Soil Conservation Notes

Now is the time to plant native grasses. Take a tip from Mother Nature. She has already put the seed for next spring's grass seedlings on the ground.

Cooperators of the Upper Elm-Red Soil Conservation District in the Muenster area have learned from past experience that old field areas, depleted rangeland and lay-out areas, can be successfully seeded to the native grass mixture of little bluestem, big bluestem, Indian and switch grass. They have also learned that the best seeding time for native grasses is December, January and February

The District has native grass seed supplies and specially built grass drills for planting this seed. The seed may be purchased from the District at small cost, but is ear-marked for use in the Trinity Watershed. So only cooperators desiring to seed areas in the Trinity Watershed are eligible to purchase the grass seed. According to J. W. Hess, chairman of the District Board of Supervisors, the warehouse lease expires at the end of the year. He urges all cooperators who plan to plant native grass seed to get it this month so that the warehouse can be vacated.

Muenster's new public school building, which has been acclaimed by Texas school-men as one of the outstanding rural schools of the state, receives national recognition this month in a featured article in "The Nation's Schools," a magazine on school administration.

When a British magistrate, Charles Griffin, and Alexander Dallas confidently marched up to Cutler's cabin to serve an arrest warrant they were dumbfounded to find the cabin guarded by American troops.

"You have occupied British soil!" Dallas shouted. "This is American soil, sir,"

Captain Pickett replied.

Learning that American troops had occupied the island, James Douglas, governor of British Columbia, promptly ordered the warships Tribune and Plumper to the scene. He also sent a detachment of Royal Marines to land and occupy the island.

Faced by three warships, 2,000 men, and 167 heavy guns, Captain Pickett's position appeared hopeless, and he sent out a hurried call for reinforcements.
