PLEASE! Leave Streets and Phones Clear When Fire Alarm Sounds

When you hear the fire signal don't call the telephone company to ask where the fire is and don't go rushing to the fire. Increasing traffic on streets and telephone lines has prompted both the phone company and the fire department to ask for more cooperation from local residents.

Operators at the telephone office state that their switchboard lights up like a Christmas tree immediately after the fire alarm blows. People by the dozens call in to ask where the the Democratic party, however, fire is, cluttering the phone service at the very time when operators are most likely to be needed for emergency calls.

The same applies to automobile traffic. Dozens of people jump into their cars and rush to the fire causing a traffic problem that invariably hinders the efficiency of the firemen. Frequently cars get ahead of the fire truck and delay its arrival at the fire. Just as frequently they park between the fire and the first hydrant, delaying men who stretch the water hose. Besides they delay some of the firemen who go to the fire in their own cars.

Accordingly the fire department and telephone company join in an urgent request to curb curiosity and give both a chance to give full attention to the emergency. Phone lines should be left open for the benefit of firemen who may have to inquire where to go or for reporting possible injuries. Likewise curious traffic should leave the streets clear for firemen.

Sicking, who is milking 30 cows and selling to the Borden Company, has discovered that dairying not only offers steadier returns than conventional row cropping systems, but that soil erosion is much easier controllcan be used either as temporary or permanent pasture.

The breeding fees on my entire herd will amount to less than the cost of keeping a male on my farm."

Mr. Sicking has been using the services of the Cooke County artificial breeding association since November 1, 1949, according to Jack Barnhart, technician for the group. He now has 30 cows artifically bred and 5 artifically sired heifers on the ground.
