all weeds should be mowed before they have a chance to produce a seed crop, says Trew. Most plants are weak when blooming plants are weak when blooming
and are, therefore, more easily killed by mowing at that growth stage. Eastern bitterweed, a common pest in bermuda pastures requires early and repeated mow ings to prevent it from produc ing some seed. The first mowing should be done with the mowe set high but successive clippings
should be made at lower levels should be made at lower levels.
