

Muenster Phone Co. Buys Myra System, Plans Dial Service

The Myra telephone system, serving about 75 subscribers, became a part of the Muenster Telephone Company in a deal completed this week by Herman Younger and Don Hoskins.

Younger's plan, according to Line Foreman Alvin Fuhrmann, is to install a separate automatic switch board and dial telephones at Myra. The arrangement will be similar to that operating now between Muenster and Forestburg. Subscribers at Myra will be able to call one another through the automatic switch board or to dial the Muenster operator for a connection here. If a call originates here the local operator will dial the Myra number. Two lines will connect Muenster and Myra.

The Hoover Commission's findings and recommendations in the area of national defense are thus vitally important to every taxpayer in America. Included in the findings were some fantastic able Federal tax cut, must be facts relating to food and clothing, procurement and handling by the Defense Department. During the last fiscal year ending June 30, 1955, about \$1.3 billion was spent on food and clothing, and the total inventories exceeded \$700 million for food and \$2.7 billion for clothing.
