Fanned by a strong wind, the flames raced through the tall tinber-dry prairie grass with amazing speed. At times, witnesses said, the raging inferno rolled forward as fast as 35 miles per hour.

Efforts to check the fire's forward movement were futile except by rushing ahead to the next road or other barrier and starting a back-fire. In some cases gaps were cut with maintainers and the backfire started from them. Energies of the fire fighters were used principally in checking the fire's spread to the side after the main blaze had rolled past.

### Warfarin Appears To Be Best Poison For Rats and Mice

COLLEGE STATION. - Warfarin, a new rat killer released by the University of Wisconsin Research Foundation, appears to be one of the most effective poisons available for the control of rats and mice.

The active ingredient of the new poison is coumarin, a compound found in sweetclover which affects the clotting of blood, says J. E. Poore, assistant district leader for the Rodent Control Service. Rats that have eaten warfarin baits for several days become less active, develop internal hemorrhages, and slow ly bleed to death.

Poore says that one advantage of warfarin over many of the other rat poisons is that it is odorless and tasteless. Rats will continue to eat the bait until they die without detecting the presence of the poison. Another advantage lies in the safety with which it can be used on the farm. Warfarin is poisonous to all warm-blooded animals, but the amount recommended for controlling rats and mice is so small that there is little danger of farm animals or people being poisoned accidentally.

Even though warfarin is considered an extremely safe rodent poison, Poore warns that the usual precautions should be taken to prevent accidental poisonings on the farm.

For the poison to be effective, it is necessary for rats to eat warfarin baits over a period of five or more successive days. Grain or cereal type baits, which are not readily eaten by cats and dogs may be mixed with the poison, thus reducing the possible danger of poisoning these farm pets.

Warfarin is now on the market under the trade names of various chemical companies. Poore cautions that the warfarin baits should be mixed according to the manufacturer 's instructions.

According to Poore, mixed bait can be secured in 100 pound lots from the Rodent control service fieldmen and county agricultural agents and representatives of other public service organizations can order the new poison.



### Farmer's Almanac Predicts Cold Winter

The Old Farmer's Almanac (established in 1792 and published at Bublin, New Hampshire) hangs by a string in the kitchens of thousands of U.S. farm homes - and farmers place exceptional reliance on the Almanac's long-range weather forcasts. The Almanac tries to be as cheerful as possible about the weather, but its prediction for this winter chills the bones. The Almanac says (and you can feel for yourself how it turns out, that this winter will be colder than most, and will bring a "full share of rain and snow."

Tongue-in-cheek editors of the Almanac attribute - or, rather, pass the buck - to one Abe Weatherwise, a guesser quite fictional but durable enough to have lasted as long as the Almanac itself. Back in 1947, Abe's forecasts were compared with the U.S. Weather Bureau's fiveday predictions. Abe was right 78.5 percent of the time, the Weather Bureau 65.6. An earlier comparison gave the official forecasters a slight edge.
