People Are Waking Up

Month by month, week by week the American people are becoming better informed on the facts about government and economics which have such a great bearing on their everyday lives and their future. For the last 20 years the American system of free enterprise has been attacked and slyly undermined by a vast army of Leftwing crusaders. It was only a few years ago that supporters of the system finally because sufficiently stirred up to begin, in impressive numbers, to fight back; the truth.

The accumulating evidence today strongly indicates that the national trend away from the basic American principles has been halted, though by no means stamped out. For the past two years while traveling in the country lecturing and conducting our Harding College Freedom Forums, I've observed the mounting reaction as the truth began to reach American people—farm people at the grass roots, home owners in small town America, the men and women working in industries and businesses, and the people of a thousand-and-one callings in our great metropolitan centers. Wherever the free enterprise facts were being driven home, they were beating down the half-truths and falsehoods of the Leftwingers.

Signs Were Apparent

The results began to be of measurable size about a year and a half ago. They were so encouraging that a report was made to the readers of "Looking Ahead" on Feb. 15. "In the past year or so," I wrote, "there has been an awakening of significant proportions. Millions of Americans are beginning to bestir themselves and squarely face the responsibilities of citizenship. The awakening isn't suffic-

iently widespread to be decisive—to halt the leftward trend—but, to me," I reported in the February column, "it is immensely encouraging." Since that column was written the continuing stream of facts—concerning the American economic system, and the falseness of Leftwing propaganda—has expanded the area of informed public opinion.

Big Job Ahead

A survey made four years ago by the painstaking Psychological Corporation revealed that only 15 per cent of the American people knew that corporation profits averaged up, nationwide, to considerable less than 10c on each dollar of sales. Eighteen per cent thought it exceeded 50c on the dollar, 29 per cent thought it ranged between 20c and 50c. But the same survey this year found almost twice as many people correctly informed on the profit facts. That's significant. And yet, these correctly informed people amounted to only 22 per cent to the total adult population. The job of informing the people on economic facts obviously has just begun.

The facts about profits are important. The public's understanding of them constitutes an important barometer on the success or failure of the Leftwing propaganda and the now substantial efforts being put forth on behalf of American economic education. The Leftwingers want to eliminate private business ownership, place everything in the hands of the all-powerful State. So they try to create resentment, and finally hate, against the business community. Using false and twisted statistics, they've convinced millions of uninformed people that business and corporation profits are exorbitant, sky high.

The Facts

The average profit on all business during the depression and recovery years, 1930-1950, was less than 2c on the sales dollar. Government statistics show the average corporation profit for the 10-year period 1940-50 was 4½c on each sales dollar; and 5½c for the single year 1949. Corporation profits in 1949 amounted to 9.1 per

New Process Keeps That Fresh Taste In Condensed Milk

After seven years of research, laboratories of a milk company have produced a concentrated milk said to retain all the taste and other qualities of ordinary uncooked milk.

The concentration process consists of taking water out of fresh milk. It removes about one-third of the bulk, making it possible for a 6,000-gallon tank car to carry the equivalent of 18,000 gallons of milk. This is expected to reduce costs of distributing milk in either wholesale or retail lots, since a 100-quart milk truck could carry

concentrated equivalent of 300 quarts.

Water Added

Taking water out of milk without changing the taste was a problem that long baffled research workers. It would be easy to boil the water out, but the taste of boiled milk might make it hard to market.

However, when water was added to the newly-developed concentrate, newsmen who took part in a tasting test said they were unable to tell which glassful contained concentrate and which was taken from a bottleful of ordinary milk. At full strength, the concentrate

was described as a rich, full-bodied product which could be used instead of cream.

The American Way

Taking Stock

By George Peck

With our military forces already busily engaged in Korea and threatened with similar Russian-plotted-and-abetted invasions in other parts of the world, if America is to survive, a strong and sound economy must be maintained. Russia, so far, has not actually declared war because she fears the economic strength of the United States. During World War II we were the "arsenal of democracy." Since then it has been to the

United States that a world facing famine has turned for relief in order to avoid disaster. The achievements of American industry both in peace and war are a tribute to the resourcefulness, ingenuity, and know-how of business enterprise.

Only if we maintain the driving force of private initiative and rewards for personal achievement will America be able to carry the staggering load that is being and will be imposed upon us. To build a military force strong enough to cope with the eventualities that lie ahead will be a great strain on our economy.

Let's, therefore, take inventory of our basic industries. Fortunately, most of them are in a strong position; are accounting for about one-half of the world's industrial production. Productivity per American worker ranges from two to thirty times that of foreign workers, due in large part to the more extensive use of machinery provided to American workers by heavy outlay of capital funds.

Steel is the key factor in our industrial system. To meet the heavy demand, the steel industry will have expanded its annual capacity to 107 million tons by the end of 1952. This compares with current capacity of 100 million tons, which is 20 percent above 1940. The United States now produces more than three times as much steel as Russia, and accounts for nearly one-half of the world's output.

The total railroad mileage of American railroads is 225,000 miles, or four times that of Russia. During the last war our rail-

roads hauled 70 percent of all freight, 90 percent of all military freight and 97 percent of the military personnel. Since 1944 the railroads have expended the huge sum of \$4.6 billion to hold down costs and improve their service.

Our electric power industry provides an abundant, dependable and continuous supply of current at rates far below those of 30 years ago. In 1948, the United States produced 337 billion kilowatt hours, or 44 percent of world production and 5½ times that of Russia. Another 12.5 billion kilowatts of capacity are now under construction to be completed by the end of 1952. The electric power industry is prepared to meet any demands that may be made upon it, provided necessary materials and manpower are kept available to it.

As to telephone service, there are 41.8 million telephones in the United States, about two-thirds of all the telephones in the world. Russia has only 1.5 million. The telephone system is prepared to fulfill all of the everyday requirements as well as to meet any emergency.

Oil which has been termed the lifeblood of modern warfare is in abundant supply for all purposes. The United States produces 1.8 billion barrels annually, 54 percent of total world output. Russia's annual production is only 240 million barrels, and 80 percent of this comes from the Caspian Sea, a region that

is vulnerable to our bombers.

Last, but not least, our research laboratories are operating on an unprecedented scale. Business concerns are now spending annually \$750 million on research projects. From these scientific establishments come powerful munitions as well as new materials, new processes and better methods.

The basic industries of the country, together with the transportation, communication and research facilities, are in excellent shape. Our one weakness is the unsound financial policy of our Government. Through its wasteful and reckless expenditures we are seriously impairing the margin of financial safety and undermining our national security. While privately-owned business is keeping our powder dry, our Government is playing into Stalin's hands, whose aim is to see us so weaken our economic system that we will not be able to defend ourselves when the final showdown comes.

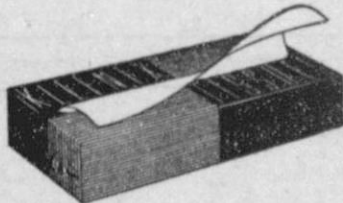

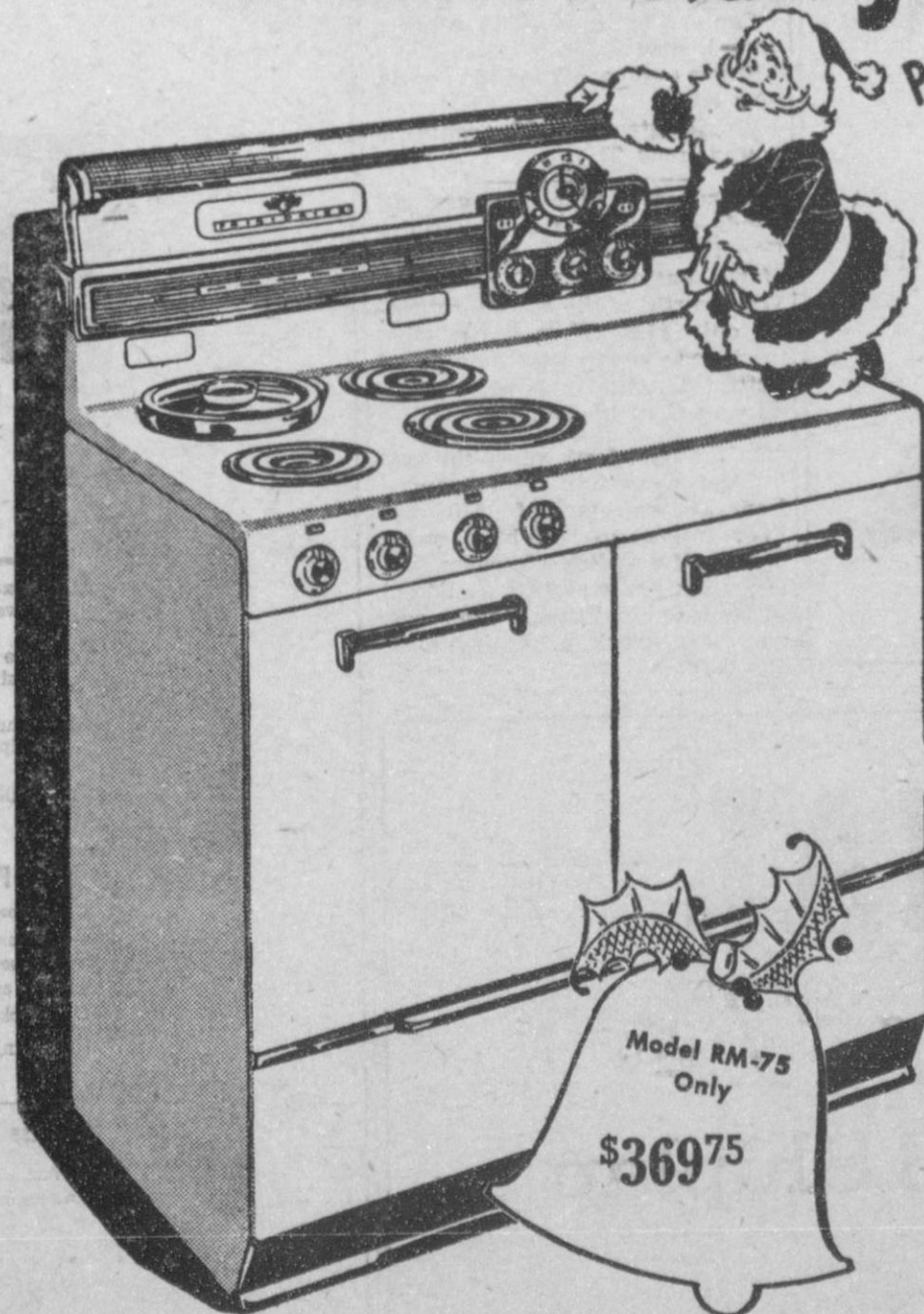

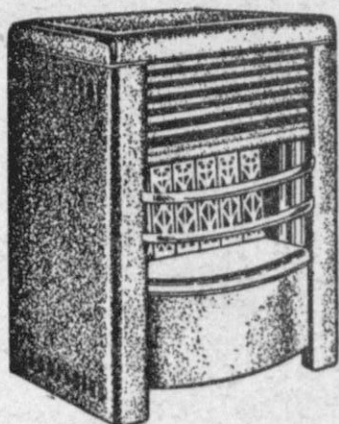

Reporter Compares Food Prices of 1933 With Those of 1950

Few people would care to swap this week's pay check for one in 1933.

But most people would like to go grocery shopping today at 1933 food prices.

Just for a lark, let's take prices on 17 food items you might have bought today and compare them with what you would have paid 17 years ago.

The cash register would ring up a total of \$13.33 for your list today. You would have shelled out only \$3.32 for the same items in 1933.

Here's the comparison:

Round steak — 10 cents a pound in 1933, now it's 99 cents.

Butter — 17 cents per pound then, 70 cents now.

Eggs — 16 cents a dozen, now 62.

Coffee — 25 cents a pound, now 89.

Potatoes — 17 cents for 10 pounds, now 39.

Lamp chops — four cents a pound, now 99.

Tomato juice — two 46-ounce cans for 15 cents; now 46.

Peach halves — two 2½ for 27 cents, now 58.

Shortening — four-pound carton 27 cents, now 98.

Sliced bacon — 12½ cents a pound, now 49.

Rump roast — 19 cents per pound, now 79.

T-bone steak — 25 cents a pound, now \$1.15

Center cut ham — 19 cents a pound, now \$1.10.

Sugar — 49 cents for 10 pounds, now 89.

Sirloin steak — 23 cents a pound, now 97.

Dairy cows that averaged 200 pounds of butterfat in the Dairy Herd Improvement Associations of the nation in 1949 consumed \$131 worth of feed and returned only \$121. Thus a cow that produced only 200 pounds of butterfat actually cost the producer a loss of \$10.

In the past forty years the cost for tire wear has been reduced from an average of \$10 per 1,000 miles to slightly more than half a dollar. However, unless tires are watched and kept in sound condition, the cost may be a wreck, a hospital stay, or a life!

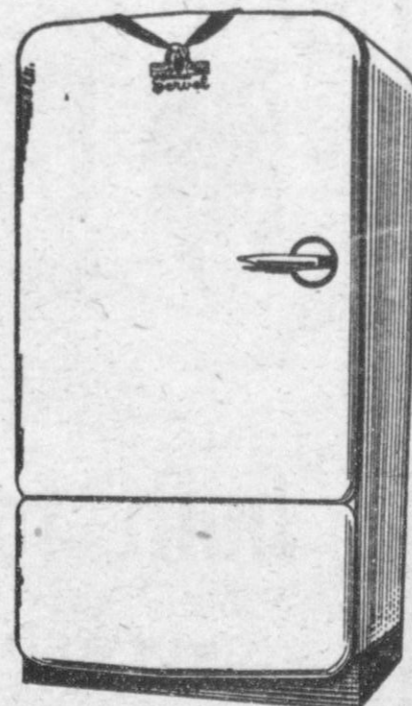

Warfarin Appears To Be Best Poison For Rats and Mice

COLLEGE STATION, — Warfarin, a new rat killer released by the University of Wisconsin Research Foundation, appears to be one of the most effective poisons available for the control of rats and mice.

The active ingredient of the new poison is coumarin, a compound found in sweetclover which affects the clotting of blood, says J. E. Poore, assistant district leader for the Rodent Control Service. Rats that have eaten warfarin baits for several days become less active, develop internal hemorrhages, and slowly bleed to death.

Poore says that one advantage of warfarin over many of the other rat poisons is that it is odorless and tasteless. Rats will continue to eat the bait until they die without detecting the presence of the poison. Another advantage lies in the safety with which it can be used on the farm. Warfarin is poisonous to all warm-blooded animals, but the amount recommended for controlling rats and mice is so small that there is little danger of farm animals or people being poisoned accidentally.

Even though warfarin is considered an extremely safe rodent poison, Poore warns that the usual precautions should be taken to prevent accidental poisonings on the farm.

For the poison to be effective, it is necessary for rats to eat warfarin baits over a period of five or more successive days. Grain or cereal type baits, which are not readily eaten by cats and dogs may be mixed with the poison, thus reducing the possible danger of poisoning these farm pets.

Warfarin is now on the market under the trade names of various chemical companies. Poore cautions that the warfarin baits should be mixed according to the manufacturer's instructions.

According to Poore, mixed bait can be secured in 100 pound lots from the Rodent control service fieldmen and county agricultural agents and representatives of other public service organizations can order the new poison.

Farmer's Almanac Predicts Cold Winter

The Old Farmer's Almanac (established in 1792 and published at Bublun, New Hampshire) hangs by a string in the kitchens of thousands of U.S. farm homes — and farmers place exceptional reliance on the Almanac's long-range weather forecasts. The Almanac tries to be as cheerful as possible about the weather, but its prediction for this winter chills the bones. The Almanac says (and you can feel for yourself how it turns out, that this winter will be colder than most, and will bring a "full share of rain and snow." Tongue-in-cheek editors of the Almanac attribute — or, rather, pass the buck — to one Abe Weatherwise, a guesser quite fictional but durable enough to have lasted as long as the Almanac itself. Back in 1947, Abe's forecasts were compared with the U.S. Weather Bureau's five-day predictions. Abe was right 78.5 percent of the time, the Weather Bureau 65.6. An earlier comparison gave the official forecasters a slight edge.
