While sympathizing with the unfortunate victims in such a reign of terror we cannot ignore the fact that on the whole the outlook is improving. Violence increases resentment. It spreads and intensifies the hatred which is already smouldering. It creates an explosive condition that will blow the tyrants sky high if and when a favorable occasion presents itself.

In this connection we wonder whether our own government is not seizing the Chinese situation as an opportunity to start correcting the terrible mistake it made a few years ago. Calling attention to the increased burden assumed by Red Cross in order to meet the needs of service men Chairman E. S. Lawson pointed out that quotas all over the nation have been substantially raised and Muenster's quota has been raised accordingly. The local goal is \$600 as compared with \$475 last year.
