

Muenster Schools Gain 26; Combined Enrollment is 603

Scholastic enrollment at the Muenster schools showed ancords show measures of .05 at other increase this year as combined figures jumped from 577

Of that figure 457 are in the parochial school and 146 are in the public school as compared with 429 and 148 respectively at the school opening last year.

Enrollments at both schools are due to increase slightly within the next week or two when several children, now caught by a minor epidemic of mumps, are

A breakdown of figures reveals a gain in both high school High gained 15 and Muenster High lost 4 for a net gain of 11. In the grade departments the parochial school gained 13 and the public school gained 2 for a net gain of 15.

The count in each school as revealed Wednesday afternoon is as follows: parochial high school 64, public high school 73, parochial elementary 393, public school elementary 73.

As in previous years, children of both schools are participating in the school lunch program, which is now under joint sponsorship of the Sacred Heart Parish and the Public School, with executive authority in the church committee and the school board.

Formerly sponsored by the Sacred Heart P-TA, the lunch program was taken over by the other organizations on the request of federal agencies which The joint sponsors engaged Mrs. Rudy Hellman to continue managing the program.

Uncle Sam Accused As Biggest Hoarder

WASHINGTON. - Uncle Sam was described Saturday as the biggest hoarder in the world by Representative Shafer of Michi-

"Uncle Sam has enough typewriter ribbons to last for decades." Shafer said in a statement. "He has enough desks to carry 4,000,000 people on the federal payroll instead of 2,000-

3 Texas Cities Use Check Tooth Decay

Ausin Texas - City fathers in three Texas cities, by artificially adding fluoride salts to their municipal water supplies, are making the dream of fewer tooth cavities come true.

Corpus Christi and Marshall have flouridation systems working now. Austin has one in the installation process.

If things go according to plan, children in these towns will be spared easily half the visits they now have to make to their family dentists, because they'll have fewer cavities.

State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox describes the fluoridation process as a "tremendous step forward in the fight against dental diseases. It's simple and inexpensive, as well as effective.

"It won't be a cure-all," cautions Dr. Edward Taylor, director of dental health at the State Health Department."It won't give children complete protection against tooth decay, but it will reduce decay from 23 to 47 per-

He said that range of reduction percentage had been established in departmental experiments

The addition of the chemical to drinking water in the ratio of 1 to 1.5 parts per million parts of water now has been recommended as a decay control measure by the United States Public Health Service, the American Water Works Association, and the Association of State and Territorial Dental Health Directors.

The couple has set September 18 as the wedding date. The ceremony will take place in St. Boniface church in Scotland at 8:30 a.m.


