Soil Conservation Notes

Wilfred Sicking is using his tractor and a two-disc plow to build three terraces in his upland field just west of his home. He is using the island method of terrace construction. By this method he will get a easy-to-cross modified channel type terrace that will protect his soil from erosion. The terraces outlet onto a pasture. Wilfred has sodded a bermuda grass waterway to provide outlets for terraces on the rest of the field after the grass is established.

Dr. T. B. Holland believes in covering the land with a carpet of green soil-improving crops. He has legume crops growing on practically all of his 503 acre farm northeast of Muenster. The farm presents a picture of contrasting colors as the different crops come into bloom. The land is covered with a conservation mixture of vetch, Madrid, Hubam, and Biennial white sweet clovers. Even the pastures and waterways have been overseeded to clovers and together with the grass they give a pleasing and healthy appearance.

King Ranch bluestem is setting its first seed crop now and prospects are good that a lot of seed will be put on the ground to thicken the stands. This erosion-resisting grass makes two seed crops each year. It will set more seed in the fall.

This is maintenance season for bermuda grass waterways. Unless taller growing grasses and weeds are removed, they shade and choke out the shorter growing grasses. Waterways should be mowed, grazed, or sprayed. Sometimes it becomes necessary to do all of these things to give the grass seedlings a chance.

Frank Needham is using a mower and spray to control the grass on the waterways he sodded on the Andress Estate.

Tom Ben Davis has mowed the waterway on the Howeth farm at Hood and Johnny Fleitman

has mowed his buffalo grass waterway. Albert Knabe has his waterway fenced and is grazing it to keep down the Johnson grass.

Electric fences are being used in some cases to allow gazing on waterways. Whatever the

means used, weeds and tall grasses must be kept down if waterways are to be established rapidly.

IT HAPPENED TO THE INDIANS

Several fictional books have been written in recent years dramatizing what lies in store for people when their welfare becomes the responsibility of a Welfare State. One of these books, "1984" by George Orwell, was on the best seller lists for several months. Yet it showed the final stages of the Welfare State's "planned society" to be so horrifying that its immediate effectiveness as a warning against the growth of the Welfare State in America was not great. Many Americans simply cannot believe that the enslavement depicted in "1984" could possibly grow out of little acts of government paternalism.

Truth is more powerful than fiction. Something effective against the Welfare idea of government paternalism is in print. It is not fiction, but truth. It is the printed text of an address made on the Senate floor by Sen. George W. Malone of Nevada appealing for the emancipation of the American Indian. Since he has lived near them, has witnessed the frustration of reservation Indians, and feels keenly their miserable plight as wards of the Federal government, Senator Malone is qualified to reveal the facts about the Indians' Welfare State.

Once Proud Race
The American Indians have been dependents of the Federal government for 125 years. During this century of dependency most of these people from a once proud, resourceful and ambitious race have lost their best characteristics. Many of the younger Indians of each succeeding generation have sought for their race freedom from the

equalizing, paralyzing clutches of Federal bureau paternalism. They have found, as has Senator Malone, that once a Federal bureau gets itself well established and develops a program of welfare functions, its political influence apparently is too powerful to overcome.

"The Indian Bureau," said Senator Malone, "was originally established to bring the advancements of civilization to the Indians. The original objective has long since been discarded, and new, multiple, and unexpected obligations have been assumed by the Bureau instead of providing conditions under which Indians could be educated, assimilated and trained to take their place among the citizens of the United States."

Chattels of Bureaucracy
Here are some important truths about the Indians whose kindly government proposed 125 years ago to briefly help them along and then make them free:

Today a restricted Indian cannot buy, sell, or lease property except with Indian Bureau consent; he cannot have access to his money deposited for him in the Federal Treasury except by act of Congress; he cannot engage in free and unrestricted business enterprise on the reservation because the Indian Bureau has its own specially sponsored corporations to handle business matters for the Indians; he is totally dependent upon the Indian Bureau when he is out of a job, sick, or when incapacitated by old age; he cannot buy, sell, or consume alcoholic beverages either on or off the reservation; if he should happen to be a war veteran he cannot, as a rule, obtain a loan under the GI bill of rights because his property is tied up in Indian Bureau trusteeship; for each individual Indian it takes in most cases a special act of Congress to be freed from the restrictions imposed by the Indian Bureau.

The Warning
"Government paternalism at its worst is strikingly exempli-

THERE ARE TIMES when Dad seems very like the Almighty Father.

From him comes the gift of life. He is God's associate creator. And how can we be grateful enough for the thousands and thousands of pure, fine American Fathers who have passed on the gift of human life, sound and clean, to their splendid children.

Like God he is the provider. Our homes are of his making. The food upon our table is of his providing. He has made possible that wonderful thing we know as the American Way of Life. There is no one finer.

LIKE GOD he gets little enough in return. Gratitude from his children is rare enough in his life. Yet like God he is not deterred by this from labor or love or planning. He gives without asking return. He works and is satisfied with the happiness that he provides his children.

May the Father in heaven bless these splendid Fathers on earth. —By Rev. Daniel A. Lord.

fied in the Bureau's relationship to the Indian," said Senator Malone. "It has undermined the confidence of the Indian in himself and in the Indian Bureau. If such supervision and censorship should have been exercised over the people of any other nationality in the United States their growth and individual de-

velopment would have been retarded in like manner."

Although the demand to abolish the Indian Bureau and emancipate the Indians has been made in Congress year after year and has failed because so few people are acquainted with or care about the Indians' plight, it is being voiced again this year. But Senator Malone is trying to arouse the public to the danger of any form of government paternalism. "The most difficult thing in the world," he emphasizes, "is to remove a system of any kind which is organized to supervise somebody and handle his money and property, so long as the money and the property hold out." Government today is taking an average of 32 per cent of the earnings of all American citizens. Its bureaus are proposing all kinds of "social aid" plans in return. Are we suckers

enough to fall for more of this? Take another look at what the government has done for the Indians!

Costly Urgency

The government's National Production Authority recently wanted some information from metal manufacturers. A Washington directmail firm offered to send out a questionnaire at a total cost of \$894, including \$600 for air-mail stamps, paper and processing costs.

NPA said no, and telegraphed the questionnaire to 11,000 firms—at a cost to the taxpayers of \$30,000. The extra cost of telegraphing was \$29,106—equal to the income tax paid by 196 men earning \$3,475 a year and each supporting a wife and two children.

That was when they decided they really didn't need the wall between them in the first place—so they simply stopped repairing it.

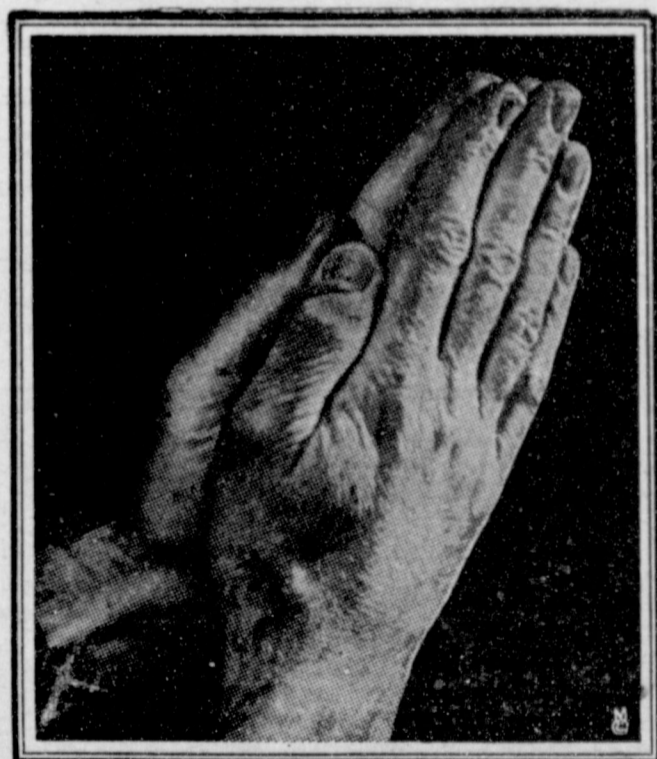
Now I hear where a fellow, who bought the old Johnson place, wants to buy all those stones. It seems he figures a stone wall is just what's needed on his property.

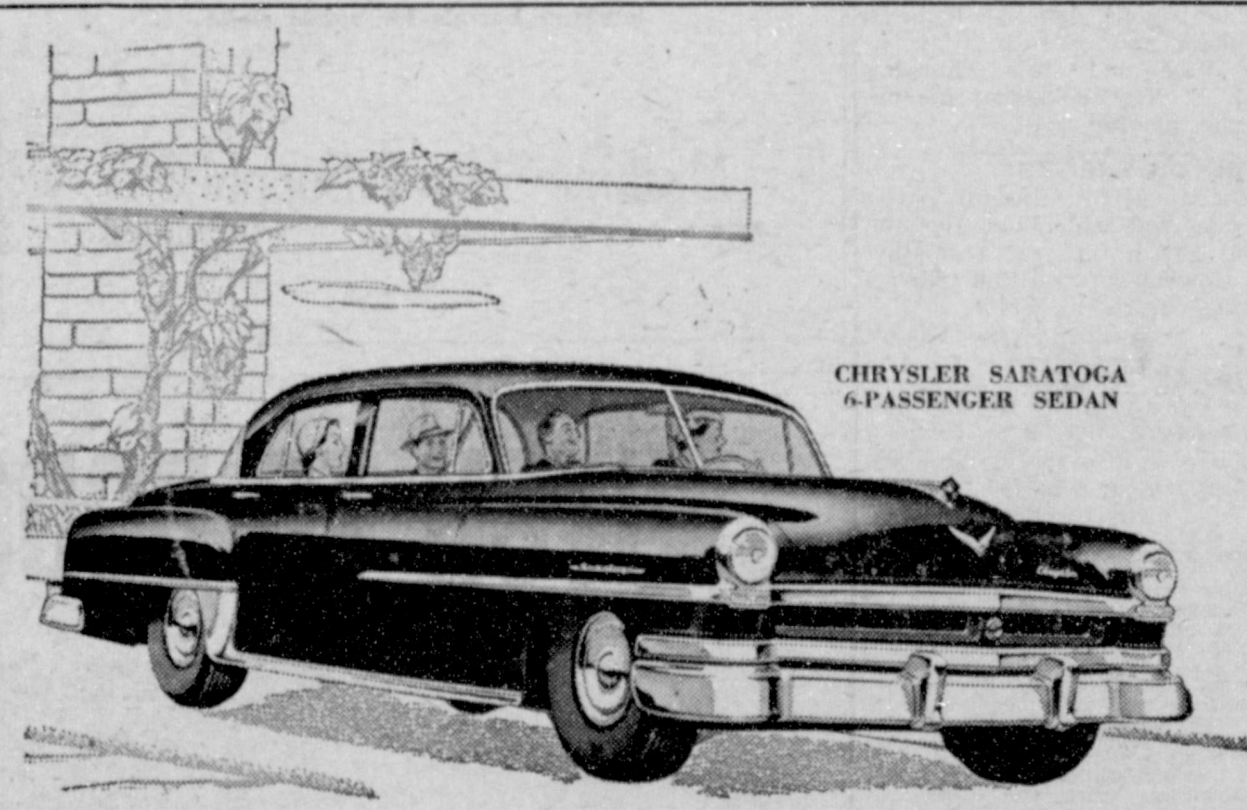

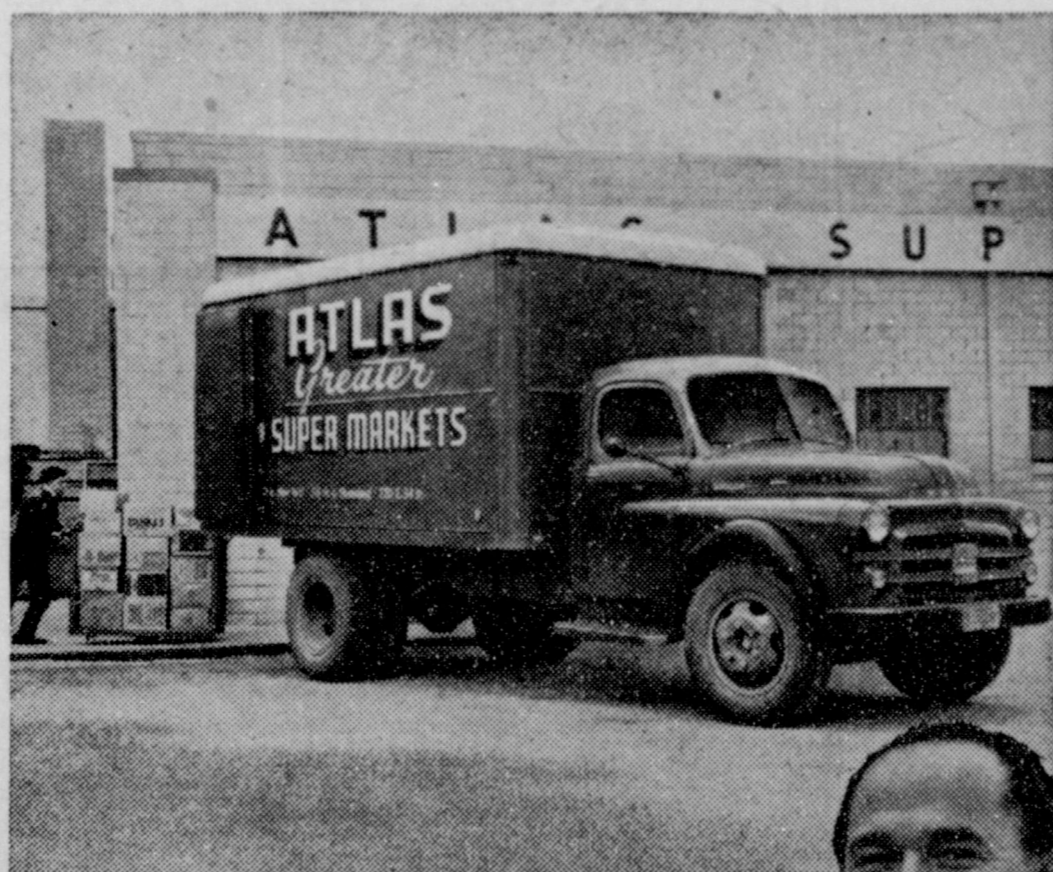

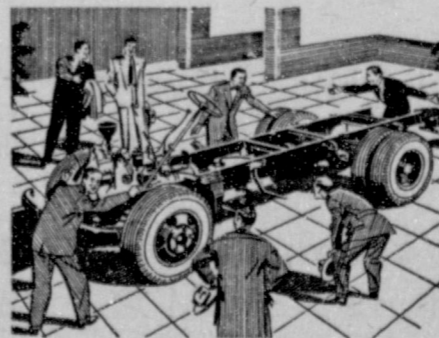
