

# H. J. Flusche, Son of Muenster Founder

Final rites for H. J. Flusche, 67, long-time resident of Mount Carmel were conducted Saturday morning at 9 o'clock at Mount Carmel Catholic church, five miles north of Electra. Flusche died Wednesday after suffering a heart attack. He was attending to chores at his home when he was stricken, terscheid, Pat Stelzer and and died a few minutes later. Mr. Flusche was a son of

Emil Flusche, one of the original founders of Muenster and Lindsay, Pilot Point and Mount Carmel. He lived at Lindsay as a boy and attended school there. He lived in Tulsa, Okla., for a while before settling at Mount Carmel in 1906. At the time of his death he

was still serving as president of the Wichita County school board, a position he had held since 1940. He was first elected to the board in 1934. Flusche was one of Wichita

Magdalen Noggler underwent county's leading advocates of tonsillectomy at the local soil conservation and is credited with having been the first farmer in the Electra district Frances Knabe, 13, daughter to build terraces on his farm. He was a member of the board tonsils removed at Gainesville of supervisors of Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District since it was organized in Billy Owens, 8 year old son 1945 and was chairman of the board at the time of his death. He also served in almost all of the various government agency offices that are open to farmers.

He is survived by his wife, three sons, three daughters, nine grandchildren, a brother, Albert Flusche of Electra and a sister, Sister Mary Lambertina of Milwaukee, Wis.

#### Upper Elm-Red Soil Conservation District News

It has been said that when people get together and exchange ideas, then there will be progress. It was for the purpose of exchanging ideas and acquiring new ones that a small group of farmers interested in soil conservation braved the 105 degree weather of August 16 to gather at the Joe Hoenig farm south of Muenster. The group witnessed actual terrace construction by a three-disc plow and by a two-disc Ford intergral plow.

After the terrace demonstration Otto Bynum, soil sceintist, address the group. He gave timely advice on ways and means of improving production on soils by increasing the level of organic matter in the soil and improving the soil structure. He stressed the fact that perennial grasses and deeprooted legumes are good soil conditioners and a means of destroying plow soles, so commonly found on farm land. soles are a layer of soil, found usually at a depth of four to six inches. These plow soles slow the entrance of water into the soil and even prevent plant roots from going down.

A water intake test was run. It clearly illustrated the soil conditioning effects of biennial sweet clover. Land that had grown biennial white sweet clover for sveeral years absorbed water seven times faster than adjoining land that had only grain and crops. This extra water storage capacity of a well conditioned soil goes a long way in preventing drought damage. attending Co-operators meeting were Joe Hoenig, Ed Sicking, John Haverkamp, Bud-

dy Reiter and John Kreitz. On Tuesday morning, August 28, another group of interested farmers met at the Tony Klement farm to see a terrace demonstration. Here the terraces were built with three-disc plow and a two-disc integral plow. After the demonstration the group went to the Hesse brothers' farm for a discussion on the effects of soil conditioning with grasses and legumes. Farmers present were Gene Klement, Alfons Hoenig, Joe and John Kleiss, Paul Fetsch, Al and Tony Hesse, Lawrence Martin, Walter Becker, Alfred Bayer, Tony Fleitman, and Dub Taylor and Ross Holligsworth, veterans vocational agricultur instructors of Muenster and Gainesville.

Tony Klement is building a mile and a half of terraces on his farm near Muenster. He is using a three-disc plow and the island method of terrace construction. The terraces empty onto a bermuda grass waterway.

Albert and Joe Danglmayr are using a whirlwind terracer to build terraces on their home place; and Eddie Fleitman is using a whirlwind plow to build terraces on the farm he operates north of Muenster.

Andy O'Connor, Hubert Felderhoff, Joe Hoenig and T. F. McKenzie have newly built ponds and are anxiously awaiting a rain to fill them with water.
