Condensed Milk to Be Next Product at FMA Cheese Plant

Prospects for the FMA plant, and for Grade B milk producers of this area, took a sudden turn for the better Tuesday night when directors of the association decided to expand their milk processing facilities for producing condensed milk as well as cheese.

Plant Manager Rudy Hellman said Wednesday that additional equipment will be installed as quickly as possible and after that the plant will be able to process all the milk it can get, up to its capacity of 120,000 pounds daily.

Principally the additional equipment consists of stainless steel vats and refrigerating equipment capable of turning out 30 tons of ice a day. The huge cooling capacity is needed to cool the product down from evaporation temperature to storage tempera-

The principal condensing unit is on hand and will be ready to arrangement leading to and from. It is the large stainless steel unit

now used as a whey condenser. Cheese making capacity at the plant will not be affected by the milk into cheese in one day. Howcess the same volume into condensed milk.

Chances are that cheese making will hit an all time low at the the expansion. Hellman reports that Kraft processing factory at Garland is ready to accept all the condensed milk the FMA can produce. The same does not apply to cheese. Because of existing surpluses Kraft notified FMA some months ago that it will accept cheese only from local milk production. The plant had to quit buying surplus grade A milk, which accounted for about 30 per cent of its volume.





The expansion makes welcome news to small milk producers of the area as well as FMA members. It assures a continuation of the grade B market which appeared to be slipping. As explained by Hellman, small producers were caught in a squeeze. They could not afford the improvements for grade A production. At the same time they were in danger of losing their grade B market if the FMA situation continued to get worse

All of the condensed milk produced here will be used in making Kraft caramels. Last year the Garland plant used 18 million pounds of condensed milk from northern sources. Hereafter it will use the FMA product, as far as it goes, and get the rest of its requirement from previous sources.

The new undertaking also puts the FMA plant in the cream business in a big way. Whole milk is first separated and only the skim milk is condensed. The cream will be shipped to the West Coast. And that calls for another expansion in the plant. The cream separating capacity will have to be doubled.


Of Forestburg Dies
