So, whatever you think of the present arrangement, just remember that the bishop decided as he did because, for the present at least, he believes it is most conducive to peace and harmony in the community.

That he has an open mind on the subject is apparent from the fact that he has seriously considered the school board's proposal. He went so far as to ask the nuns whether they would be willing to cooperate in the program. That's not the way of a man who opposes the program on principle.

For that matter the nuns cannot be blamed for their decision. in the light of reports and rumors that have come to them. They are in doubt as to whether they are being used as stepping stones to put over a program only to be booted out later. So it's reasonable for them to play it safe and express their preference for the existing arrangement. No one can say that they oppose the p on principle because members of their order are now teaching elsewhere under the proposed arrangement.

The school receives a per capita allotment for each school child living in the district whether it attends the parochial or public school. That amounts to about \$40,000. In addition it receives local tax money in the amount of slightly over \$40,000, at a rate of \$1.00 per \$100 valuation on a total valuation of over \$4 million. Half of the tax money goes toward current operating expense. That's about \$60,000 a year for present operations.

Under the Gilmer-Aiken provision the local tax arrangement continues as is but the division would change to allow at least \$21,000 for operations. That is the minimum this district must furnish toward its own operation to qualify for Gilmer-Aiken aid and it is available in the present local tax revenue because valuations have increased and less than half the income is now required to meet bonded indebtedness.

## Harvesting Steady On Best Grain Crop In Muenster History

As harvesting hits its peak in this area it is becoming more apparent that the year's grain crop is by far the best ever. Yields that used to be considered as phenomenal are average this year and yields that used to be unbelievable are happening here and there. On the other hand the Trustee J. B. Klement. Trustees average good crop of normal years isn't worth mentioning

A. C. Enderby reports that he averaged 52 bushels of wheat per acre on a 15 acre field and 36.5 on his entire crop of 150 acres. His brother Joe averaged 58 on 48 on 6 acres. Another report, a farmer at Hood averaged 80 on a small field.

Those are some of the exceptional reports, however other reports indicate that average fields are doing very well. Al Trubenbach figured his crop at 34 per. Arthur Hellman made 36 per on a 30 acre field and estimates that another field now being combined will yield about 30. Tony Walterscheid isn't far enough along to make a good estimate but others are saying he will average about

In most cases it is still too early to figure yields over the community. Very few have cannot estimate the average until they know the total crop. All that practically all the better crops are in legume-treated fields.

Reports on oats are less stupendous but still good. Arthur Hellman expects to average 75 on one field. Emmit Yoder reports on crop of over 100 per.

Weather continues to be ideal for the grain harvest . . . hot, dry and breezy . . . but it's definitely bad for pastures, alfalfa and other growing crops.







#### Soil Conservation Notes

Grass fires have become a hazard in the Muenster area this spring, according to local soil conservation technicians who explain that there exists a real gifts. Mothers present were Mrs. danger from fire sweeping across Charlie Wimmer and Mrs. Ray the pastures and causing severe damage to the small amount of grass that remains.

The fire hazard of grasslands has come about from a combination of the tricks of nature. Last year during the drought permanent grasses were overgrazed and severly injured on most farms. As a result the grasses have made a weak, slow growth this year. The weakened condition of base grasses has given annual grasses and weeds a chance to grow. Annual bromegrasses and weeds have taken full advantage of the situation and have grown profusely. They are mature now and have turned pastures brown with their dried forage and brown seed heads. They present a fire hazard that cannot be ignored. A fire sweeping across pastureland now during this dry weather would kill out the base grasses and destroy all grazing prospects for this

Well, that's how it was proposed. As regards elementary grades there would be no change whatever. The same teachers and the same pupils in the same building . . . because enrollment will be large enough to require more than one teacher in every grade, so every parent who wants to keep children under the sisters' instruction will have that opportunity.

In high school the proposal is to arrange for religious instruction besides having nuns as teachers in some of the classes. Still another proposal was to have Father Louis serve as the school's principal, and the position has been offered to him. Considering all the angles it is obvious that the school board was trying to work in harmony with the aims and ideals of the parish. There is no doubt that the system could have worked if people had wanted it to.

Even in the event of future state regulations or any other developments not compatible with parish ideals there's always the possibility of ending the arrangement. The parish would still have its own property and its own teachers. The whole deal is clearly a case of everything to gain and nothing to lose.

Since the plan is not adopted, however, we can be grateful that the bishop has decided to keep the parochial school forging ahead. Approval of a new building and additional courses is fine. Kids attending the parochial

Instead of taking on that kind of a burden why not solve the problem by claiming our rightful share of the state school fund? The parish need not spend a penny on school expense . . . nor compromise its principles . . . in developing one of the finest school systems of the state.

From the looks of things now, we have at least another year to think it over. During that time let's try to concentrate more on the issues and less on the personal antagonisms that have developed so far.


