# How About The Swimming Pool?

Lots of people are talking, but up to now nothing definite is being accomplished toward getting a swimming pool at Muenster. Meanwhile time is slipping by, and unless something starts happening soon it may as well be forgotten for this summer. Assuming that construction will take at least a few weeks, the pool's season at best will be a short one for this year.

Agreement is quite general on two points. The pool would make a fine community asset and possibilities of operating it on a self supporting basis are very good, provided it is kept as simple as possible.

There's no need, for instance; of fancy stuff such as glazed tile and recessed lights, nor showers, dressing rooms and suit rental service. Eliminating such items can save a big part of the original cost as well as operation expenses. All that is needed is the pool along with a shower and foot bath to meet sanitary standards. Even the cost of water becomes a minor item if the pool is equipped with a filtering and chlorinating unit.

The cost of such a setup is estimated roughly at \$5,000, surely not too much for the community to risk on a project that meets a very desirable recreational need besides appearing to be a sound financial investment. There isn't a question in anyone's mind as to whether we can afford it or should have it. We're just slow about making up our minds on how to do it.

# Want Grass Burned? Big Harvest Ends; Firemen Monday night burned Loans on Wheat Again Available

This week practically ends the biggest harvest season in the community's history. Only a few threshers are running now cleaning up the last of a wheat crop which, according to most reports averaged close to 30 bushels per acre.

The oats crop, though good, is not exceptional like the wheat. It apparently suffered from lack of rain during the late growing stage whereas wheat required less and matured nicely. The community average for oats seems to be near 50 bushels per acre.

While threshing and combining were slowing down, the wheat business here put on a new splurge late last week and early this week. More grain came from farm bins than from fields as storage space became available for farmers to dispose of their wheat on the government loan program. Since Friday Arthur Felderhoff and Jack Biffle have accepted about 10,000 bushels for storage.

Probably as much as 80 per cent of the local (vheat was marketed through the government loan program. By placing the grain in storage then cashing in warehouse receipts farmers enjoyed a price advantage that ran as high as 28 cents a bushel. The remainder, sold at prices varying from \$1.80 to \$1.95 a bushel; was grain that had to be disposed of while loan storage was not available.

The clover should be windrowed when two-thirds of the seeds are brown, allowed to remain in windrows three to four days then picked up with a com-

It will add organic matter to the soil and offer protection to the soil surface as a right to accept or reject any or protective mulch. Nitrogen fertilizer turned under with the heavy 31-tf stubble will greatly improve next season's crops.


