Work Begins On New Building For Endres Motor Co.

Construction on a new building for the Endres Motor Company is due to begin about the end of this week, as soon as a crew of workmen finish removing the old building, which has housed the local Ford agency for about 20 years.

The new building, measuring 55x120 feet, will be a modernistic structure of steel, brick and glass. Its front will consist of two offices, a 3-car display floor and a parts room. Its large shop department will be completely equipped with hydraulic lifts and all the special equipment required for complete automotive service. The far end of the shop will be partitioned for a 28x30 paint and body shop.

It will occupy the space taken up by the present building and parking lot using the south wall of Ben Seyler's garage in common with that building. Anticipating this project Endres and Seyler shared the cost of the dividing wall when Seyler built three years ago.

Clarence Wilson is supervisor for the job and all work, with the possible exception of a few specialized jobs, will be done by local men. Endres has no contractor.

Actual work on the project started last week end with the transfer of equipment, parts and supplies to temporary locations. That work was finished Tuesday. Early Wednesday workmen started tearing down the old building and expect to finish it Thursday or Friday. Much of the material will go into the new structure.

During the project business will continue as usual. Endres has leased the sheet metal building east of Seyler's garage for his shop and parts department and Jake Horn's private fer of both Muenster and Saint garage for paint and body work. The company's main office is inside Ben's garage, in the room used by Ben for his private office. Again the movement is under way to have a state wide prohibition election. Drys are making pep talks, writing to editors, putting pressure on senators and representatives.

Whether they will be able to bring on the election, and if so to win it, remains to be seen. Popular opinion now, as before, seems to be fairly evenly divided on the issue and the outcome most likely would be decided on a very narrow margin.

The \$64 question, however, is whether this is the proper way of dealing with the liquor problem. Drys mostly base their opinion on the premise that alcohol is evil and has no place in society. But are they correct? Is the fault in the alcohol or in the small percentage of persons who use it to excess?

It would seem about as reasonable to pass a law against the possession of firearms on the grounds that they are used for robbery and murder and very frequently cause accidental death. Of course no one would expect such a movement to get very far. Too few would agree that the decent citizen's right to protect his property or to go. hunting should be curtailed in order to take the weapon away from criminals.



Texas Had 477,076 Gardens Last Year

Home gardens can have two important effects on the family food supply. First, they may be a scource of low priced food. And second, they may improve the nutritional value of the fa-mily's diet. In 1950, there were 477,076 home gardens in Texas, says J. E. Hutchison, associate horticul-turist for the Texas A & M Ex-tension Service. Home gardens

tension Service. Home gardens usually produce about 25 percent of the total vegetables grown.

If each of these gardens produced \$50 worth of food last year, that would be \$23,850,800. As the housewife knows, it does not take much food to be worth \$50 these days.

If each garden produced \$100 worth of food, the figure would be \$47,707,600 - quite a contribution to the Texas food bill. Each person needs from 600 to 700 pounds of fresh vegetables annually, says Hutchison. He believes that, in these tense and unsettled times, it is the patriotic duty of everyone to keep themselves physically fit.

Home gardens will help provide the fresh vegetables needed in the daily diet. Hutchison urges families to plant home gardens and thus produce at

home as much of their vegetable supply as is possible.

The sweet clovers produce a lush top growth that is high in protein and for this reason they are being widely used for supplemental or temporary pastures and as a hay crop. However care must be exercised in grazing and especially in mowing sweet clover so that it will not be killed. The sweet clovers produce regrowth from stem buds instead of from a crown as in alfalfa and if it is cut or grazed below these stem buds no new growth can be produced." The height of the stem buds vary with the thickness of the stand and clover so the cutting height must be determined for each stand. The clovers are doing a great job of increasing the milk production of dairy herds in the Muenster area. Ranchers are also using clover plantings for temporary pasture to relieve the pressure on the native range and to furnish additional high protein hay for their livestock.

In addition to its uses as a soil improving crop and in the production of livestock products the seed of clovers can be harvested for a cash crop. The cooperators of the Upper Elm Red Soil Conservation District in the Muenster area harvested clover seed valued at \$15,300 last summer. The breakdown of the harvest reads like this -42,000 pounds of Madrid sweet clover seed valued at 30c per pound; 10,000 pounds Biennial White clover seed valued at 20c per pound and 5000 pounds of Hubam sweet clover seed at 14c per pound. 


Leo Schmitt Tries **Out Soil District's** New Sprig Planter

To Leo Schmitz goes the distinction of being the first to sod a waterway with the disin the Muenster area by planting bermuda grass sprigs in a wide strip following a natural drain that crosses his field. When established to grass this wide waterway will enable him to completely terrace the adjoining cultivated land and empty all the terrace water on the







to its important duty of safely disposing of terrace water the waterway will furnish additional pasture for livestock.

Bermuda grass, like other plants, will grow better in a trict owned sprigging machine prepared seed bed. Schmitt this year. Schmitt launched plowed the waterway area when prepared seed bed. Schmitt water way sodding operations he prepared his land for grain last fall, then the land was harrowed the day before the grass roots were to be planted; this pulverized the soil so the roots would be covered easily without leaving air pockets. The fresh dug bermuda grass roots were then put into the ground

sprigging machine, which opens the furrow, drops the roots, covers them and packs the soil. Leo plans to fence the waterway in the near future so that it can be grazed to keep down competition from Johnson-grass. Weed competition will be controlled by frequent mowings. The bermuda grass will pro-

bably make a solid cover during this growing season. Cooperators of the Upper Elm-Red Soil Conservation District have begun the important task of putting bermuda grass on areas designated for terrace outlets and these operations will

continue for several weeks. Grass roots are being dug daily from the sandy land east of Gainesville. There is moisture in the soil and buds on the trees - it's later than you think.

grassed waterway. In addition Dead Stock Yields Critical Material For Defense Effort

Critical shortages in animal by-products during World War II were recalled today by Jim McDonald, general manager of Central Hide and Rendering Company in a letter to the Enterprise.

During those troublous times according to McDonald, the farmers and stockmen of this area aided materially in supply. ing needed greases, animal hides and protein concentrates used in vast quantities to furby the two-row district owned ther the defense effort. They did so by promptly reporting the presence of dead or crippled stock on their farms and in their feed lots to Central Hide and Rendering Company, which is the largest concern of its kind who pays cash for dead and crippled stock in Cooke County.

"The current re-armamen" program is again creating serious shortages in these commodities," McDonald said. Manufacture of such items as gunpowder, medicines, plastics soaps and shoes for the armed services, and of vitamine enriched stock and poultry feeds for the farmers and stockmen at home, account largely for current shortages, he explained "Stock raisers can now con-

tribute materially to the rearmament program, and benefit themselves at the same time by promptly reporting all dead stock. Farms, pastures and feed lots can in this way be kept clean and free of dead animals," he said.
