

Cooke County this year has 5,179 recorded qualified voters. According to figures released C. His new address is: PFC last week, the county tax office has issued 3,936 poll tax receipts and 1,234 exemptions.

The number, however does not represent the county's total voting strength. It does not innesday to return to San Diego, clude the complete list of overage citizens living outside the city of Gainesville who are qualified to vote without an exemption certificate.

This year for the first time over-age people of Gainesville come under the regulation requiring aged persons in cities of 10,000 or more to get exemption certificates. Prior to the last census report no over-age county resident needed a certificate. Some persons outside Gainesville also secured exemptions this year even though they were not required to do

The combined recorded voting strength of Muenster's two boxes this year is 539. South Muenster has 112 paid polls and 6 exemptions. North Muenster has 368 paid polls and 53 exemptions. Most exemptions for these boxes consist of underage voters. Allowing about 60 for over-age voters, the community's actual voting strength is approximately 600.

Red River Ferry North of Muenster To Be Started Soon

A project which has been considered in this area for several years, the road and river crossing to connect Muenster with Leon and Jimtown, Okla., is due to get under way next

Jerome Pagel disclosed Wednesday that the Community Lumber Company has all materials to be used on a heavy duty ferry capable of transporting a loaded trailer truck across Red River. C. J. Fette, in charge of building the craft, expects to start the work next week.

Local business men who are backing the project look forward confidently to developing a mutually beneficial relationship between the two areas that will be connected. They also have visions of eventually developing sufficient traffic to warrant the construction of a bridge across the river. That possibility is indicated by a recent appropriation to build a bridge replacing a ferry near Clarksville.

The connection between Muenster and the river bend area of Oklahoma is a natural in several respects. By direct route and ferry crossing Leon and Jimtown are about 20 miles from Muenster. 

Texas Has Leading Livestock Auction Volume of Nation

COLLEGE STATION .- Texas is the leading state in number of livestock auctions and in number of cattle, sheep and hogs marketed by this method, according to a new bulletin released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. The greatest growth in numbers of auctions has occurred in the

Several reasons are given for the increased growth. Farmers and ranchmen like the ease and convenience of selling and buying through auctions. They like the social and educational aspects of the auction. It provides an opportunity to meet friends and discuss the merits of the animals sold in relation to the prices paid.

According to the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas, 168 auctions were operating in Texas on October 20, 1950. Thirty-seven of these auctions in various parts of the state were included in a study made recently by Dr. John G. McNeely, Charles B. Brotherton and Travis M.McKenzie, research agricultural economists.

This study of livestock auctions is mainly descriptive. It does not attempt to point out



Ulich, extension agricultural engineer and member of the State Farm Safety committee of Texas, is directly in proportion to the care that is excerised by those who participate in water sports. Never swim alone or in unfamiliar water and don't try to swim long distances, especially in cold water, unless followed by at least two people in a boat. Don't go into the water for at least one hour after eating and don't stay in the water after you become tired or cold.



AUSTIN .-- Not a single case of smallpox has occurred in Texas this year, said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Unfortunately, the fact that we had no smallpox does not mean we are immune for all time.




