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## Sacred Heart High Gridders Play at Texarkana Sunday

Next week Tuesday landowners of Zone 3 of the Upper Elm-Red Soil Conservation District will get together to elect their representative on the district board of supervisors.

There hasn't been much hula-balo about the meeting. Just a reminder, but that's enough to impress farmers who are concerned about the future of agriculture in this community. They'll be there because they realize that the selection made on that day can be an important factor in determining soil saving and soil building progress of the coming years. It is even possible that their choice will determine whether agriculture in this area will become a mere struggle for survival or rise to greater heights than any of us have seen.

Of all the economic problems in this country none is more urgent than soil conservation. When we consider the present alarming loss of soil productivity against our increasing population we realize that we are approaching the time when the country will no longer be able to feed and clothe its people. It's a blunt reality that must be faced. The loss must be checked and productivity must be built up or some people not so many years hence will have to get by on less than they need.

As regards the local situation, we face the prospect of land deterioration to a point where it will no longer make a living for the man who works it. Fields can not stand the constant toll of erosion and continue to raise good crops. Without soil conservation and soil building this community's agricultural future is headed for the rocks.

Flood control is another consideration. Not a year passes but what millions of dollars worth of property, land and crops are destroyed by high waters. Not a year passes but what the government spends millions on enormous flood prevention projects. Usually the object is to stop the rampaging water after it has already washed thousands of tons of precious top soil off the land.

Soil conservation offers a better way to cope with that problem. It serves the double purpose of saving land and checking water at its source, before it has a chance to form a flood. This isn't just theory either. Experience has shown that a good soil practice will absorb much more moisture in the first place. Besides that it allows surplus water to run away slowly, not loaded with precious dirt.

Ask any man who has studied the subject. He'll tell you that a good land program on the average watershed is just as effective as the most elaborate flood control dam. And it's ever so much more practical because it uses rain and land as nature intended them to be used.

All these factors have a bearing on next week's election of a local representative on the board of supervisors. It is to the community's interest to see that he will be a man of vision and enthusiasm, a man who will see what should be done, inspire the greatest possible number to join in the good work, and use the facilities at his disposal to assist in putting the best possible program on the ground.

This is not intended to imply that the meeting will have to look for a Superman who can carry out a wonderful program by himself. But it does want a capable leader to work along with all the other fellows who also understand how very much the soil saving and soil building program means to each individual and the community.

Here's hoping that lots of people will realize how much is at stake. That will insure a good meeting and a good choice.

To our way of thinking, Secretary of State John Ben Shepherd is more than a little out of line when he suggests that the State Democratic Executive committee adopt rigid rules to insure party loyalty and punish bolters. While his idea would be fine for the party it would be tough on us citizens and on every candidate who does not

## 63 Children Enroll In Saint Charles School for Colored

With deepest gratitude to all who have contributed toward the Saint Charles Catholic School of Gainesville, Father Peter Molloy advised this week that the new institution is off to a fine start with an enrollment of 63 colored children. The school, started this September, is the county's first parochial school for colored children.

About \$800 given by members of the Gainesville, Muenster, Lindsay and Valley View parishes enabled the school to make its start and Father Molloy is hopeful that help will continue until it is self supporting.

At this time the only charges made are \$1 per month for utilities and \$1 per school year for textbook rental.

The school has two lay teachers who work under the supervision of the Sister Superior of Saint Mary's Parochial school. Father Molloy gives instructions in religion every morning.

The Dallas Diocesan Council of the National Council of Catholic Women held its fourth annual convention Monday and Tuesday in Denison with clergy members, delegates and representatives from the area in attendance. Mrs. J. M. Weinzapfel of Muenster was general chairman of the convention which had as its theme "Faith and Service . . . For God and Country".

Among featured speakers on Monday were Rt. Rev. Msgr. W. J. Bender of Dallas, diocesan moderator, who spoke on "Faith and Service for God"; Mrs. Jack Wolf of Texarkana, diocesan council president, who in her address said: "Our aim is to bring all Catholic women into Catholic Action"; Mrs. Charles Faust of Fort Worth; Mrs. J. S. Adams of Dallas whose subject was "Faith and Service for God and Country Through the Study of the Bible"; Mrs. Arthur Hill of Dallas; Mrs. Howard Wiehern of Denton, and Mrs. T. F. 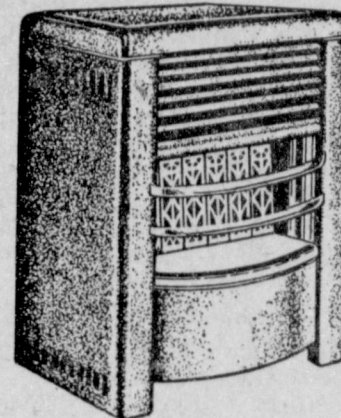

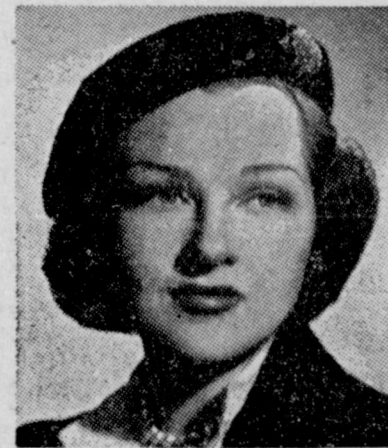

### The Foundations of Morality

A long time ago a man with considerable wisdom penned the following line: "The foundations of morality are like all other foundations: if you dig too much about them the superstructure will come tumbling down." As I've traveled back and forth across the country on speaking engagements in recent months, many anxious people have asked the question: "What is happening to the morality of our country?"

It is heartening to find such anxiety being expressed in many sections of the nation, for its presence suggests that in the main our American society still is wholesome. It also suggests that those in public and private life who chose to disregard a code of ethics based on high moral principals may not continue endlessly to enjoy public respect and personal good fortune. However, until this anxiety becomes more widespread and provokes remedial action there exists a very clear threat to the whole moral structure of our nation.

#### Changing moral values

But to get to the question of "What's happening . . . ?" Gen. MacArthur, in his Boston speech, said that much of the injury to our moral foundations could be traced to Communists and their dupes. He said, "(They) seek through covert manipulation of the civil power and the media of public information and education to pervert the truth, im-

pair respect for moral values . . . and in the end destroy our faith in our religious teachings."

This calculated campaign has already obtained some acceptance for a code of behavior that fixes no penalty on dishonesty and dishonor. This fact is made startlingly clear by the series of scandals centering in the nation's capital, and the tolerant attitude of a great many people toward these scandals. Dishonest public officials are the best helpers the Communists have. Every dishonest or dishonorable act of a national office holder which is publicized in the press exposes the character of every boy and girl in America to serious and lasting injury. And it weakens the moral strength of every adult citizen, impairs his respect for moral values.

#### Documental Immorality

On my desk is a collection of newspaper and magazine articles sent to me by worried people who are asking the question, "What's wrong . . . ?" On top is an article entitled "The Scandalous Years" published in LOOK Magazine. The heading reads: Washington's political scandals, breeding on friendships, favoritism and frauds, have made shocking news, quickly forgotten. The record stamps these as years of immorality, corruption — the shameful era of Pendergastism in Washington."

This shocking 5,000-word article is not partisan. It was written by two highly objective Washington reporters and no one, to my knowledge, has challenged the authenticity of a single one of its long list of sordid facts involving the very highest public officials. Yet it has created only a ripple of reaction among our citizenry.

#### The Indictment

A newspaper clipping from the Arkansas Gazette of August 28 is headed: "Corruption

## "I Am Not A Religious Man. However..."

A Marine in Korea wrote a letter, and mailed it to the Rev. James Keller in New York. His ardent desire is, as he put it, "to tell each and every American . . . to take an interest — a real live interest — in his government." To help this young marine fulfill his desire, here is his letter:

"I have just finished reading the Christopher book 'You Can Change the World'. I found it one of the most interesting and informative books I have read in quite some time. At this time when it seems that the decent peoples of the world are waging a losing struggle against those that would enslave the world, your book did wonders for my morale.

#### Marine Prays Often

"Although I am not of the Catholic faith I agree wholeheartedly with your opinions. I realize that the Church is the prime factor that will bind the free people of the world together. I am not a religious man. However I feel that the world today needs God more than it ever did and that His guidance is as important as any material aid that might be rendered.

"Believe me when I say that I have prayed often since I have been in Korea for guidance and I have found comfort in the fact that my prayers have been answered. A man in the field has faith in himself when he knows that he is being led by a Force greater than all the might of the enemy combined.

#### Reason For Success

"When our division was trapped in the North a few weeks ago I found that the men in my pla-



toon had all said a prayer for our 'buddies'. It is history now, but the withdrawal of the troops in that sector was a great feat. I know in my heart that there was a Supreme Commander in charge of that operation and it was a success.

"During the past five months I have had the opportunity to see and talk to people who have lived under the heel of the Kremlin and I only wish I could express to the people at home the impression it left on me.

"I am not a flag waver. But I feel that what I'm doing here as a Marine is the right thing to do at present. However, it isn't enough. And because I'm not in a position to express myself to a large group of people I feel something lacking. If it were possible to tell each and every American what I have witnessed in Korea and how important it is for all the people at home to take an interest — a real live interest — in his government, I would have completed at least one task.

"What's happening over here must never happen in our country. But, as you so vividly point out, unless we do something about it, it can happen in the United States."

in Government Called Worst in All History." A "Fair Deal" Congressman is quoted: "Never in our history has our government been so venal, so degraded, so corrupt as it is now." An editorial in the St. Louis Globe Democrat is entitled: "Low Estate of Public Morals." It says, "The youths such as the West Pointers (discharged for cheating) have grown into manhood in an environment of 'take-it-where-I-find-it.' They are the unpretty fruit of the mistakes of the past two decades."

There are clippings from the St. Louis Post Dispatch alleging "influence peddling" by the national chairman of one of the major political parties; from a Washington paper reporting the RFC scandals and facts about the mink coat worn by a White House secretary; etc. In all there are 22 clippings reporting dishonest and dishonest acts that strike damaging blows against the foundations of morality in America.

Honor is the backbone of Christian civilization. If we permit the vertebra to decay one by one, man's ability to go forward, toward higher human attainment, will be destroyed. And must we not also realize, before it's too late, that so long as they are condoned these dishonorable and dishonest acts now transpiring in high places must stand as an indictment—before the world and before God—of all of us?

## The Japanese Priest Said: "DOMINUS VOBISCUM"



It was early Sunday morning in Tokyo. A cosmopolitan congregation had assembled in the Catholic church for the first Mass of the day. Along with the Japanese present, there were English, French and Portuguese sailors, the family of a Belgian diplomat, Filipino business men and a sprinkling of U. S. Military Police.

The Japanese priest was compelled to start the service without an assistant to answer the prayers. He had hardly begun the Mass, when a burly GI rose from his seat, walked to the altar and took the place of the absent server.

"At first," he said afterwards, "I felt a little strange serving a Jap priest in a Jap church. But after he turned around and said in Latin: 'Dominus vobiscum' . . . I felt just the way I did when I served Father O'Malley in our church back home."

"Dominus vobiscum!" . . . "The Lord be with you!"

Instead of demanding more party loyalty the Secretary of State should be telling the people of Texas that they are
