Blanket of White Brings Relief to **5** Months Drought

In appearance at least if not in temperature Muenster had its biggest dose of winter this week. Sleet and snow that fell lightly at intervals Tuesday fell more heavily during the night to spread a blanket about 21/2 inches thick. Another inch of snow fell Wednesday night.

At the same time it brought the first break of any consequence in this community's five months drought. Steve Moster said that the accumulation of snow and sleet in the city's official gauge melted down to a moisture measurement of 1.22 more than twice as much as the combined readings since Sept. 19. His records show .02 for October, .09 for November, .03 for December and .30 for January ... a total of .44 inch in 5 days less than 5 months.

Though welcome as a starter, the moisture is still far short of the community's needs. Unless more is received soon farmers have little hope of any crops this year. Chances of making a grain crop vanished long ago.

Like that of two week's before, this week's cold wave was marked by a big and sudden plunge of the mercury . . from 70 at noon Monday to the low twenties Tuesday and a low of 16 on Wednesday.

Roads remained passable but difficult. School busses, idle Wednesday and Thursday, will also be idle Friday unless the weathers clears sufficiently to eliminate present hazards. Classes at the public school are suspended while busses are idle. Classes continued at the parochial school with an attendance of slightly over 50 per cent.

At the same time necessity demands that a good deal of western Europe haven't a chanmight be induced to make a deal with Stalin rather than risk annihilation.

One way or another, we're stuck with the job of furnishing the principal resistance to Russia. And the ideal way it now seems is to furnish what men will be needed to organize an effective force in Europe but to place more emphasis in developing air and naval strength to deal out the most possible punishment if and when Russia decides to get hostile.

Along that line it is encouraging to note lately that Red influence is slipping in some parts of Europe. The grand fizzle of the attempted demonstration in France a few weeks ago and the more recent revolt of Italian red leaders are significant. Meanwhile Tito stands pat. Stalin is having his troubles, perhaps enough of them to discourage plans of going on a rampage. Besides there's always the hope that internal troubles in Russia and the satellites may explode some day and blow Stalin's world conquest plans into oblivion.

Little by little it seems that time favors the Christian element. If it continues that way there will be no war after all. At least there's a glimmer of hope in sight.

One point in the Hoover speech leaves no room for controversy. It is his recommendation that our federal government cooperate in the defense effort by eliminating unessential spending . . and that it (Continued on Page 8)
