



Christmas Message

by Rev. Louis Deuster, O.S.B.

Dear Parishioners and Fellow Citizens:

Christmas, one of the very greatest feasts of the Christian epoch, is the innocent target for considerable criticism and abuse on the part of both unbelievers and weakknee'ed believers in our Lord and His teachings. Commercialization is chief of the envious shafts directed against this annually recurring season of peace and good will. The abuse is highlighted rather than the proper use.

If Christmas must innocently take some of the blame for man's shortcomings at this season of the year, it is surely proper that it receive full credit for the enormous benefits it brings mankind.

For no one can deny that Christmas is a season of almost universal good will. It is an annually recurring echo of the Angels' message, "GLORY BE TO GOD ON HIGH, AND ON EARTH PEACE, TO MEN OF GOOD WILL.

It is related that the great Protestant preacher Phillips Brooks, once struck an amazing chord among his congregation, that for sheer effectiveness far surpassed anything he had ever achieved in a set sermon.

On that particular Sunday morning, Phillips Brooks looked intently into the faces of the men and women he had known for a generation, and whose problems and shortcomings he had very often dealt with. He knew better than anyone else the passions and emotions which seethed behind the pleasant smiles of his well dressed congregation. He knew all about the petty spites and jealousies that embittered their hearts and withered their lives; the bickerings and the selfish connivings that set neighbor against neighbor, sometimes brother against sister, child against parent; individuals against the best public-spirited men in the community.

And from these wells of understanding of what went on in the inner recesses of these his beloved people, Phillips Brooks addressed the crowd somewhat as follows:

Oh, my dear friends! You are letting miserable misunderstandings run from year to year, meaning to clear them up some day.

"You are keeping wretched quarrels alive because you cannot quite make up your minds that now is the day to sacrifice your pride and kill them.

You are passing men sullenly on the street, not speaking to them out of some silly spite, and yet knowing that it would fill you with shame and remorse if you heard that one of those men were dead tomorrow morning;

"You are letting your neighbor starve, till you hear that he is dying of starvation;

'Or letting your friend's heart ache for a word of appreciation or sympathy, which you mean to give him someday:

"If you only could know and see and feel, all of a sudden, that 'THE TIME IS SHORT,' how it would break the spell!

How you would go instantly and do the thing which you might never have another chance to do." (Quotation from JOURNAL OF LIVING, January, 1954.)

Phillips Brooks was among America's most prolific preachers and writers. But it is said that the above short sermon is among his best known and most effective utterances.

Christmas time is a wonderful time for us all to recall just such thoughts as are brought to our attention in the quotation above. We are essentially like most American communities. If we let ourselves go, we recede into the ditches and gulches of our selfish pride and fears and annoyances. We never rise to the top. We can't ever become great because we insist on feeding upon our littleness. We shut the door to opportunity and progress not only of a spiritual nature but also of the material kind. We refuse to learn despite the wonderful teaching agencies we have at our beck and call in this 20th century ... the pride and glory of them all, if mankind will make it such. Christmas mellows men's minds. It inclines people everywhere to look kindly upon one another. It opens the hearts and minds of men to a consideration of each other's problems and to an inclination toward re-evaluating their mutual problems. Mayhap, Christmas 1953 will bring our beloved community far more of this than we in our shortsightedness might suspect. The grace of God is still a most powerful thing. Welded with prayer, it is ALL-POWERFUL. May the Peace of God descend upon you and yours,



Now that we have electrified farms, factories and homes, is that the end? The answer appears to be no, that the electrical industry is a "giant boy" with its great growth still ahead. Here are some of the predictions.

Take a personal thing first. Millions of homes will have heat pumps to heat and cool automatically-using electricity for fuel.


You can expect to cook food someday by electronics-in seconds. Electrical incinerators will consume your waste paper and waste food. Dust will be taken from the air electrically. The day may come when TV screens hang like pictures on the wall, with only a tiny wire to the set.

Nuclear fuels are on the timetable of the scientists. Energy from the atom will eventually be a major source of power, regardless of whether fossil fuels are seriously depleted. By century's end, most new plants generating electricity will operate with atomic (fission) fuel. Aircraft, battleships and the like will measure fuel consumption in grams.

Storing heat from the sun is another long-range project of scientists, with billions in savings as the potential result.

Bumper Grain Crop, Drought, Building Activity, FMA Sale Feature 1953 News Review

Following the custom established in years past, the Enterprise again presents herewith, as the principal feature of its Christmas edition, a brief review of the high spots in local news during the past twelve months.

As usual, the year presents a mixture of good and bad news. One of the finest grain harvests on record was followed by a drought which had a serious effect on hay crops, corn, and pastures. The weather suited cotton, however, and the comparatively few who grew it had an exceptionally good yield. Finally adequate moisture came to give grains a fine start for next year, along with most welcome winter grazing.

Building continued the normal trend of community progress. The magnificent new Sacred Heart Church is practically complete and furnishings are expected soon. The new Sacred Heart High School building is under construction and the public school's cafeteria is finished. Some new homes have been built and some old homes have been remodeled. A large number of poultry houses reveals a growing interest in broiler and hatching egg production.

The year also marks the passing of an institution which has contributed a great deal to community progress in years past and in making its exit is clearing the way for even greater community service by its successor. The Farmers Marketing Association has sold its cheese factory to the North Texas Producers Association and plant expansions to be completed before spring will create a larger local dairy industry besides assuring a continued market for local small dairymen.

Regarding folks, it's the same story again. Some come to live here, others move away. There are births and deaths, and when all are figured in Muenster shows continued growth.







Of the 26 reservoir sites in the Muenster area only 18 have been cleared by easements. Seventeen of these easements for sites have been given in the Elm Creek Watershed above its junction with Brushy Elm Creek. One site has been cleared by easements on Dry Elm Creek.

Many landowners realize the benefits of this flood prevention program to the community and to their neighbors and are making sacrifices to clear the road for construction. Some are giving up



The above cross section shows the type of flood prevention structures planned on the Elm Creeks in the Saint Jo, Muenster, Gainesville area. The concrete-pipe inlet structure releases flood water slowly to prevent flooding of streams below. The storage provided in the detention pool is adequate to hold all rainfalls that may occur over a long period. The spillway level is reached only in an exceptional rainfall. Landowners granting easements for construction may control water in conservation pool through drain valve. The flood prevention program is the first effort made to stop floods at the source and protect valuable land on the flood plains of larger creeks.
