

Whether we like it or not we must face that fact. We hope the reds will see the light, as a matter of saving their own skins if not of principle, and cooperate in restoring peace and freedom to the world. If they do not, there's only one course left to us . . . to continue the global struggle until the red menace is completely wiped out. It's either that or slavery.
