



## Albert R. Address, 68, Dies Saturday At Home in Myra

Albert R. Address, 68, of Myra, well known livestock and wool buyer of this area for nearly 40 years, died at 4:30 a.m. last Saturday after a serious illness of several months.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 Sunday in the Myra Baptist church with Rev. P. T. Walker of Myra and Rev. C. M. Thomas of Gainesville officiating. Burial was in Reed Cemetery under direction of Geo. J. Carroll and Son Funeral Home. Bearers were John Fisher, A. C. Enderby, Ike Fulton, Byron Sears, Ernest Biffle and Jake Biffle.

Mr. Address was born on Dec. 25, 1884 in Trenton, Tex., and came to Cooke County with his family in 1895, settling on a farm in the Hays community north-east of Muenster. He was married to Miss Annie Jones of Hays on Nov. 10, 1907 and farmed in that area for several years before moving to Myra. Shortly after that he entered the livestock and wool buying business as a partner of Joe Fisher, Sr. Eleven years later J. A. Fisher succeeded his father in the partnership, which continued for another 26 years. Fisher and Address dissolved their partnership about two years ago when Address' health began to fail.

He is survived by his wife, two daughters, Mrs. H. L. Gay of Abilene and Mrs. H. L. Belew of Ada, Okla.; three brothers, J. C. and E. E. Address of Muenster and J. H. Address of Borger; two sisters, Mrs. Frank Needham of Muenster and Mrs. Bob Yarbrough of Wichita Falls; and four grandchildren. All the survivors were present for the funeral.

The prestige of both our president and our nation soared to new heights last week in that magnificent statement on world policy. Widespread... and seemingly unanimous... approval of leaders in both political parties and the country's press indicate that Eisenhower has presented an accurate statement on the country's sentiment. Likewise the absence of criticism, along with factual reporting, in Russian papers seems to indicate either that the Reds found no fault with the speech or that for reasons best known to themselves they choose not to make an issue of it.

We have every reason to be proud of the conditions which the president proposed as carrying out our ideals of a free and peaceful world. We heartily endorse a reduction of world armament, freedom of all satellite peoples, and an opportunity to divert some of the energies and resources now being spent on national defense into the more humane channels of world relief. It is hardly necessary to say that other people of the globe, both free and captive, are yearning for those same conditions.

At the same time we are pleased to note an attitude of firmness toward the Red leaders. We'll go for a disarmament plan on condition that the Communists, like ourselves, will submit to inspections to see that both sides are living up to the agreement. We'll call off the war provided the Commies will pull their police out of occupied countries and allow each country to set up its own government by free elections. In the president's words, "the new Soviet leadership now has a precious opportunity to help turn the tide of history. We welcome every honest act of peace. We care nothing for mere rhetoric. We care only for sincerity of peaceful purpose attested by deeds. What is the Soviet Union ready to do?"

With that the president offered his proposals for peace: the supervised world disarmament, a world fund supplied out of armament savings of all nations for schools, roads, hospitals, homes, food and health... a fund "to serve the needs rather than the fears of the world."

As regards the Korean war, he had one simple suggestion, the immediate cessation of hostilities and the prompt initiation of discussions leading to free elections in a united Korea.

There never was a clearer statement of policy. It tells exactly what we are willing to do and calls on the Kremlin either to come forward in a spirit of good will or admit to the world that its peace talk is nothing but lies.

Perhaps the most significant part of the speech is its implication that America will not budge an inch toward compromising its principles. Between the lines it seems to say we are dedicated to world freedom and will not enter any agreement which does not allow captive countries to throw off the communist yoke if they so desire. Russia has a choice of adopting the standards of civilization or provoking free mankind to the extreme of resisting its conquest... with atomic force, if necessary.

That's a sobering ultimatum, even to international gangsters. Fear of the consequences, if not decency, should motivate them to give it careful consideration.

But while the speech was being delivered there were other incidents which prompt us to wonder whether we can ever hope for honorable dealings with the Kremlin. At the very time Reds were using the caravan of sick and wounded UN prisoners of war to shield vast movements of munitions and supplies to the front. It is just another example of the contemptible lowness to which the Reds will stoop in their pretended honorable dealings. Most likely they are gleefully chuckling now that they will soon kill or cripple several UN soldiers for every one they are returning.

To make matters even worse, it begins to appear now that the reds are using this means to send back prisoners who have responded to communist indoctrination... using a supposed honorable deal to send subversives into this country. The name of one

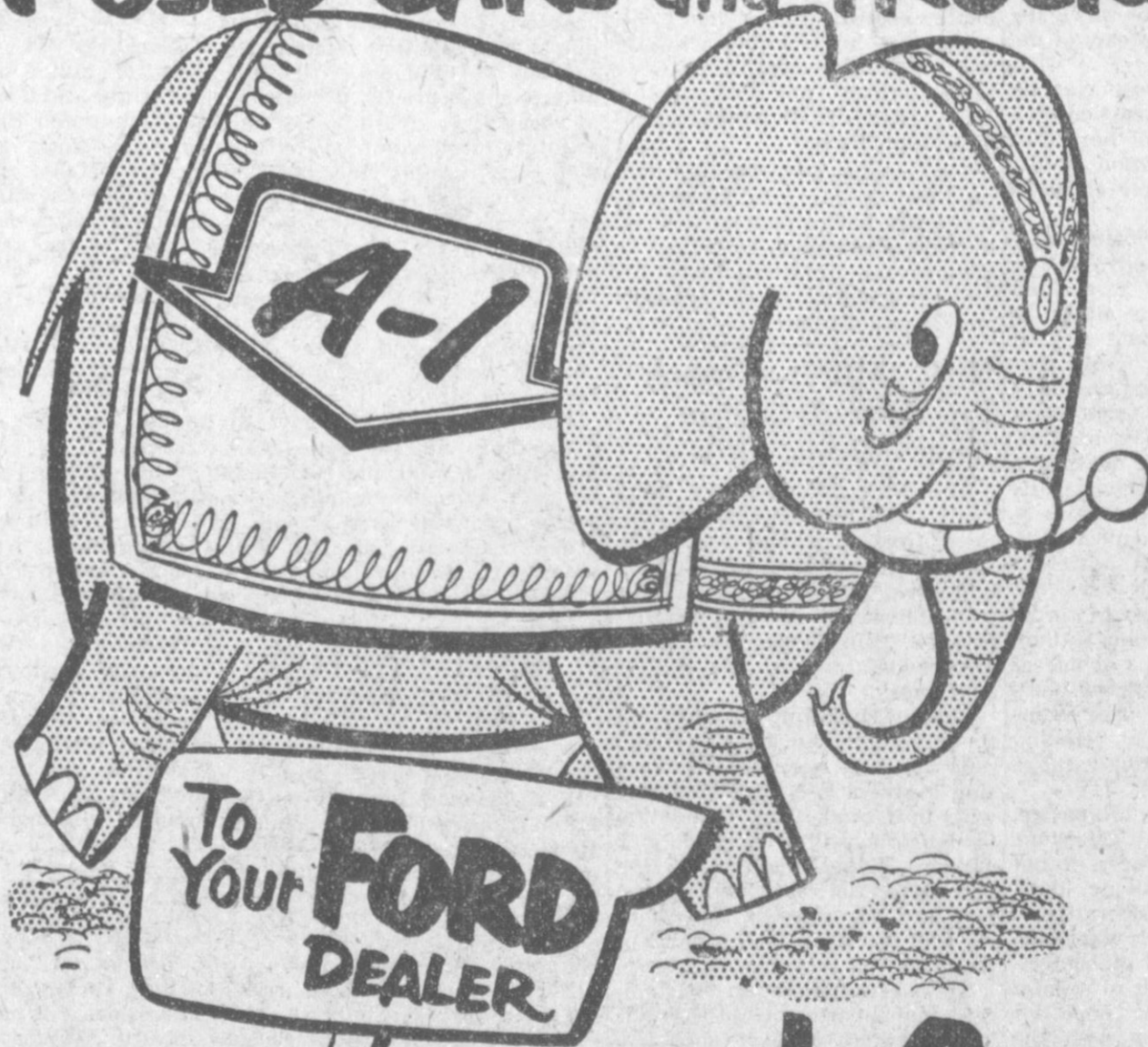

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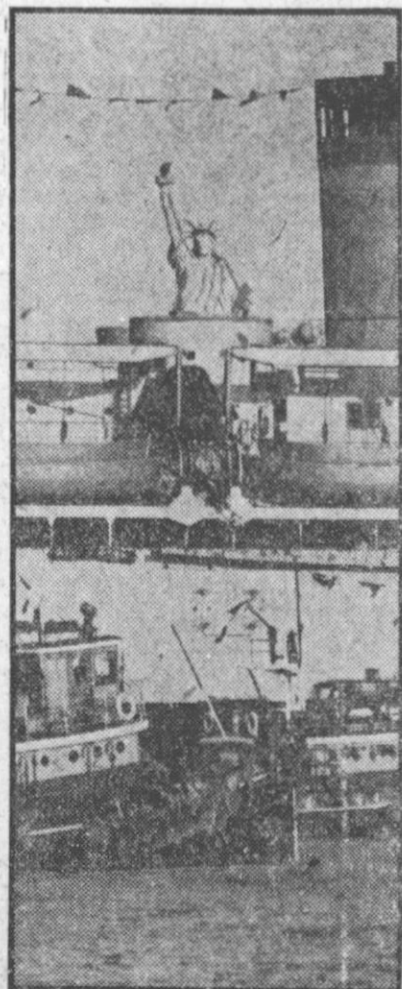

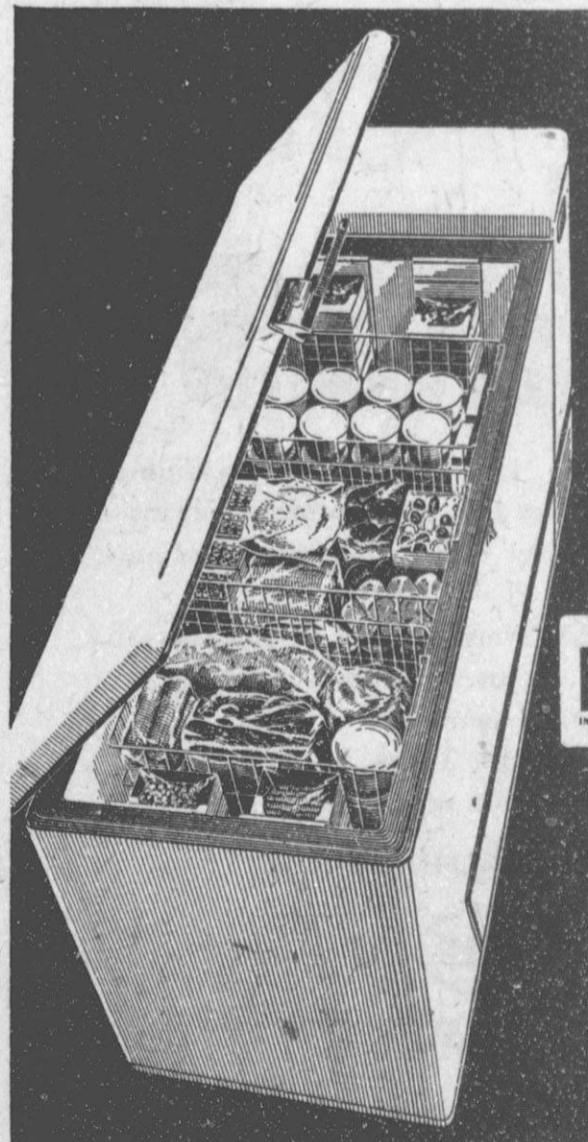

**SOCIAL AND INTERNATIONAL** justice can only be founded on the laws of Almighty God.

Either for God or against God. That is the fundamental choice our society and every unit within it must make. Upon that choice hangs the fate of the world.

**THE TEN COMMANDMENTS**, the most ancient laws ever designed to meet our most modern needs, are the guideposts of the Almighty.

They cover the full round of life's relationships—our duties to God, to self, to one another. More—they are the very backbone of that western civilization of which we, as a World Power, have so suddenly and dramatically become the custodians. That civilization, in its moral and ethical elements, has its stable vitality from the Ten Commandments which God Himself gave to Moses.

**ANALYZE** these Commandments and see the pattern of perfection that they unfold. They meet every contact between man and man, and regulate all the broader terms of every relationship. The first three solve the religious problems that trouble the world, above all the basic problem of man's place in the universe and his relationship to the Source of his life and rights.

1. "I am the Lord thy God. Thou shalt not have strange gods before Me.

2. Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain.

3. Remember that thou keep holy the Sabbath Day."

**THESE THREE COMMANDMENTS** recognize the right and duty to reverence, love, and worship God. Hence, if the Ten Laws of God guide and direct the rulers of nations, they cannot compel people to go the dark ways of atheism, nor force them into the worship of a state, a race, or any other created being.

In a society based on the Ten Commandments, authority must leave citizens free to worship only the God Who made them and Whom alone they are obliged to obey and adore.

**BANISHING GOD** from private, public, and international life, and substituting for God the State or any other idol, violates these Commandments of the Almighty.

If these three Commandments of the Law were observed by the rulers of nations there would be no religious problem; for the City of Man, rightly governed, would have no point of conflict with the City of God.

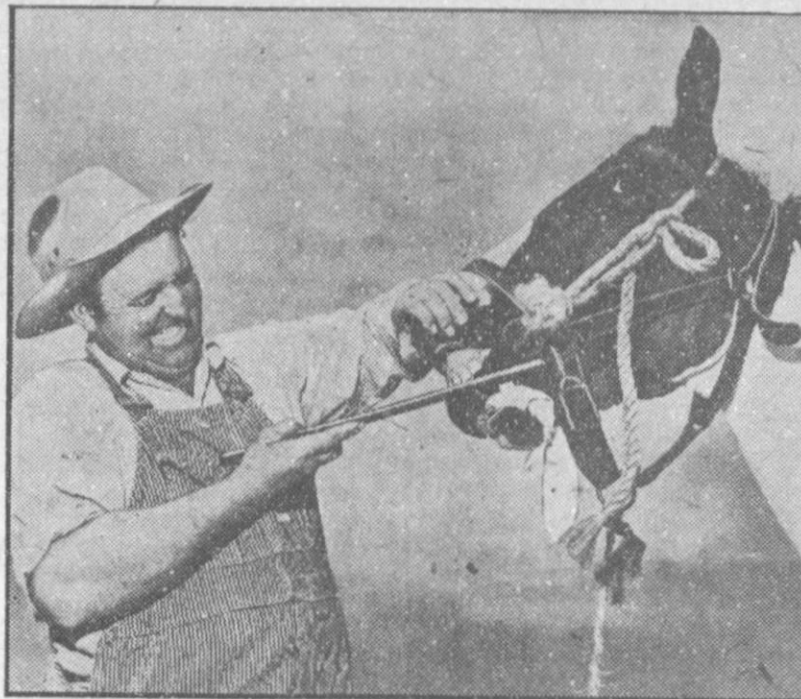

### Affiliation - - -

Goodson disclosed that their report would recommend continued affiliation but would also warn that affiliations are jeopardized by certain existing conditions, the most important of which is dissension. According to his explanation the Texas Education Agency is concerned with environment as well as scholastic excellence and does not feel that children can be properly educated when unpleasant conditions prevail.

His advice was that local people consider and solve their problems calmly, then cooperate for the mutual benefit of all whether they decide on a single or two separate systems. He also said that while the single system seemed to offer more opportunity at less expense there is no reason why separate systems operating harmoniously cannot thrive and hold their affiliation. In either of the local schools, he explained, affiliation can be maintained regardless of how low enrollment falls, provided facilities and scholastic excellence are kept up to standard. The reason is that neither school draws on state aid funds. One is supported by the parish and the other by local taxes and its lawful per capita allotment for scholastics within the district.

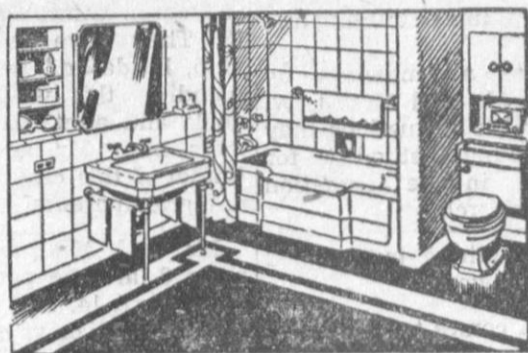
