

#### Social Security Pay On Farm Hired Help Begins This Week

Mr. Farmer, this week is April. In April you are required by law to make a report on your regular farm and household hired help so they can get credit for the wages you have paid them during January-February-March in their Old-Age and Survivors Insurance accounts.

Do you know how to make your report, where to send it, and when? A circular called "Notice to Farmers with Regular Hired Help" tells you how to do it.

You can get the circular from the Bureau of Old-Age and Survivors Insurance or Bureau of Internal Revenue in Dallas, your County Agricultural Agent, and I think you can get it from your hometown bank.


Hanged if the ladies didn't think it was some rare kind of cat and gave it a special award! When
