Speedometer Cheats For Public Safety Detroit-That speedometer in your automobile doesn't really interest of keeping you alive. Buzzing along the open high way at 82 miles an hour? That's what the speed indi cator on your dashboard may say, but chances are you're only
doing 75 . When the speedometer reads 65, you're getting where you're going at an even mile a minute.
Speedometers themselves are built with watchlike precision
as accurate as humanly possiole. But auto manufacturers se them to read, at higher speeds a few miles faster than actual road speed.
