

A Marine in Korea wrote a letter, and mailed it to the Rev James Keller in New York. His ardent desire is, as he put it, "to tell each and every American . . to take an interest - a real live interest - in his government." To help this young marine fulfill his desire, here is his letter:

"I have just finished reading the Christopher book 'You Can Change the World'. I found it one of the most interesting and inwhen it seems that the decent a losing struggle against those that would enslave the world, your book did wonders for my morale.

Marine Prays Often

"Although I am not of the Catholic faith I agree wholeheartedly with your opinions. I realize that the Church is the prime factor that will bind the free people of the world together. I am not a religious man. However I feel that the world today needs as any material aid that might be rendered.

"Believe me when I say that I have prayed often since I have been in Korea for guidance and I have found comfort in the fact that my prayers have been answered. A man in the field has faith in himself when he knows that he is being led by a Force greater than all the might of the enemy combined.

"When our division was trapped in the North a few weeks ago I found that the men in my pla-
