To have or not to have pavement at the new public school building. That is a question which has bothered the school board for some time, the city council since last Monday and will soon be presented to the church committee of the Sacred Heart Parish.

The problem was brought out for serious consideration Monday night when the school board informed the city council that it would install curbs on its property hence expected to qualify for the customary street graveling job. At the same time it suggested that some plan be worked out whereby the school can get pavement instead of the gravel.

According to an agreement of long standing the city has cooperated in a residential improvement plan by improving the street whenever property owners install curbs.

In its present financial embarrassment, however, caused by several expensive water line and sewer extensions, the city is reluctant to take on the cost of a big street improvement job, especially a pavement job. Likewise the school board advised the imposition on employers that construction costs are crowding the budget and will not allow the board to put in the pavement without a financial lift.

> Net result of the discussion was a proposed meeting of members of the school board, city council and parish committee in an effort to arrange a three way deal for the mutual benefit of both the church and the school. The proposed pavement is to be between the parish property and the public school property. The meeting of committees has been set for next Tuesday night, March 14.

AUSTIN. TEXAS. - Dr. Geo. W. Cox State Health Officer, says that the season of the year when typhoid fever is most prevalent will soon be here and urges everyone to clean up their premises to eliminate flies and other insects. A town is only as clean as the individual citizens and public health should be everyone's concern.

The typhoid germ travels from an infected person to the well person; this is generally accomplished by water, milk, flies, fingers, or food. Every case is contracted by the way of the mouth and digestive system.





Brazos Power Co-op And TP&L Agree on Mutual Aid Deal

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22-An interchange agreement between the Brazos River Transmission Electric Cooperative, Inc., and the Texas Power & Light Company for the purchase and sale of electric power was approved by Claude R. Wickard, REA administrator, here Tuesday.

"This is the kind of agreement which I strongly advocate between public utilities and REA bodies," said Congressman W. R. (Bob) Poage of Waco whose efforts are largely responsible for the organization of the Brazos River Transmission Electric Cooperative, Inc. "It is both a purchase and a sales agreement by which both parties are mutually benefited. It provides for connections between the transmission lines of each, thus making it possible for them to help each other during times of emergency," Congressman Poage

"Under terms of the agreement the Transmission Co-operative will sell to TP&L Company a portion of the electric power generated at the Morris Sheppard Dam which the Co-operative purchases under long term agreement from the Brazos River Conservation and Reclamation District. In turn, TP&L will sell to the Transmission Co-operative power and energy at existing points of delivery to its member distribtuion co-operatives. 


