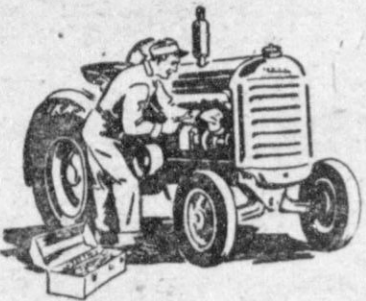

## GOOD NEWS FOR AMERICA

Many events of the past few weeks and months have disturbed and alarmed the American people. Some of the calmest among my acquaintances are, for the first time in their lives, downright pessimistic. But this column is written after a swing through several midwestern industrial areas and the things seen and heard would strengthen any body's confidence in the U.S.A. America has potentially the brain power, the industrial might and the moral strength to become unconquerable. I was never more certain of that.

It will require high calibre leadership to properly channel these elements, but it can be done. In direst circumstances they would somehow mobilize themselves. Last week I spent three days talking to some of the top industrial executives in America and found them already subordinating every other interest to the growing urgent problem of making this nation

militarily strong. A full day was spent at the big La Grange (Illinois) plant of General Motors' Electro-Motive Division where 11,000 men and women employees and an ingenious management team are daily performing production miracles.

### Tumultuous Order

As I walked through the clattering, tumultuous buildings housing Electro-Motive's interconnected assembly lines and saw huge streamliner diesel locomotives rising out of the mile-long jungles of automotive and electromotive parts, it seemed impossible that there could be any strict organization, any pattern or disciplined order whatsoever in all this ebbing and flowing commotion.

But as I paused to closely watch the activities of a unit of men at work and noted the precise movement of materials into their particular orbit of action, then turned my eyes here and there and became aware of the same thing happening all about me, a thrilling tingle began to creep up the muscles of my back. Revealed in bold relief was the miraculous rhythm controlling the whole sweep of activity in this sprawling giant of mass production.

### Citizens Know The Score

Millions of parts — for the powerful diesel motors, the big copper electrogenerators, and the sleek locomotive bodies in which they ride — are manufactured in this La Grange plant. It even makes the greater part of the thousands of machines on which the locomotive parts are manufactured. Loads of raw materials flow into the plant throughout the day. Astonishingly, every two hours there emerges a brightly painted streamliner, diesel locomotive.

The Psychological Corporation has just concluded a nationwide study which revealed that 73 per cent of the people appreciate the part such big industries are playing in improving the American living standard and as bulwarks of our military strength. These people say they want the big companies encouraged or at least not molested by government. They

thus disagree with those government officials and politicians who are constantly attacking and harassing big business and industry, apparently for political purposes.

### Benefits or Business

With my visit to the G.M. locomotive factory freshly in mind I doubt if even a Socialist planner could go through any one of our country's several thousand such big plants without seeing and understanding clearly that they are the pace-makers and the very sinew and muscle of American progress. While the big companies have been having their swiftest growth, the little ones have multiplied. There were 3,200,000 business and industrial units three years ago; today there are nearly 4,000,000. The big ones make business and customers for smaller ones; in fact, General Motors buys from more than 100,000 smaller companies.

At Electro-Motive's La Grange plant, as elsewhere in American industry, shrewd management and sound operational policy have directly improved the lot of employees. Available at Electro-Motive is a splendid hospital, a cafeteria which serves 2400 meals in 12 minutes (soup 8c; Salisbury steak dinner 55c), showers and lockers, recreational facilities, free movies, insurance, pension benefits, etc. Outside the plant as I departed after addressing its 1500 foremen stood 3500 automobiles waiting to carry their employee owners to comfortable homes. Communism cannot win American men and women like these. And backed up by our great American industries our nation will not easily be conquered by any military force.

## THE LOW DOWN FROM HICKORY GROVE

Running an eye over how and why we maybe fozzled the soap here and there — in 1950 — is not a bad idea. How-come we did not cool-down our congressman as he voted more debt and bonds for a 100 things unneeded.

With our "all-out" for defense we are going to need our every nickel. We must keep the USA in fettle, otherwise we will be a forlorn lot. No extra 10 cent piece should be collected from the people via bonds and taxes and be put into anything that won't shoot — or help feed the army and navy — or keep the men in uniform in good health and fit — or assemble, build and ship war tools.

Looking to 1951, there are gleams of light. Says what, says Henry. Well, I says, for one gleam there is our new Defense Mobilizer — he is Mr. General Electric Wilson. He is no mediocre person. He is to say who will get the copper and steel, etc. to build our defense. He can tell 'em, and he will do so. There will be no skylarking around. We are in good hands, there. He is a proven success — a citizen of the first water — and at the top via perspiration and determination, from office boy up.

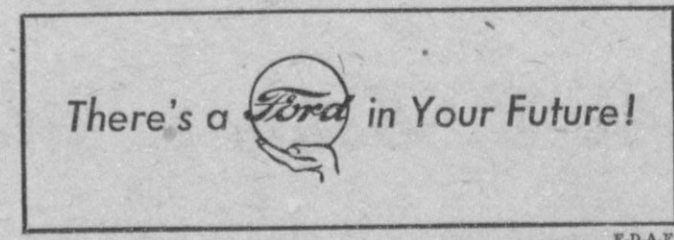

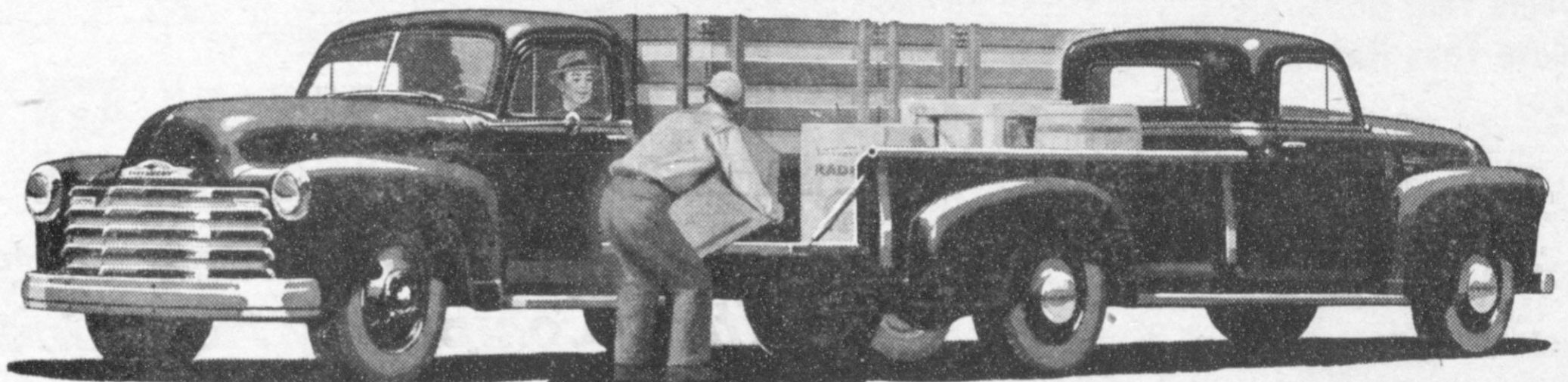

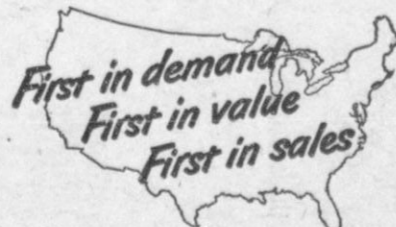

**Did He Have The Right???**

During the American assault on Attu Island in World War II, our soldiers came across a Jap, named Ito, badly wounded in his fox-hole. He and a companion had exhausted their ammunition. Each had held his last grenade against his stomach and pulled the pin. Ito's proved to be a dud. But his comrade's grenade exploded, disemboweling Ito and shattering his leg. When our soldiers found him several days later, he was still clutching his dud grenade.

His leg had now become a greenish, muddy, bloody mass of gas gangrene. The stench was terrific.

"Throw that stinking mess overboard," barked out a wounded gunner on the hospital ship, "before he suffocates us all."

"Gimme my trench knife," yelled an infantryman with a bayonet slash in his hip, "and I'll operate on him."

A few nights before, the Japs had broken through our lines and slaughtered some of our unarmed medical corps-men. The situation was tense—loaded with the dynamite of hatred, needing only a spark to ignite the fuse.

Lights had burned all night over the operating table. Finally the last American had been lifted from it. Dr. Cass Stimson, the chief surgeon, stepped forward.

Did he have the right to use the blood plasma, donated by an American to save an American's life, for the hated Jap? Did he have the right to endanger his life and those of his as-

sistants by coming in contact with the highly infectious gas gangrene? Wasn't it their business to KILL Japs, not to SAVE them?

Here too were the passions of hatred and vengeance pounding at the central dogma of the Christian faith, the teaching that all men are brothers. Would religion gird him with the power to resist the flaming passions of nationalism and the clamor of hatred and vengeance?

"Bring him in," ordered Dr. Stimson. When the operation was over, tears of joy streamed down Ito's cheeks as he grasped the surgeon's arm, and sobbed, "A-me-ri-cal A-me-ri-cal!"

Here was the flowering of the central teaching of the Christian religion into a deed of service, kindness and love for one's enemy. So knit together are we all as members of Christ, that we cannot unjustly harm any of our fellow men, even the most loathsome of our enemies, without injuring ourselves. Any cruelty inflicted upon that helpless Jap—even the refusal to relieve his pain—would have degraded those who inflicted it.

There is no cave deep enough for us to hide in, when the cry of suffering is heard, even though it be the cry of our enemy. Thus does religion stretch out her hands, full of healing, of beneficent service, of loving kindness to all mankind.

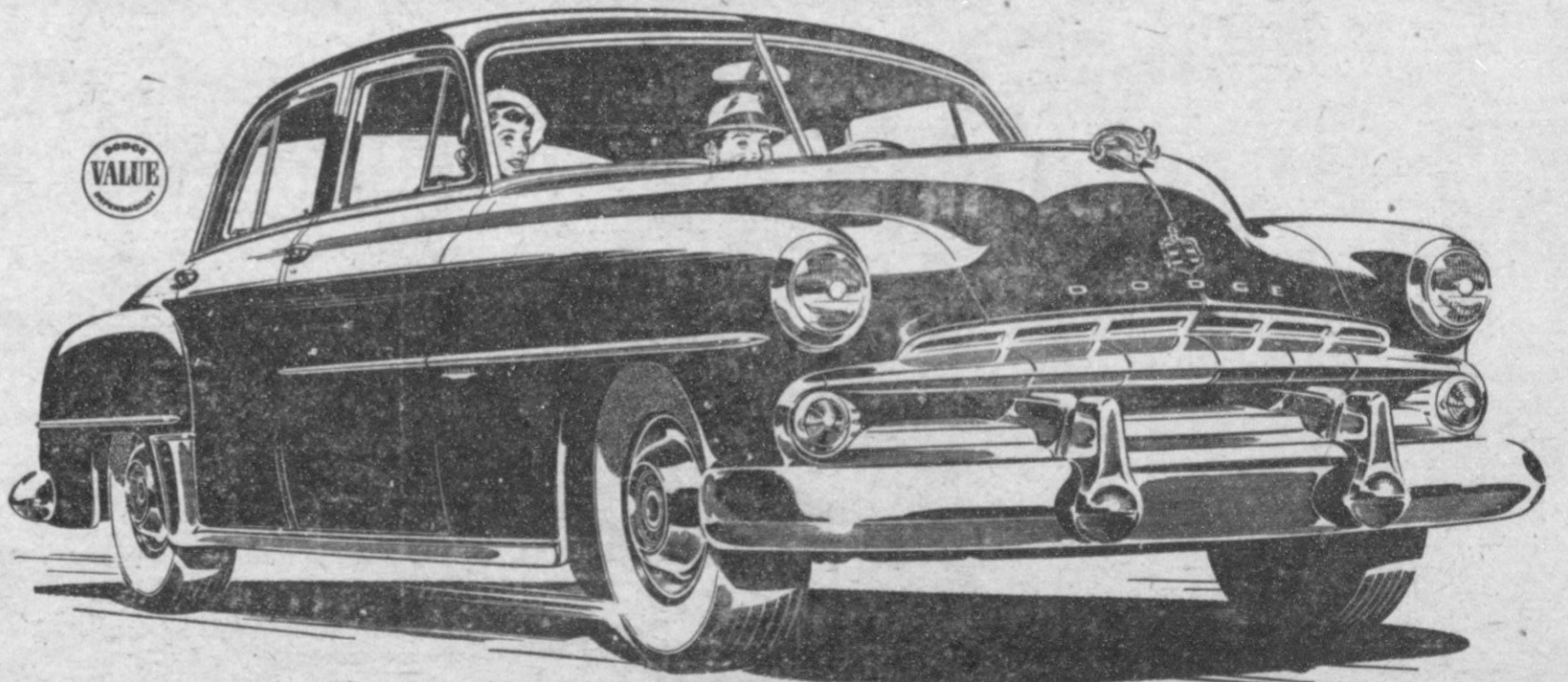

the basis of 3 cents per dozen. As leading milk producer of the year Albert Knabe received a Kraft gift box of processed cheese. As leading egg producer Joe Fleitman received a similar package.

Other figures reported at the meeting reveal that the association marketed 186,000 dozens of egg and produced 670,000 pounds of whey. It accepted about 90 new members while losing 40 to increase its membership from 425 to 475.

small shift can handle it during slack times, but a double shift running at capacity will be needed for the flush season.

If that happens patronage dividends in the local association will begin to approach the premiums offered by Grade A distributors. At this time members share, in proportion to their own production, in the plant's profit on all milk. If outside milk volume goes over 50 per cent they will earn more dividends on it than on their own. At the same time a saturation of the Grade A market may gradually decrease the premium now offered. Who knows. A few years from now Muenster may have a better deal than the big cities offer.

Some months ago it seemed as though the cheese factory was due to take a beating. But this trend can turn out to be a good break for all concerned. For the time being larger producers, who can afford the extra expense to change over, are getting their premium prices while small producers are reaping a better dividend. Volume at the plant shows a good chance to increase. In short it seems that all will get to advance to

a higher income level. In the meantime lots of people are getting some fancy dairy barns and equipment. Everything considered, this community's dairy industry still looks like a mighty good bet.


