The \$64 question of the year ... what to do about Quemov and Matsu islands . . . got another airing Monday night as Adlai Stevenson rambled through about 4,000 words without stating definitely that the islands should or should not be defended by this country against a red Chinese attack. He did express some horror at the thought of our being drawn into a war because of those two rather insignificant specks on the earth's surface.

Perhaps that was his indirect way of saying that we should pull out if a show down comes. It just seems he was inviting people to infer that such a course is better than getting ourselves involved. The chances are that people who were influenced by his speech are more inclined now to approve the sacrifice of these islands and their people as another appeasement to the communists.

If such is the case it can be said that his talk definitely was not good for the cause of world freedom. He'd have rendered a far greater service if he had come out boldly to rally public opinion in determined support of the islands. At the same time he could have enhanced rather than diminished his own prestige as a statesman by standing on principle rather than expediency.

AMMUNITION FOR "V" DAY-Workers at Eli Lilly and Company, Indianapolis, Ind., are among employes of several pharmaceutical houses packaging vials of polio vaccine in anticipation of "V-Day"—vaccination day—which will occur across the nation at times set by separate communities. Children in first and second grades-an age bracket highly susceptible to the disease-will receive the three-shot Salk treatment on a voluntary basis under a program sponsored by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. Because the supply of vaccine is still limited, only children in certain other specific age groups will be able to receive the shots at this time.



Hi-Lo had the top butterfat producers averaging 48 and Frasher had the champion milk producers with a 1360 pound average. The Frasher butterfat average was 47 and the Hi-Lo milk average was

Carl Kemplin, supervisor, reported that 558 cows in the county association of 21 herds were tested and that 255 produced 40 pounds or more of BF. Average butterfat production per cow was 35, and average milk production was 920.



ANTENNA FOR GHOST-TO-GHOST NETWORK—Frederick Spiegelberg, professor of Asian civilization, examines a Tibetan ghost trap on display at the University of Stanford, at Stanford, Calif. Fashioned of sticks and colored thread, it is mounted in mud mixed with human ashes. Tibetans believe that drawings of people and animals on slats lure ghosts into circle of small traps. Ghosts then become entangled in TV antenna-like device. When wool tufts at points of antenna become damp, it's a sign ghost is trapped. Antennae come in 14 different designs, one for each major type of spirit Tibetans hope to ensnare.

im brown read these words in the Gospel of St. John and was deeply disturbed.

Elsewhere in his Bible . . . in the Epistle to the Ephesians...he noted the exhortation of St. Paul that there be "One Lord, one Faith, one Baptism."

'Where," he asked Father Crane, "is this unity of which the Bible speaks? How is anyone to know which is 'the one Fold ... the one Faith...the one Baptism,' when Christ's followers are divided into hundreds of denominations, many holding conflicting beliefs?'

The priest agreed that good and sincere people are indeed confused by the claims and counter-claims of a divided Christianity. Instead of traveling on a single highway clearly marked with the words: "Come - follow me," they find themselves wandering in a network of roads with signs pointing in all directions.

"But how," Jim persisted, "can the average person know what to do? When doctrinal claims contradict one another, how am I to know which is right and which is wrong?"

A study of Christian history, Father Crane replied, will provide a better answer for the troubled and confused than would a study of conflicting creeds.

"History will tell you, Jim," the priest went on, "that Christ proclaimed His intention to establish a Church, with Peter as its head and the other Apostles as its bishops. History further tells us that this is the Catholic Church, which was established during the time of the Apostles, with Peter as its first leader - the first Pope."

The Mass, Father Crane continued, was the central act of public worship in the early Church, as it is today. There were seven Sacra-

ments for the early Christians seven for Catholics the world over today. Catholics of 1,900 years ago confessed to a priest, and they do so today. Catholics believed then, as now, that Baptism removes. original sin ... that matrimony is. a Sacrament, not just a civil ceremony... that bishops and priests. receive their powers through a Sacrament instituted by Christ.




The story about the changes in food production, processing, distribution, and use then is told through cartoons.

The pamphlet shows with appropriate sketches that 30 years ago an hour's take home pay would buy 51/2 loves of bread, or 11/2 pounds of steak, or 11/2 pounds of chicken, or 31/2 quarts of milk, or one dozen oranges, or 31/2 cans of tomatoes.

This is a trifle to what the Jet-Glas Day and Night water sketch for 1955 shows. It says heaters are surfaced with glass, an hour's take home pay will buy they have no exposed metal to 10 loaves of bread, or two pounds rust or corrode . . . assure hot of steak, or three pounds of water as clean as your water chicken, or seven quarts of milk, supply. In 20 or 30 gallon sizes or three dozen oranges, or 91/2 cans of tomatoes.

Cooke DHIA Leads State Associations

Cows of the Cooke County Dairy Herd Improvement association ran up the top figure in both milk and butterfat production to take first place among associations of the state during the month of February, it has been revealed.

The 608 cows in 21 herds produced an average of 790 pounds of milk and 31 pounds of butterfat, crowding out the Wichita Valley DHIA which was second. Dallas county was third in the

state averages. There are 22 associations in operation in Texas with a total of 11,690 cows in 260 herds tested during the month. State averages were 610 pounds of milk per cow and 27 pounds of butterfat. Alfred Bayer of Muenster is


