

## VFW Launches Big **Project For City** Park Improvement

Enthusiastic response this week resulted from a proposal by the Muenster VFW Chapter to take charge of a big improvement project at the city park.

The city council in its regular meeting Monday gave the program a flying start by contributing \$300 to the cause, and solicitations around town up to Wednesday afternoon netted \$156

Added to the \$100 originally offered by the VFW the fund on Wednesday was \$556, and more was in sight.

The VFW has gone all out to make the park improvement and maintenance job its number one community betterment project. Besides raising the cash it is soliciting labor and materials and free use of machinery.

Steve Fette, Gilbert Endres and Otto Brothers have offered bull dozers for ground leveling work. The soil conservation work unit will assist with grass sprig planting. And many individuals have offered their help in other kinds of improvement work. Others have offered pipe and other materials.

Pipe is the one item specifically requested by Project Chairman Doyle Hood. He says that the plan is to make wooden top tables with pipe legs anchored in concrete. It is hoped this type of construction will be sturdy enough to withstand high waters which sometimes flood the park area. Pipe will also be used for other equipment.



#### Strict Sanitation Is Only Defense Against Impetigo

AUSTIN, - When a state health authority says there is no such thing as a natural resistance to impetigo, parents of what he means. Those parents know, perhaps from bitter experience, that the same individual can suffer repeated attacks from what State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox calls an "offensive, annoying skin infection."

Although children are unusually susceptible, impetigo can

Impetigo, according to Dr. Cox's explanation, is a purulent invasion of a hospital nursery grow old gracefully. ward calls for extreme attention to keep uninfected babies from getting it, for it spreads like fire in dry grass.

Impetigo is caused by a pus forming bacteria called staphylococcus-the same sort of germ found in boils and sores where pus is present. Usually it forms an unsightly crust over wide areas of the body. The pus underneath the crust is highly infectious if allowed to get on any other skin surface.

The infection is easily transmitted when a non-infected person uses the towel of someone infected, since the towel moisture permits the germ to survive,

Children living in the most hygienic homes frequently get impetigo, although it is perhaps more common among children living in homes where personal sanitation isn't considered too important.

#### The American Way Time to Clean House

Toward the end of the 19th Century a most deplorable condition had developed in this country. Certain powerful capitalists, comprising but a small minority of the nation's businessmen, were operating their corporations solely for their own greedy gain, against the best interests of the American people as a whole.

They oppressed workers by using force; they forced smaller competitors out of business; they bought votes with the money entrusted to them by investors; they shamelessly corrupted state legislatures; and even wrought their evil influence on the Federal Congress.

As a remedy for these evils, the Socialists proposed the abolition of private property; the production-for-use, instead of profit. Fortunately, there were in this country citizens who knew the fallacy of Socialism, who realized that concentrating all wealth in the hands of a few government bureaucrats would be jumping from the frying pan into the fire, would merely intensify the abuses.

So these astute Liberals chose to correct the abuses which had

Prohibition of political campaign contributions by corporations, and mandatory publication of all corporations receipts and expenditures brought to an end the secret, illegitimate use of corporate funds. The unionization of labor gave employees collective strength to demand and obtain better wages and working conditions.

Now, we find we have erected two monsters far more oppressive than were the few capital ists of half a century ago-Big Laborism and Big Centralized Government.

Again, we find a few ambitious, in some cases, unscrupulous men, operating against the best interests of the people, and bringing discredit to a great humanitarian movement. I refer, of course, to certain labor leaders who are using the vast resources put at their command to influence elections for the benefit of certain minority groups to the detriment of the general public-oppressing and enslaving the very workers they pretend to protect and benefit.

Again, we find we have set up a group of bureaucrats at Washington who, whether intentionally or not, are step by step propelling this nation into a socialistic economy under the pretext of protecting our citizens against themselves.

The Taft-Hartley Law was enacted to curb the power of oppressive labor leaders. Rather than repeal or water down this law, as the President demands, it should be strengthened so as to further protect union members against the depredations their leadership.

Just to satisfy a curiosity I asked a number of persons about it and although some had a vaguely correct idea only a very few had a clear understanding of the term; and not more than a handful had an awareness of the full implications of a deficit financing policy in government.

Some of the people with whom I discussed it said they had been dodging the formation of a personal opinion on whether government deficit financing was good or bad because, they said, it carried only a hazy meaning in their minds. When they'd heard the term spoken or had seen it in print they'd formed the habit, they said, of mentally "skipping" it.

Way To Banksuptcy Deficit financing in its simplest definition means spending money you haven't got, operating beyond your income, spending borrowed money. If you earn \$300 a month and wish to spend \$400 a month, you can only grant the wish by borrowing the extra \$100 each month and giving the lender your IOU or your personal note, agreeing to repay the amount plus a set

#### New Dictionary to List 50,000 Words Coined in America

CHICAGO - The United States is going to have its own national dictionary, consisting of 500, 000 words "made in the U.S.A."

Words that were originated in this country and old words that were given new meaning here will appear in the Dictionary of Americanisms, to be published by the University of Chicago next year.

The first dictionary devoted exclusively to Americanisms will cover those contributed by the early colonists down to the atomic age.

The dictionary, five years in compilation, will be a 2-volume, 2000 page, illustrated publica-

Mitford Mathews one of the nation's top lexicographers, is editing the work. Mathews said many Americans will be surprised at some of the words that originated in this country.

Among them, he said, are "automobile," "campus," "Christmas tree," "currency," "derby hat," "hydrant" and "snooper," all of which he said are "in stitutionalized Americanisms.'

Mathews said the dictionary will give the first known use of each word presented in a quotation, with the date it was printed and the source of the
