



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

J. C. Long was best man. The couple will live in Gainesville at 424 Throckmorton Street.


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
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St. Anne's Society Starts Plans for State Convention



Home Food Freezer Is More Efficient After Defrosting

COLLEGE STATION -- When your home food freezer needs defrosting, don't put the big job off. A clean box actually leads to more economical operation and longer life of the unit.

It's difficult to set up a regular schedule so defrost when sides of the box become frosted with one-half inch of ice or more, says Roy W. Snyder, extension meat specialist.

Snyder explains that ice acts as a blanket over the refrigerating coils. The heavier the coating, the longer the machinery must run to produce a zero degree temperature, the best temperature for keeping frozen meats, vegetables or fruits.

Plan to defrost when the food supply is low. During hot weather, defrost in the early morning, the specialist says. Take care not to let the food stuffs begin to thaw. This will lower their quality.

Hermes Wins Award In Litter Contest





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
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
