

Early this year the Association of Casualty and Surety Companies published statistics indicating that 1951 would probably bring both the county's millionth war death and the millionth traffic death.

More statistics just released by the Assoication reveal that the millionth American service man has lost his life. According to its estimate he fell early in September, probably on Labor Day. According to another estimate the millionth traffic death can be expected some time in December, assuming that American drivers will continue their normal average of traffic slaughter.

An even more shocking comparison is that of all war and traffic deaths since the Korean war started on June 25, 1950. According to the Defense Department, combat deaths through August 31 numbered 13,707. According to the Association, traffic deaths during the same period numbered over 44,000.

All of us are deeply concerened about the fighting in Korea. We are shocked by the agony and death of war but we are so tragically unimpressed by a more shocking slaughter that goes on every day back here at home. We kill more than three times as many people accidentally as our enemies kill on purpose. We fret and complain when loved ones die for their country but we hardly give it a second thought when other loved ones die for no good reason whatever.

Pink on Pork May Mean Trichinosis

As the weather turns cooler hog trichinosis comes from hogs our thoughts turn to pork roast eating uncooked garbage. dinners, or perhaps to waffles and sausage suppers. Pork is a palatable food, rich in protein, fat and vitamins. Properly prepared, it is a wise choice of food. Properly cooked pork is gray throughout. Under-cooked pork is pink in color and should not be eaten because it is a common source of the disease trichinosis, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health officer.

"You are perfectly safe from this disease as long as you eat of hogs that did not have trichinosis when butchered. But, the danger is real as long as you buy pork and pork products



"This disease is caused by a tiny parasitic, round worm called trichina. It has a particular fondness for the animals muscular tissue, and while still in the larval stage, becomes embedded there. It is usually in this stage when the animal is killed. People eating the meat without taking proper precautions swallow these larvae. From the mouth they go to the stomach. Then the larvae bore into the walls of the intestines. Here they grow rapidly and migrate blade tandem disc practically into the blood stream, causing new; 5 to 10-blade one-way fever, intense pain in the musbloodcell count.
