Those fires have endangered livestock, farm and ranch buildings and destroyed dry grass that must be replaced with hay. This however is not the great-

From the Range Conservation standpoint a burned pasture is a loss that cannot be regained. A good rancher knews that onehalf of the year's growth of grass left on the land is like money in the bank. The grass mulch aids in controlling erosion, increases water intake of soils, and for several reasons means a larger production of forage grasses the next year.

Danglmayr Brothers have deferred grazing for full growing season several years in a row on one of the pastures at Valley Creek. The grass was getting thick and growing tall. Old cultivated fields had become covered with grass, and erosion had about stopped on them. Because of the carelessness of some unknown trespasser much of the good has been undone.

Earl Robison, Raymond Davidson and Bruno Fleitman have reseeded old cultivated fields to native bluestem grasses. The young seedlings were just large enough to find in the needle grass. You guess what a hot fire did to these seedings.

Thirteen ranchers in the Muenster Work Unit area planted 657 acres of native grass on old fields and pastures with poor grass cover this year. These seedings came up to good stands but the young grass is still small and hard to find. Where fire has hit these plantings, the job will have to be done over. #### Texas Polio Toll Reaches New High

A twenty per cent increase over the record 1949 total of polio cases is indicated for Texas this year on the basis of official figures.

According to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Texas will have over 2,800 new cases of polio in 1950.

Texas reported 2,684 cases up to November 18. During November and December in 1949, the state had 217 new cases. The Foundation, using this as a basis of what to expect this year, says Texas will have more than 2,800 cases. The 1949 total was 2,355.

Meanwhile, Texas has received from the NFIP for patient care slightly more than \$322,708 more than the state sent in to the national headquarters during the last three years.

#### Fisher Herd Leads **DHIA** Production Record For October

The Cooke County Dairy Herd Improvement Association's report for the past two months, released this week by Technician John J. Hoffman, shows Paul Fisher's herd in the lead for October and Richard Frasher's herd leading for November. In addition, Bell of the Fisher herd was the second high producing cow in October with a BF content of 71, and Dish, also of the Fisher herd, was second for the month of November with a BF content of 57, tieing with a cow in the Frasher herd, which also included the champion producer both months, averaging 73 and 65.

In October 10 herds containing 179 cows were tested. The figure jumped to 11 herds and 202 cows in November. During the first month 37 cows produced 40 pounds of BF or over and during the second month four more cows joined the 40 BF producers for a total of 41. The average pounds of milk per cow during October was 600; during November 580. The average BF per cow was the same during the two month, 26.

October figures show three Muenster members with 9 cows in the 40 or over bracket as follows: Paul Fisher, seven, 47 to 71; Joe Fisher, one, 40; J.W. Fleitman, one 42.

The November summary lists 11 Muenster cows in the 40 or above class as follows: Paul Fisher, nine, 41-57, and Henry Pick, two, 42-44.

#### Profitable Return Stressed in Study Of Pasture Grasses

COLLEGE STATION - Profitable returns is the idea being stressed in the pasture improvement investigations that are now being conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, says Dr. R. C. Potts, associate professor of agronomy in charge of forage investigations.

Recent experiments show that pastures produce as much livestock feed per acre as high yielding corn or sorghums on comparable land, according to Dr. Potts. He says that improved pastures produce total digestible nutrients equal to a .75 or 80 bushels per acre corn crop. On irrigated land, as far as cash income is concerned, pastures compare favorably with cotton.

Studies of comparative costs of digestible nutrients from pastures is \$1.26; from hay, \$1.74; from silage, \$2.07; and from concentrates, \$4.23. Dr. Potts points out also that the return per man hour of labor is much higher than from cultivated crops— six times as much as from corn and nine times as much as from oats.

Dr. Potts states that success in today's improved pasture programs depends upon the use of correct pasture plants. The new ing machine. Bur-clovers, crimson clover, white clover, perennial lespedeza, and new introductions such as coastal Bermuda hold special promise for pastures in Texas. Even Johnson grass, traditional scourge of the cotton fields, is a good pasture plant when combined with certain legumes and properly fertilized and managed.


Planting shotgun mixtures of 15 to 20 grasses and legumes at high seeding rates, hoping to obtain a stand of the suitable plants, is a poor practice, says Dr. Potts. He says that simple mixtures, usually one grass and one legume, are all that are necessary to do the job. Specific information regarding suitable pasture mixtures are available through the local county agent's office and other farm

Dr. Potts adds that plenty of fertilizer is another must for productive pastures. Large initial applications may be necessary to insure good stands of the desirable pasture plants. Additional applications will also be needed after the pasture is established to replace nutrients removed from the soil.

Grassland management begins with a farm-wide plan to fit livestock needs and make full use of soils and climate, says Dr. Potts. Although the plans may differ from farm to farm, they have certain features in common. Here again is a chance to ask for assistance from local agricultural experts in planning a program that is fitted to the farm, the land, and to the


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
