The American Way HOKUM

In the final paragraph of a recent column discussing the invasion of Government into the power manufacturing and distributing business, I said this:

"If no project is plotted for your particular vicinity, serve you have a great aversion to being forced to pay part of the cost of furnishing 'juice' to citizens in other parts of the nation."

From a reader out on the Pacific Coast comes a letter inquiring as to just what I meant by that statement. As the same question may be in the minds of other readers, I have chosen to answer the inquiry via my column. Here goes:

The Tennessee Valley Authority is one of the largest power socialistic planners point with great pride to this project; in fact, glibly cite it as a glowing example to prove that the Federal Government is able to furnish power and light to consumers at lower rates than privately-owned companies. What ho-- kum!

As the late Al Smith was wont to say, "Let's look at the rec- to the power and light business. ord." So, let's you and I turn in 1949 at a net loss of \$7,042,000. That loss was paid by tax payers in every state of the Union, only a small part by tax payers served by the TVA. In other words both my Pacific Coast reader friend and I paid part of the cost of furnishing "juice" to consumers in the Tennessee Valley.

Now, I have nothing against the good citizens in the Ten-

nessee Valley who are served by TVA. They are nice people, but much as I admire and esteem them, I do object to paying part of their electric light bills. There is no more valid reason for my paying part of their light bills than their paying part of my rent, food or laundry bills.

Since it was begun in 1933, the American tax payers have invested about \$800,000,000 in TVA. It has consistently failed to earn its interest charges on notice on your Legislators that the money borrowed from the National Treasury; even at the low Government rates. If a privately-owned company operated on such a basis it would soon be bankrupt. The TVA manages to stay in business only because it passes the loss on to you and me and the other tax payers.

So, this claim of cheapness of public power rates turns out to be a myrth from a national standpoint. The taxpayer at large is called upon to shoulder the taxes that the public power agencies escape paying, as developments so far completed well as to provide cheap or free by our Federal Government. The capital to them. While certain areas which are beneficiaries of Federal power programs enjoy lower electric rates, they do so at the expense of taxpayers of the country as a whole. What one citizen saves on his electric rate, another citizen makes up in his tax.

But, here is the worst feature of this Government invasion in-In 1949, while TVA was taking to the 1949 Annual Report of \$7.042,000 out of Uncle Sam's TVA. We find that it operated Treasury to meet its deficit, the privately-owned power companies paid in taxes into that same treasury the tidy sum of approximately \$451,000,000.

> From this, it is apparent that we get "nicked" twice when Government steps out of line and goes into business. We taxpayers have to dig down to meet the deficits incurred; and no longer is there tax revenue from the privately-owned companies squeezed out by Government.

And so I repeat: If Federal Government is "cooking up" a power project for your section of the country, let your Congressman and Senators know that you prefer to buy "juice" from a privately-owned company; if no project is plotted for your particular vicinity, serve notice on them that you have a great aversion to being forced to pay part of the cost of furnishing "juice" to consumers in other parts of the nation.

There is no valid reason for the Government to enter the utility business. The privatelyowned companies are doing a magnificent job. Why then all this maneuvering to have the Government displace them?







40,000 PEOPLE WITNESS KATY'S GREAT TEXAS TRAIN WRECK

It was inevitable that the two engines pulled their cars to cerstacks, bells clanging and whistles blasting, the wildly racing

trains would crash! The red and tain destruction. Closer and green locomotives, resplendent in the afternoon September sun, were careening toward each oth- ent when steel would meet steel er at terrific speed. Sparks in an awful, sickening fusion. spewing from their balloon tion as the Titans of the rails merged and rolled onto their sides. After a brief interval the locomotives' boilers exploded sending broken metal and wood high into the air to rain down upon the countryside.

A memorable spectacle indeed this Great Texas Train Wreck! A display of unbridled power and frightful destruction seldom seen by man. BUT 40,000 people actually witnessed this historic event!

Here is the complete story: Whatever the reason - to publicize the Katy, to sell a large number of railroad tickets, or what - William G. Crush assistant to the vice president was the instigator of the plan. Noting how quickly a crowd gathered from out of nowhere at the scene of an eastern train crash, Crush convinced Katy officials that to stage a"Monster Wreck" of two trains would be good business for the line. (It was fall in 1896 and the months of depression were sorely felt.)

Delighted as a child with a new toy, Crush pitched into the task of organizing the mammouth spectacle. A straight stretch on the Katy's main line 16 miles north of Waco, Texas, was selected as the logical site for the event. Scores of tents were set up including one huge circus tent to house a super restaurant. A more durable edifice of wood was erected to serve as "jail" for the sure-to-be-present 'bad actors." A 2,100-foot platform and station were built to accommodate the multitude of travelers. Eight tank cars equipped with necessary piping, faucets and tin cups were provided to cater to the thirst of the visitors. (As is happened, however, untold gallons of lemonade . .

and harder beverages . . . were also consumed by the thirsty throng!) The Katy built a veritable "City for a Day" and it was christened "Crush", Texas. The unprecedented attraction

was a publicity natural, and while the Katy announced it in posters and small advertisements, free publicity in magazines, newspapers and railroad journals ran into amazing linage. Interest snowballed until it was a main topic of conservation. Yes, everyone talked about the Katy!

The great day, September 15, 1896, dawned. All day special trains steamed into Crush, Texas, and by four in the afternoon more than 40,000 gay, jostling, shouting spectators populated the "city". (Katy brought most of them, and that record still stands for the most M-K-T special trains run to one point in a single day.)

As the appointed hour drew near, the multitude of people became wild with excitement. Katy engines 999 and 1000 slowly steamed along the track until they were pilot-to-pilot at the point of collision. Photographers swarmed around the locomotives snapping pictures of the historic scene. Then the trains backed away to take their places at starting points on opposite hills two miles apart.

It took almost an hour for 200 deputy sheriffs to herd the boisterous mob back to the safety zone. When this was accomplished, Mr. Crush dramatically stepped up to the point of collision, raised his arms and shouted instructions to his telegrapher to flash the starting signal. A mighty roar went up from the great mass of humanity as

thrilled every person in the vast audience. And, as was to be expected, there were casualties; several people were killed, many more injured by flying pieces of wood and steel. The city of Crush disappeared almost immediately after the event which was pronounced a success, financially and scientifi-




