> N. Texas Dairymen Receive \$5.35 for **August Production**

Producers supplying milk to the North Texas fluid milk market (Dallas and Tarrant Counties and 14 surrounding counties) will be paid \$5.35 per hundredweight for milk sold in August 1955, according to an announcement by Byford W. Bain, Market Administrator. For each point (0.1%) that the average butterfat content of producer milk varies from 4.0%, a butterfat differential of 6 cents applies.

This price was computed from reports submitted by milk handlers regulated by the North Texas milk marketing order. The August price this year is 22 cents above the price received by producers during August 1954 and is 18 cents above the price producers received for milk during July

In August an average 1,584,325 pounds (equivalent to threefourths of a million quarts) of Class I milk (mainly milk, skim milk, buttermilk, chocolate milk, and cream) was sold each day. This was an increase of 5.58% from July 1955 and 6.76% from August 1954.
