Congressman Omar Burleson states in a recent newsletter that a new round of pressure is being applied on the US Government to normalize relations with Communist China.

It is understood that this "normalizing" would be accomplished on the severe terms of the People's Republic of China. Our country is expected to make whatever adjustments are needed in political, economic and humanitarian policy to avoid conflict with Red ideals.

The terms are certain to include our withdrawing recognition from the Nationalist Chinese of Taiwan and nullifying the defense treaty which we have had since the comparatively small number of people fled there soon after World War II to escape the Communist takeover.

It would be the first time a friendly nation was denied recognition. More important it would leave a small country defenseless against a military giant. Conquest of the island could be taken for granted, after which the world could expect firm establishment of the red regime.

The method of taking complete charge is well known after accounts of what happened in other places. China North Korea, North and South Vietnam and Cambodia have all had blood baths as the new rulers send their hatchet men throughout the country exterminating old enemies and former leaders who might have influence on the people.

The conquest of Cambodia was even more savage. Victims there were not only former enemies of people of influence, but anyone without regard of class. It was genocide, the effort to wipe out a civilization.

This is what is in sight when we "normalize" relations with Red China. After having happened several times before, we know it is standard operating procedure in any Communist expansion.

It appears that improved relation with US is desired by the Red Chinese to strengthen their position in dealing with Soviet Russia. But if that is true, they have an offensive and arbitrary way of seeking our favor. It's ridiculous to demand that we disgrace ourselves and betray free people to make a deal that favors them more than us.

Aside from those considerations our country needs to think also of the image it presents to other countries by sneaking out the back door on its obligations to the Nationalist Chinese. How much respect could we expect from other countries, free or captive, when they see that we don't have the courage or the honor to stand by our commitment?

In addition we should remember that the Chinese of Taiwan are our special responsibility. They lost their homeland because of our failure to supply the arms they needed to defend themselves against the Reds. Their sanctuary on Taiwan was our token aid after necessary aid was too little and too late.

These are priority topics in considering a deal with the Red Chinese. Our moral responsibility toward the little island and our knowledge of the blood bath that normally follows Communist occupation tell us that any concession on Taiwan is unthinkable. We could add that it's also unthinkable to be suckered into an arrangement whereby we get caught between a couple of ruthless savages who don't want to get along.

First criterion of negotiating with any country is the benefit we are to derive therefrom. This deal not only has nothing to offer for us but, it is all wrong in violating our sense of honor and as-

County Repeats Sports History

History repeats itself with slight variations. Three Cooke County teams again are champs of their respective districts but Muenster this time is represented by the Sacred Heart Tigers instead of the MHS Hornets. The other two are repeat performers of last year with Era wearing the crown of District 7-B and Gainesville the crown of District 6-AAA. Sacred Heart is tops in District 4-A of TCIL.

A further similarity with last year is that the Muenster team cleared the first hurdle. SHHS won 38-14 over St. Anthony's of San Antonio like MHS beat Pottsville by a comfortable margin a year earlier.

As regards Era and Gainesville, their bi-district efforts were determined by stats rather than scores. Both were tied and Era got the nod on penetrations whereas Gainesville was eliminated the same way. The Leopard loss was a heart-breaker. Only two more yards on one of the drives would have tied the teams on penetrations, so Gainesville would have won on the greater number of first downs.

Another switch from last year's bi-district, Gainesville won in '76, lost in '77. Era lost in '76, won in '77.

Next on schedule for last week's 2 survivors: SH playing St. Joseph's of Brownsville Friday, and Era playing Windthorst Saturday.

Another bi-district of local interest, Pottsville, which lost to Muenster last year, beat Holiday this round.

Regardless of all that, Cooke County, for the second consecutive year, has the distinction of three district champs. Not many counties can match that.

Tigers Wallop St. Anthony's 38-14 for Bi District Title

Coach Eddie Stock's Tigers did it in a big way at San Antonio Saturday, blasting the St. Anthony's Yellowjackets 38-14 in the TCIL bi-district playoff. They played a great game, one of the very best of the season, and took advantage of good breaks in piling up one TD after another over the frustrated St. Anthony's boys.

For the first time in the history of Sacred Heart, the Tigers have gone beyond the district championship. This achievement puts them in line for the TCIL state championship playoffs Friday with St. Joseph's Academy of Brownsville.

The Muenster fellows were slightly delayed in getting organized. They had to punt on the first series after kickoff, but the yellowjackets likewise had to kick on first series.

Next a 15 yard penalty for roughing advanced the Tigers to their 45 and four more plays gained to the Jacket 14. A 22 yard pick up by Bartush was the big one.

But a fumble there suddenly halted the good work, and SH had to start again after forcing the hosts to kick on first series. From their 24, then, the Tigers put on a drive that went all the way, overcoming a 15 yard penalty on the way. They used seven plays, the big ones being a 26 yard scamper by Joe Sicking, 14 yards by Bob Hartman, a pass, Hartman to Fred Koesler for 10 and a 35 yard scoring pass to Sicking. Dallas Challenges Year Extension of City's Water Right

Muenster's water right relative to its proposed new reservoir has been extended a year, but the right is challenged by the City of Dallas which has filed a suit making the state water rights commission and the city of Muenster co-defendants.

The suit is routine with Big D which is striving constantly for exclusive rights to all run-off water of the Trinity watershed above Dallas. The water is wanted to provide an adequate supply for Dallas far into the future. Dallas objected when Muenster's right was certified a year ago and it objected again when the city asked Monday for the one year extension.

Persons representing the city in the hearing conducted by the Water Rights Commission were the city engineer, Don Fleming, Richard Grewing and Henry Weinzapfel of the water board, and Leonard Endres of the city council.

Attorney Bill Sullivan will represent the city and Soil Conservation Service in the water rights suit filed by Dallas.

Nancy Ondrovik Gets Law License Becomes Partner

Nancy Ondrovik, who came to Muenster during the past summer as an assistant to Attorney A. V. Grant, has just taken two giant steps forward in her legal career.

She joined Grant last week as a partner in the law firm of Grant and Ondrovik, and she was admitted to the state bar in formal swearing-in ceremonies last week Tuesday in Austin.

The clerk of the Texas Supreme Court, the Hon. Garson R. Jackson delivered the license to the new attorney.

Miss Ondrovik is a resident of Lake Kiowa, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Ondrovik. She attended high school in Dallas, graduated magna cum laude from Texas A&M with a BS degree in psychology and received her Doctor of Jurisprudence degree from Texas University. At A&M she was named to "Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities", was a member of Phi Kappa Phi and the Mortar Board.

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Tigers Play for State TCIL Title

The shootout for state championship in Class A of the Texas Catholic Interscholastic League is coming up shortly, when Sacred Heart's Tigers take on the St. Joseph's Academy Bloodhounds of Brownsville, Friday night at 8 in Leeper Stadium, Gainesville.

The two teams were the winners in state semi-finals last week, the Tigers blasting St. Anthony's of San Antonio 38-14 while the Brownsville fellows were having an equally convincing win of 34-12 over Sacred Heart of Hallettsville.

Scores of those games bear out other indications that the two teams are well matched and can be counted on for an outstanding contest, likely featuring a wide open game and multiple scoring on each side.

From information available to Coach Eddie Stock, the teams are about equal in size and speed, however, the Tigers have the better record. In regular season they are 9-1, including one forfeit, whereas the Bloodhounds are 6-4. One of those losses was to St. Anthony's by a score of 22-21, but it occurred at a time when the team was badly crippled, and does not reflect its real potential.

According to the word reaching Stock, the Bloodhounds are very aggressive on defense and dangerous on offense. The threat applies especially to an outstanding quarterback said to be regarded by many Valley fans as one of the best in the state. He is fast and shifty and a sharpshooting passer. In last week's game with the Hallettsville team, he ran for three of the touchdowns and passed for another. The word

is out at Sacred Heart that stopping him is the number one job.

Though possibly less sensational, the Tigers, too, have their strong points. In Joe Sicking, Dan Walterscheid and Joe Bartush they have fast and strong runners who can break away at any time. Besides, the passing combination of Bob Hartman and Fred Koesler has been consistently good. And the Tiger defense has been extra stingy all through the season. Topping off the potential is the fact that all of the team came through last week in fine physical condition. And spirit is sky high. After making it this far the Tigers have the do or die determination to be Number 1.

Indications are that the game will beat all Sacred Heart attendance records of the past. Being played in Gainesville it is near enough to seem like a home game to

Muenster people. In addition, its status as a state championship final is expected to have widespread appeal at a time when the area has no other game. Era, which will be playing for regional title, is scheduled to meet Windthorst at Decatur Saturday night.

Even attendance from across the state is expected to be sizeable, probably over 200. The word is that a chartered plane from Brownsville will be loaded to capacity with 40 team members and 72 others. In addition, there are indications that band, cheerleaders and more adults will find ways to get here.

The chartered plane is scheduled to fly from Harlingen to Dallas Friday morning and will be met by buses taking the passengers to Gainesville. After the game the buses will return them to Love Field for the flight back to the Valley.

Sacred Heart will be the home team at the game and its fans will use the grandstand at the west side of the field. Admission charge will be \$4 for an adult and \$3 for a student.

As the game approaches Coach Stock is as nervous and enthused as his Tigers. He repeats that they are a great bunch of talented and hard working boys with the dedication that deserves the honor they are seeking. More appreciation was directed to students, parents, alumni and all the community for their great support.

Council to Have Public Hearing

On the agenda at next Monday's city council meeting is a public hearing on an ordinance to change the procedure in the installation of curb and gutter and pavement in the future. Heretofore a separate ordinance was needed for each project in order to authorize the city to charge each property owner for his share of the expense.

The proposed ordinance lists all of the unimproved streets for which a project can be developed and authorizes the city to install and collect without the special ordinance when a project is requested by more than half the property owners adjoining the project.

Auto Registration System Will change on January 1

Texas motorists will get their first exposure to year-round motor vehicle registration beginning January 1, 1978.

Registration will begin a month earlier this year because of anticipated unfamiliarity that may slow the initial year's collections.

For the first time registrations will be issued on a monthly expiration basis, instead of having some 11 million all expire at midnight April 1 each year as before.

Spreading registrations through 12 months is expected to reduce or minimize the annual long, frustrating waiting lines stretching from county

tax assessor-collector offices.

Immediately after Christmas new registration application forms will be mailed to vehicle owners in preparation for "System 78" as it is described by the Motor Vehicle Division of the State Department of Highway and Public Transportation.

Tax collectors and their staffs through the state have been preparing for this moment for the last year. Intensive workshops, seminars and individual meetings with department field supervisors have centered on the new procedures.

The department has been working up the overall operation plans for some three years. Other states — including California, Washington and Kentucky — already have initiated year-round registration programs.

Another first will be the appearance of two validation stickers on the multi-year license plates, first issued in 1975. The new stickers will represent month of expiration and year of expiration of that vehicle.

"System 78" will be relatively simple for the motorist submitting his application for registration. The real complications fall in the tax assessor-collector's offices, primarily because of accounting procedures incident to collecting.

Before returning home, relatives from out-of-town were served dinner in the Urban Flusche home.

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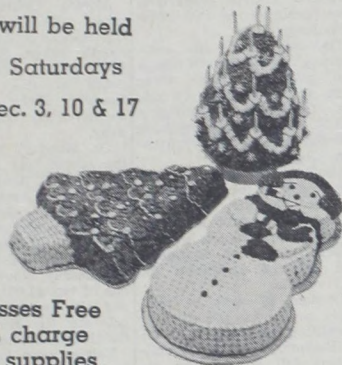
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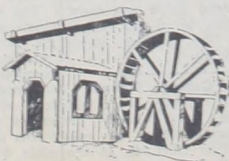
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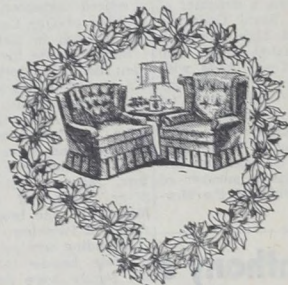
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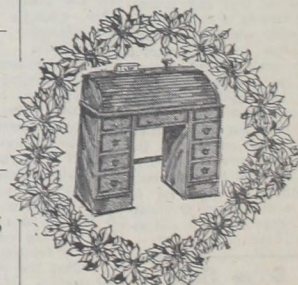
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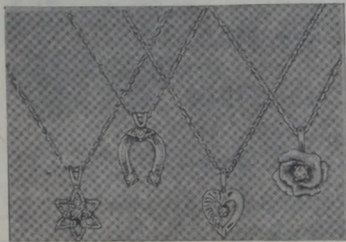
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Food and Gifts for Holidays Featured At HD Program

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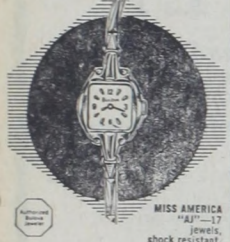
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IT HAPPENED 40 YEARS AGO

Nov. 12, 1937

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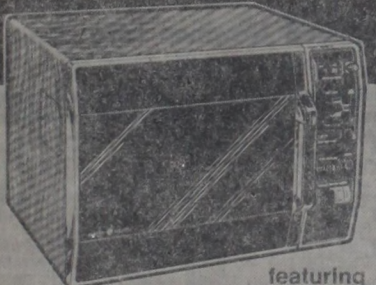


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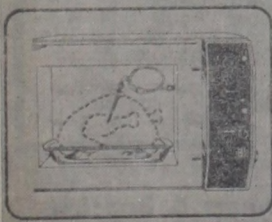

Texas FB Reports Biggest Gain Ever In Membership

The Texas Farm Bureau has recorded the largest annual membership gain in its 44-year history, according to Carroll Chaloupka, president of the state's largest farm organization.

The TFB gained 18,626 member families in the fiscal year ending Oct. 31, and now has a membership of 214,197, Chaloupka said. All except six of the 210 organized county units increased members this year, he said.

Chaloupka said this marks the 25th consecutive year for the organization to show a gain. The TFB is now the third largest state Farm Bureau, and is closing in on the two leaders, Indiana and Illinois, he said.

The Texas Farm Bureau is affiliated nationally with the American Farm Bureau Federation which has a membership in excess of 2.7 million families. All states except Alaska have Farm Bureau organizations.

The original Texas Farm Bureau was organized in 1920, but had ceased to function by the early 1930s. The present Texas Farm Bureau dates back to 1933-1934 when it was organized as the Texas Agricultural Association. The name was changed a few years later when it became affiliated with the American Farm Bureau Federation.

City Gets \$2,538 Sales Tax Rebate

The City of Muenster has received a check in the amount of \$2,538.93 from State Comptroller Bob Bullock for its November share of the 1 per cent city sales tax. The check brings the city's total rebate for the year to date to \$43,288.16, representing an 18 per cent gain over the same period last year.

Bullock reports that Muenster was one of 880 Texas cities receiving the rebates, and the total remittance was for \$19.2 million. To date this year the comptroller has remitted \$307.7 million in rebates as compared with \$252 million last year, a gain of 22 per cent, the biggest in recent years. The increase was 13 per cent in 1975 and 14.5 per cent last year, Bullock said. He added that the big sales tax collection reflect a brisk buying pace and the possibility of a record Christmas buying season.

November remittance received by other cities of the area and their percentage of gain for the year to date are as follows: Gainesville \$13,721.29, 14%; Lindsay \$2,077.64, 8%; Nocona \$3,662.65, 10%; Pilot Point \$1,293.07, 19%; Saint Jo \$644.86, 3%; Sanger \$838.03, 16%; Whitesboro \$5,058.89, 24%.

Mrs. Jim Eaves Is Police Academy Honor Graduate

Two members of the Muenster Police Department, Judith L. Eaves and David L. Province, were among 33 persons graduating Monday night from the Texoma Police Academy of Sherman.

Besides being the first woman from a Cooke County law enforcement agency to graduate from the academy, she has the distinction of finishing at the top of the class. She shares that honor with two men.

The class was the 12th to be conducted by the Texoma academy. It topped previous enrollments and also had the largest number of women students, five. The course consists of 240 class hours spread over a period of 9 weeks. Upon graduation a person becomes a certified police officer, qualified to work in any police department of the state.

At this time the city has two certified law enforcement officers employed full time. They are Jim Eaves, chief of police, and David Province. 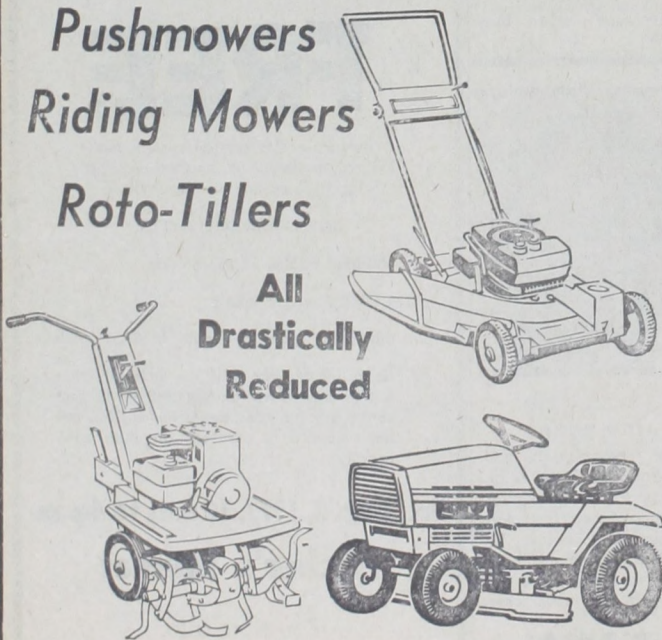

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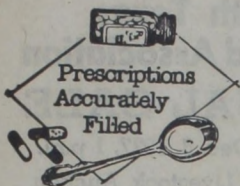
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Public School Happenings
