Construction on Red River Ferry Begins This Week

After three days of steady work most of the frame and bottom work on the Muenster ferry is complete, and another week will probably complete the finishing touches sufficient to permit its transfer to Red River.

Work is being done at the Community Lumber Company Cpl. Alois Sicking of Fort by C. J. Fette, Rody Klement Sill and PFC Ernest Sicking of and Harold Knabe. When fin-Sheppard AFB spent a weekend ished it will be moved by heavy oil field trucking equipment to the river bank.

The structure, measuring 50 by 14 feet, is built of 2 inch lumber over a framework of heavy timber braced by iron rods. When completed it will contain approximately 10,000 board feet of lumber and weigh more than 25,000 pounds. Its load capacity will be in excess of 60,000 pounds and its deck space will accommodate a large trailer truck, two smaller trucks or four passenger cars or pickups.

11 Detention Dams On Elm Watershed **Await Easements**

The Soil Conservation Service is ready to start work on a 2 million dollar flood control program for the Elm creek watershed if easements for the deplied, members of the Upper Elm-Red soil conservation district were told in a special meeting in the district conservation office at Gainesville last

The group, consisting of district supervisors and flood control committeemen, met for the purpose of considering ways and means by which easements can be secured in order to permit the work to go ahead.

District Conservationist Clyde Wells informed the group that an allottment sufficient to start work on 11 of the watershed's proposed dams is now available but pointed out that no money is provided to buy easements. Interested persons will have to make the sites available before Soil Conservation Service can begin its work.

In some cases, it was pointed out, landowners have expressed willingness to grant the easement in return for the benefits they expect to derive from the lake. In other cases, however, especially where large acreage will be given up to the lake, committeemen expect greater reluctance on the part of landowners in granting easements.

According to engineering estimates the system of proposed detention reservoirs would prevent flooding in rains equivalent to the heaviest the county has had during the past 100 years.

The plan proposes a dam on the Big Elm near Saint Jo and other dams on each of 22 other streams that flow into Big Elm. Every dam will retard the flow of water into the main Elm channel keeping the volume down to the capacity of the channel, provided the rainfall is no heavier than the worst in the past 100 years.

Whenever it rains, water flows first into the detention pool from which it is released at a comparatively slow rate until the water is back down to the permanent pool level. Drainage speeds are so designed so that the detention lake when filled (Continued on Page 8)
