



Livestock Cooling Pays in Production And Rate of Gain

Poultry, cattle and hogs do better in summer if they are kept cool. They keep eating, gaining and producing.

Research by agricultural engineers shows definitely that livestock produce most efficiently at temperatures between 55 and 65 degrees,. Production drops rapidly as temperatures rise, the report showed.

It is just as important to keep livestock cool in summer as to keep them warm in winter because of the way an animal's body utilizes feed. Part of the feed is turned into heat. Cattle on full feed will dissipate as heat 20 to 30 percent of the gross energy of the feed.

When air temperatures rise, the animal's skin temperature rises too, but not as fast. The difference between the animal's temperature and temperature of the air becomes less and less, until the animal cannot main- were the others.'



The owner paid little heed to Melvin. But when the owner's two sons came to the store, their father would take them to one side, well away from the bookkeeper, for whispered conversations that sometimes developed into whispered arguments.

Although some of these talks appeared to involve business deals, nothing was said to the man who kept the books.

In time Melvin Herndon the name is fictitious, although the story is not-left for a better job. But his mind kept wandering back to the hardware store and those strange conferences his boss had held.


So accustomed to having plenty of everything, we sometimes get careless, allow wasteful "leaks" in our homes and places of work.







The 160-acre farm, which supplies food for the orphanage's 250 children and 90 elderly folk at an institution for the aged, is operated by modern methods which teach the boys practical lessons in economical investment, labor, saying practices and high production.

The Holstein herd is handled in a loose-housing dairy set-up installed in two non-combustible Quonset buildings, shown in the lower picture. Working in and around them, the boys learn the importance of cleanliness, sanitation, proper feeding and milking operations, keeping production records and artificial insemination. Boys of high school age are "Pop's" farm helpers, for he believes in letting them learn by "do-how" instead of just "tell-how." They take turns on the morning shift, and those who aren't participating on athletic teams or in other activity handle the afternoon shift.

"You can bet your boots farming's worth while," Pop says, "especially when you've raised crops of boys like ours."

Now in experimental stages, the fertilizer is said to be unique in its ability to extract nitrogen from the air and place it in the soil. This would enrich soil vitally, since all crops with the exception of legumes extract nitrogen, essential to plant growth, from the soil.

Much of our land has become practically barren through a vicious cycle of planting and replanting of nitrogen-draining crops. Resultant deficient crops then pass on the nitrogen deficiency to animals and humans consuming the plants.

The actual formula contains no nitrogen itself. "The basis of American progress was discovered by the Pilgrims in 1623 at Plymouth," said a spokesman for one of the country's leading farm equipment manufacturers. When the whole undertaking seemed about ready to fold up, two fundamental decisions were made which brought produce food and fiber for himsuccess to the little colony. Embodied in these resolutions were the two principles of personal liberty and freedom of enterprise which have made possible the growth and phenomenal development of the United States.
