The combination of inflation and weather can be blamed for some of the recent skyrocketing prices in food. Heavy rains in California prevented the harvest of some foods and spoiled them before pickers could get back in the fields. A few desperate growers did the job with helicopters and the prices went up accordingly. It helps us understand why lettuce went up to 98 cents a head. Bell peppers went to \$1.25 a pound, so lots of stores decided to not even stock them.

All of this should improve as good weather improves vegetable farming... unless the union moguls come forward with more demands and cause more delay or higher price or both. But if all those factors could be brought in line we'd still have our problem with inflation... the country's greatest headache.

On this subject it's appropriate to consider some recent remarks by William E. Simon, former Secretary of the Treasury, to US News & World Report, April 24 issue. He reminded that many people blame the pressure against the dollar on the high price we pay for foreign oil, he replied: "That's a myth. If indeed it's oil imports that are causing the drop in the dollar's value, tell me why Switzerland and Japan and West Germany... all countries that import 100% of their oil... enjoy some of the strongest currencies in the world, while the dollar is among the weakest."

"The real problem with the dollar is that we are printing too many of them. When you produce too many of anything the price goes down. No one wants to hold a dollar that's debased by its own government."

Simon chose the right word in saying our money is debased by our own government. The wild spending policy, plunging the country another \$81 billion in the red in the next budget, requires the printing of more and more money with a consequent decline in the buying power of every dollar.

It all looks like a sneaky scheme by the government, living on credit and always managing to pay off with cheaper money than it spent. Meanwhile the victimized taxpayer finds that his inflated income buys no more than his former income and he also pays more tax because of the higher income.

In speaking the cause behind the cause we have to wonder whether the nation's problem doesn't derive from a multiplicity of declines. We have declines of conscience, pride, loyalty and integrity in dealings with ourselves and government, and vice versa.

First of all the top men of government, business and labor have been guilty for years of colossal rip-off in continuing the policies which keep the inflation spiral going. Government top men are the big offenders by overpaying themselves and their staffs, many of whom are not needed at all, as well as by appropriating wildly for construction and other projects and by permitting the welfare program to get out of hand.

Business people share the guilt by giving less value for the price, and workers by giving less service for the wage. Not to be overlooked are the country's too frequent drawn-out strikes. Parties on both sides are delinquent in duty when they fail to avoid the strike or get an early settlement.

In effect the golden rule has been widely replaced by the cynical slogan "Do it to you." It's a short sighted policy in which individuals too frequently reap undeserved gain, but in the process they are eroding the national spirit and creating conditions that are harmful to everybody.

We sometimes wonder whether this nation has passed the point of no return. Is it still possible to reverse this decline and restore the conditions that made America great? That seems improbable when we consider interest on the national debt is more now than the entire federal budget used to be, and the prevailing attitude is to just go on enduring an atmosphere of waste and graft and moral decline. It is discouraging to look for a public con-

Muenster Favors Losers in Weak Election Turnout

Voters of Muenster were wrong more often than right last week in their selections of nominees in the Democratic Primary election. They favored the loser in five races and one issue and favored the winner in two races and one issue.

Their turnout, as predicted earlier by political analysts, was disappointing, with only about 40 per cent of the eligibles appearing. Their count was 108 in the south box, precinct 17, and 417 in the north box, precinct 18. The total was 525.

They had a zero average in the county contests, voting for the losers in the only three races. They favored Heath over Underwood for county judge by a count of 320 to 193, and Underwood won county wide 2799 to 2815. Also they favored Calhoun for district clerk and she was second best in the county, going into a run-off with McFarlin. County counts were

SCS Personnel Meet City Group On Lake Project

Muenster's lake project moved slightly toward realization Monday afternoon when members of the Soil Conservation Service had a meeting with the Muenster water board and the city council for a briefing on recreational facilities to be included with the project.

SCS is cooperating with Muenster because of the flood control and recreational purposes the lake is intended to serve. This week's meeting was intended principally to complete the information that will be needed to make cost estimates.

As explained by City Superintendent Steve Mosler, actual construction is still in the indefinite future but the SCS action is an indication that the project is very much alive and eliminates the need of periodic appearances before the state water board to have the city's permit revalidated.

As Muenster schools close, the swimming pool will open. Dan Hamric, manager of the city park, announced this week that the swim season starts Saturday, May 20. He also said that it will follow its former schedule of 1 to 7 p.m. daily, except Monday, when the pool will be closed. And the pool will be available for private parties at any time other than regular pool hours for \$10 an hour. A qualified life guard will be there for such parties.

Pool charges will be 50 cents for children under 13 and 75 cents for teen ages and older.

Personnel on duty will be Duane Knabe as pool manager, Thelma Lewis and Bob Hamric as life guards and James and Juanita Ponder as basket room attendants.

Hot Check Seminar Set Next Thursday

Business men of the area who wish to be better posted on what to do about hot checks will have that opportunity Thursday night of next week, the 18th, 7:30 p.m., at a seminar in the Chamber of Commerce Building in Gainesville.

The meeting is co-sponsored by the county attorney's office and the Gainesville Chamber of Commerce. County Attorney Charles Bartush Jr. said there will be a short explanation and discussion of the state's hot check laws followed by a question and answer period concerning problems and situations people have encountered.

The discussion will also include precautions to avoid being stuck with a hot check and the information that should be supplied when asking the county attorney for help in collecting for the check.

Bartush said the seminar is intended primarily for business people, but any interested person will be welcome.

Another Request For Bids Needed On Overpass Job

A delay has been encountered in the project of replacing the local Highway 82 overpass with a four lane surface road. Charlie Hildebrand of the Gainesville office of the Department of Highways and Public Transportation said recently that the Highway Commission also rejected the construction bid which had previously been rejected by the Department and referred to the commission.

The reason is that it was about 35% above engineer estimates. Next step, Hildebrand said, is to make a new start, and advertise again for bids. That involves a repeat of paper work to prepare the next request for bids plus another wait until the next date for opening bids.

Deryl Zimmerman, who will compete in the 800 meter run at the Class A UIL state track meet Saturday had a good practice run in a state qualifiers meet in Dallas Saturday. He was 5th with the excellent time of 1:57.8, which is equivalent to 1:58.5 in the 880 yard run. Coach Don Ostermann reports that he was No. 1 among the Class A competitors. The only runners ahead of him were from 3A and 4A schools. Zimmerman will run Saturday at 1:15 in the state meet.

Ostermann says that this year's state meet will be run in meters and by 1980 all high school meets will be in meters.

The new track to be included in Muenster High's improvement program will use the metric system.

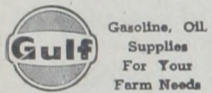
55 Assemble for '58 Class Reunion

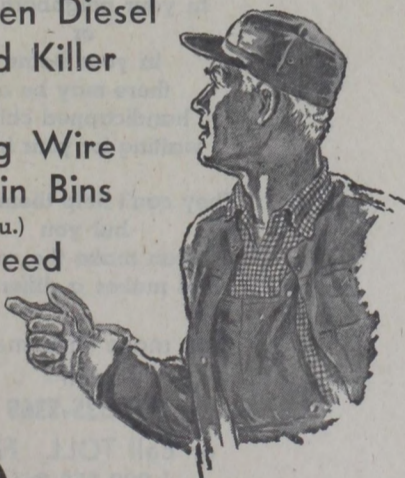

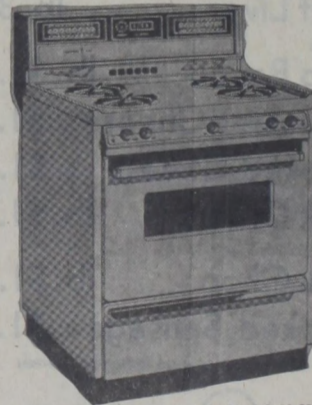

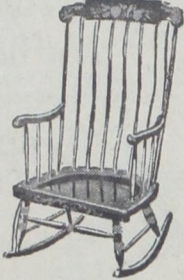
