#### Soil Conservation Experts Speak at Agriculture Class

Vocational Agriculture students of Muenster Hi got a lesson directly from the experts last Friday morning when Clyde Wells, district conservationist of the Upper Elm Red district and Otto Bynum, soil scientist for the dictrict spent the 9 to 10:45 period with the class.

Mr. Wells pointed out the need for conservation in Texas and its importance to the welfare of the entire nation. Then he told students how conservation districts and zones are organized and administered and how conservation work units assist the farmers.

Mr. Bynum spoke and gave a demonstration on the use of clovers and grasses in a good conservation program. With charts and drawings of actual experiments he showed how hard pans may be broken up to let soil absorb more water and retain it for the use of growing plants. He also showed how soil of poor physical condition is more subject to erosion than soil with sufficient organic content. 
