animals. In spite of the disease packing houses are allowed to
process the meat, but they buy it at a much lower price.
However owners are doing fairy well on their sacrifice sales. That's because the feed company
to which the feed poisoning was to which the feed poisoning was
traced is compensating owners as nearly as possible for their loss. The procedure is to submit a statement on which several of the stockman's neighbors give their
estimate of the herd's value beestimate of the herd's value be-
fore it was fed the poisoned feed Then the cattle are sold on the market and the feed company pays the difference between selling price and estimated value.
The trouble started about The trouble started about
month ago when a number cattle raisers noticed that their animals were mysteriously losing weight and dying. Veterinarians
determined that the cause wàs a determined that the cause was a
poisoned feed resulting from the mixture of a petroleum oil with cottonseed cake. The company had extracted the more valuable vegetable oil for other uses and
substituted the petroleum product not being aware of its toxic effect Before the results were known the feed had been distributed over a large area of North Texas.
