More than Twenty Blocks Assured for Pavement Project

Muenster's paving project is off to a good start with base work finished on five blocks, base work just started on five more blocks, and about twelve more practically ready for the work.

Two blocks of West Fourth are due to get their topping in a few days and three blocks of West Sixth will get theirs shortly afterward.

Streets now being worked up six years old will be included for the pavement are one block in the new arrangement. Sections each on East Third, Fourth and Fifth between Oak and Main and tend from the top of the fix- two blocks on Oak between Third and Fifth.

According to City Manager Steve Moster the pavement is almost assured on about twelve cases only one owner's agreement is needed to complete a block. At the same time more projects are developing, and indications now are that the total job is likely to exceed 30 blocks.

Most of the pavement is to be 18 feet wide but there are some exceptions where the topping will extend to the curb. Owners pay cents per foot to each. For wider pavement the cost is proportionately higher.

The city is cooperating in the work by providing gravel where needed to make a 6 inch base, a maintainer for the shaping work, and water for packing. It also pays the cost of surfacing gaps at alleys and intersections.





Some individuals need more sleep than others, the Doctor said, and the most valuable experiments in this line are the ones each person makes on himself. A "good night's rest" means a sufficient number of hours spent in sleep to enable each individual to feel well, do efficient work, and to keep in a cheerful humor the next day.

"Some exercise out of doors each day will help us to sleep soundly at night. We must also have fresh air in our sleeping quarters. Give as much consideration as possible to the comfort of your bed and bed clothes. Do not mull over your problems and ideas after you have gone to bed. Make your plans early in the evening for a good night's rest by slowing down from the physical and mental work of your daily life. When you arise each morning rested and with a feeling of general well-being, you will be amply repaid for your thought in planning a 'good-night's sleep.'
