed out.

"While there has been commendable increases in library, visual aid and laboratory facilities, there has been a tremendous expansion in the vocational dapartments," Dr. Edgar said.

From studies made on test wells, Humble drillers and engineers discovered that the nozzle velocity of the drilling mud passing through the bit as it digs into the earth has a great effect on the drilling rate. New jet-type bits were designed to make the most of the high-fluid velocities, and drilling rates were more than quadrupled. No new equipment was needed.

Humble production men attribute a large part of the increased drilling rates to the precision teamwork of skilled drilling crews, the article points out. The crew of Rig 28, which set the record, is a typical crew that happened to set the record during the normal course of their work. While setting the record they drilled 30 feet and made a drill pipe connection every five minutes-jobs that require splitecond timing.
