## Homemaking Hints

By Mrs. H. H. Homsley ful and inexpensive as they are nearer our holiday season it would be wise to freeze some
liquid eggs for future use. Here is a simple procedure: break
fresh clean eggs into a clean
bowl (dirt from shells may spoil keeping qualities). Add one tablespoon corn sirup or honey
to each two cups liquid eggs. Break all yolks. Mix thoroughly but do not whip in air. Sirup and mixing prevents gumminess in
thawed eggs. You may separate thawed eggs. You may separate
whites from yolks when breaking, if desired. Add sirup or honey to yolk and beat as for
whole eggs. Package whites with nothing added and no mixing. Be
sure to package eggs in moisture sure to package eggs in moisture
vapor-proof containers. Freeze promptly. Store at 0' F. When
using frozen eggs for future cooking 1 tablespoon yolks equal 1 egg yolk, $1 \frac{1}{2}$ tablespoons whites
equal 1 egg white. Be sure to use thawed eggs promptly. Dust settles on our furniture

yourself - take several soft rags
or cheese cloth squares and dip or cheese cloth squares and dip
them in a solution of turpentine and water. Use one teaspoon tur-
pentine to a quart of water. Dry pentine to a quart of water. Dry
the cloths, fold them, and place
them in a can (an old coffee or shortening can that you have labeled will make a good storage place). You will find that
these rags will be lint free and you can use them time and time
again before you have to wash again before you have to wash
them. When you do wash them rinse them in the turpentine solution for your last rinsing. Be
sure to shake out the dust before returning the cloth to the storage can. A bit of caution- a few
air holes can be punched in the air holes can be punched in the
top of the can if the lid fits tight. A women stands a better

The planting of vetch, peas, button clover and alfalfa has cotten off to a good start in the
Muenster area of the Upper Elm Red Soil Conservation District. All of these legumes are grown cultivated land for soil improvement and protection from he forces of erosion. Vetch and
utton clover are also overseeded on pasture land for soil improvement and to furnish extra grazing when the base grasses are dormant.
Button clover is a plant new to this area but it has given such
