There are scoffers, of course, who ridicule opinions like this. Too many self-satisfied wise guys and intellectual four-flushers in this country like to pretend that it's smart to get along without God, even though nature, the prophets and the great thinkers of history all agree that it's absurdly silly. And this isn't preaching, but basic every day common sense.

It's discouraging to note that a fine start in that direction a year or two ago has been permitted to fade out. For a while quite a number of big games opened with a minute of silent prayer. This year, so far as we know, only one large school continues the practice. Something should be done to revive the custom. After all it wasn't just a passing fad, but a wonderful idea.

If there was any doubt before that Speaker Sam Rayburn is primarily a party politician, the question was settled once and for all by his speech before the Southern Governors' Conference Monday night. Rayburn called on southern Democrats to be loyal to the party in the next election regardless of nominees. He's asking us to perpetuate the administration which has made a practice of insulting and abusing every southern state on the feeble pretext that a Republican majority would remove a few Democratic politicians from influential positions. More specifically he might have urged that we southerners continue submitting to political slavery in order to let Sam Rayburn continue riding his gravy train.

Hunters Killed 160 Texans During 1950

Austin, Texas-As the hunting season gets underway Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, urges caution in handling firearms. More than 160 Texans were killed in 1950 as a result of carelessness in handling guns. At a time like this it is more than ever important that we should conserve human life whenever possible.

"It is not enough to deplore the waste of human lives caused by the careless handling of firearms," asserts Dr. Cox, "we should learn from the deaths of these victims the lessons of safety which will prevent this needless and shocking waste. With the price of meat at the present high level there is a possibility of more hunters going into the field than ever be-

The State Department of Health gives the following suggestions in handling guns:

While hunting to be sure that the loaded gun is on safety until ready to fire.

Never shoot without seeing your target clearly. Never crawl through a fence

carrying a gun. If hunting with a companion

stay close to him. Do not strike the ground or

a wounded animal with the butt of a loaded gun.

Never scuffle while holding a loaded gun or point it at a person "for fun." Always unload a gun before

attempting to clean it. Always unload guns before taking them into camp or houses. All guns should be carefully put away in the home out of reach of small children.





Austin-Public Safety Director Homer Garrison Jr., reminds Texas motorists that their licenses to own or operate an automobile will be suspended if they are involved in a traffic accident and fail to meet damage claims up to \$15,000 when the state's new Motor Vehicle Safety Responsibility Law becomes effective on January 1.

Director Garrison points to the rapidly increasing number of traffic accidents and public indignation over the failure of motor vehicle owners and operators to pay for the damage they cause through negligence ments within 60 days after filing as the reasons that prompted the legislature to enact the law. which closely follows safety responsibility statutes in 34 other states. The law's primary objectives are to deny all motoring privileges to owners or operators who do not meet just damage claims resulting from accidents and to put chronic accident causers off of the highways permanently.

In a carefully summarized explanation of the law's principal features, Director Garrison explains its operation as follows:

The operator of every motor vehicle that is involved in an accident resulting in death or injury to a person, or property damage to any one person exceeding \$100, must file with the Texas Department of Public Safety a new report in addition to the regular accident report that is now required by the state's Uniform Traffic Law. The regular accident report must be filed within 24 hours, but motorists have up to 10 days to file the new report form. Both reports are mandatory regardless of who caused the accident.

The law does not apply, except with respect to filing the new report form, to insured owners or operators, provided the insurance covers possible damage claims resulting from a traffic accident, up to \$15,000. Uninsured motorists will receive a notice from the Texas Department of Public Safety that they must deposit sufficient security to cover the damage they caused as determined by the department. This may range anywhere from \$101 to \$15,000, and the collateral may be in the form of cash or negotiable securities. The
