

Brighten Lawn by Use of Fertilizer

COLLEGE STATION - Home lawns receive an added "punch" if treated in the spring with a complete fertilizer.

Use a fertilizer of a 2-1-1 or 1-1-1 ratio at rates to supply two pounds of actual nitrogen for each 1,000 square feet of lawn area, advises E. M. Trew, extension pasture specialist. That's the amount of nitrogen in 20 pounds of 10-20-10 or 40 pounds of 5-10-5.

Another pound of nitrogen applied at 30 to 40 day intervals out the summer, says Trew. Supply water as needed. Water only when the yard

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

Fly Control Tops Most Urgent List Of Health Services

AUSTIN-Many Texas children and adults die each year from flyborne diseases. Typhoid fever, tuberculosis, summer complaint, cholera, and intestinal diseases frequently resulting in death follow closely in the trail of the common housefly.

"The control of the fly menace comes at the top of the list of necessary public health measures which should be applied by every city and community in the State," said Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer. "The most effective measure for control is to prevent breeding, and about eight days are required to complete a life cycle. During her lifetime of several months, one housefly lays from 600 to 1,000 eggs. Thus, it can easily be seen that in a season which usually begins in the spring of the year, the descendents from one fly number countless of thousands."

To eliminate flies, Dr. Holle said the breeding places must be destroyed. As flies breed in filth. manure piles, garbage, and other organic filth furnish the requirements of warmth, moisture, and food necessary for the propagation of the fly. Flies should be kept from contact with food or drink or utensils in which such food and drink are prepared and served. Likewise they should be kept from access to privy vaults where they pick up the infections, which they later spread to humans by contact with the food and drink, and by unwashed hands and utensils.

"See that your windows, doors, and porches are screened so that the stray fly from some careless neighbor will not endanger your family. See that your grocer keeps meat, vegetables, and fruit screened from flies.'

Metal Fishing Pole Silences TV Set

LOS ANGELES. - A Wilshire District resident has found a way to silence his neighbor's TV set whenever he wishes.

The idea came to him during a recent hot spell when he was unable to sleep because of the blare of commercials from the set next door.

He stuck a metal fish pole out his third story window and leaned it against the antenna on the neighbor's roof. It did a beautiful job of shorting reception. He resorts to the fish pole now as often as necessary, removing it in the morning. The neighbor and a TV repairman, he reports, are slowly going nuts.

It takes about two gallons of milk a day from each cow for the dairyman to break even, they say, and the average cow gives only a gallon and a half. But members of dairy herd improvement associations average almost three gallons a day from their cows and make an average of \$100 profit a year from each cow.

Why can they do this? The answer is in keeping records. Association members keep records that show them which cows are making money and which are losing. Unprofitable cows are soon culled from the herd.


