Destroyed was the kitchen and dinette at a loss estimated between \$1200 and \$1500. The loss was mostly covered by insurance.

The fire was discovered about 9:30 o'clock by 14-year-old Ruby Lee Wimmer who had fallen asleep while reading a book in the kitchen. When awakened by the heat and smoke she found the flames raging near the range and refrigerator. The cause of the fire has not been determined.

Near her, sleeping on a pallet on the kitchen floor were two of the Marcus Fuhrmann children. She hustled both children out of the house, then rushed to the dairy barn about 100 feet away to notify her parents and the Fuhrmanns who at the time were painting the interior of The Hornets, on the other the new building.

Returning to the house, the parents first concern was to get children and one Fuhrmann child who were sleeping in bedrooms. Some were in an upstairs room above the burning kitchen.




