 Washington, D. C., March 3 The District of Columbia is gov erned by Commissioners appoin ted by the President and confirmed by the Senate. BothHouse and Senate have District Committees to recommend law for the government of the District of Columbia. In other
words, the District of Columbia words, the District of Columbia

Congress. Each session certain organizations within the District of Columbia urge upon Con ed Home Rule legislation. Dur such a bill was passed in the Senate but was not passed in the House. This week the Sen ate has again started hearing on such a bill. The Washington
Board of Trade, similar to chamber of commerce, and made up of hundreds of leading business men of the city of Washington, oppose Home
Rule. They realize that they now get better government at smaller cost than any major city in America. A great many people in Washington are hap py not to be plagued by the el-
ection of a Mayor, City Commissioners, and other municipa polities. Another thing that complicates the Home Rule pic ture in some of our minds is
the growing negro population in the city of Washington. Ten years ago, roughly, 27 per cent of Washington's population wa negro. Now the percentage is
approximately 38 . More approximately 38 . More than
half the children in the Wash ington public schools are negro children.
