

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

It is 165 years since Edward Gibbon, English historian, published the fifth volume of his celebrated work, "The History of the Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire." Gibbon listed five chief reasons as to why the Roman Empire, the greatest civilization of its era and up to that time in history, came to an ignominious and catastrophic end. It might be well for America, without doubt the greatest civilization of this era or any other, to ponder over those five reasons.

1. The rapid increase in divorce which undermined the sanctity and dignity of the home which is the basis of human society.

Let's take a look at the divorce statistics of the U.S.A. - they

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are certainly cause for alarm. In The American Way 1890, there was a divorce for every seventeen marriages; in 1900, one marriage in every fourteen ended in divorce; by 1910, one marriage in every 11 went on the rocks; in 1920, one in every eight; in 1930, one in every six; and in 1952, the last year for which complete statistics are available, one marriage in every four foundered on the divorce shoals

> As Gibbon so truly stated, the home is the basis of human society. With one marriage out of every four now culminating in divorce, in many cases causing broken homes, the basis of our American Society is being dangerously undermined. With so many disrupted homes, it is small wonder that juvenile delinquency is running rampant. On the divorce issue America follows the dangerous course pursued by Rome prior to its







4-H'ers Eliminate "Accident Havens"



How many hazards can you find?*

SAFETY, a crop to be harvested on every farm and in every home, is receiving special attention from more than one-half million 4-H Club mem-

bers taking part in the 1955 National 4-H Safety Program.

As a part of their 4-H Club work, members in all 48 states are correcting hazards such as those seen in the above drawing. They are attempting to reduce the Nation's annual farm toll of 14,500 lives, 1,250,000 injuries, and an economic loss of about a billion dollars.

4-H'ers, working as individuals or in groups through their local clubs, conduct surveys to locate hazards, then correct the unsafe conditions. They give demonstrations on hun-dreds of topics pertaining to farm, home and highway safety. Members present talks before group meetings and over radio and television; put displays in store windows; and build booths at fairs.

To assist the Cooperative Extension Service in conducting the 4-H Safety Program, General Motors has just published a new "4-H Safety Handbook for Local Leaders," which provides how-to-do-it ideas for carrying out successful safety programs. Copies of the manual will be distributed to volunteer 4-H leaders through

County Extension Offices.

In addition, GM provides incentives in the National 4-H Safety Awards program which is arranged by the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work. Medals are made available to four county winners; an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago is given to the state winner; and \$300 college scholarships are presented to eight national winners.

Fisher Herd Among Leading Producers In DHIA for June

Paul Fisher's cows were among the top three high producing herds in the County Dairy Herd Improvement association for June according to a summary for the month released by Carl Kemplin, supervisor.

Leading the 21 county herds in both butterfat and milk production were H. H. Moody's Holsteins and Jerseys with averages of 40 and 1190 pounds, respectively. Runner up honors in butterfat production went to Hi-Lo Farms animals with an average of 37 pounds, but the cows dropped to fourth place in milk production with 970 pounds.

Fisher's herd was third in both butterfat and milk production with averages of 36 and 984 pounds, and Johnny Masten's cows were second in milk production with 986 pounds.

Kemplin's report reveals that 21 herds consisting of 528 cows were tested in June. Of these 119 produced 40 or more pounds of butterfat with the overall average per cow at 29 pounds. The average pounds of milk per cow was 726.

Among cows in the 40 or over butterfat bracket and their owners are J. W. Fleitman with four averaging 41 to 51 pounds; Alfred Bayer, two, 42-52; John Knabe, eight, 49-52, Paul Fisher, siv, 43-55; Martin Bayer, two, 40-46; Paul Fetsch, two, 44-45; Ben Sicking, one, 50; and Peter Prescher, five, 46-62.

Individual high butterfat producers for the month came from the Hoedebeck and Meyers herd. The champ ran up an 85 pound average; the next in line accounted for 71 pounds. Moody's herd contained the individual high milk producer which piled up an average of 1980 pounds.

Gary Hess is building one mile of field terraces on his farm south of Muenster. They are the broad channel type terraces that are easy to cross and easy to work. They will outlet onto a Bermuda grass waterway that was sodded several years ago to provide a safe outlet for terrace water. This completes terracing on the Hess farm. All fields now have the protection of terraces to prevent soil and water losses.

Ray Sicking of Myra is also building nearly a mile of terraces. He is building them with

building nearly a mile of terraces. He is building them with farm equipment using his tractor and three-disc plow and the island method of construction to get them properly built. These terraces also empty onto a Bermuda grass waterway sodded for that purpose.

A diversion terrace over 2000 feet long has been built by Johnny Bayer on the old Wilson farm. The terraces will divert hill water from running across a bottomland field. They'll carry some 40 acres of pasture run-off water to a grassed waterway that was shaped and sodded last year.





3 More Reservoirs On Elm Watershed

Bids for construction of three more flood prevention reservoirs on Elm Creek are now being received, according to J. W. Hess, Conservation District.

The three sites are on the 13tf Creek about three miles south of Muenster. One is on the Ben Voth farm the other two are on the farm operated by Theo and Ray Voth.

The reservoir on Ben Voth's will have a permanent pool of 5 acres and a watershed of 625 acres. The other two, with permanent pools of 8 acres and 4 acres will have watersheds of about 575 and 500 acres respectively.

The three dams, officially designated as 6-M, 6-N and 6-O, 46-tf are the eighth, ninth and tenth to be built in the Upper Trinity flood control program. Five are already completed and two more are under construction. The five completed reservoirs have already been credited with preventing a flood on Big Elm.

Bids for construction of the reservoirs will be received until 2 p.m., August 9, 1955, then will be publicly opened and read. Major items of work consist of the following, all being approxi-

Clearing and grubbing, 33.5 acres; excavation, 57,500 cubic yards; placing and rolling embankment, 222,500 cubic yards; placing of topsoil in earth spillway, 17,000 square yards; Concrete, Class A and B, 131.85 cubket (Dallas and Tarrant Coun- ic yards; furnishing and installties and 14 surrounding count- ing 600 feet of reinforced concrete pipe and 160 feet of bituminous coated, galvanized, corrugated sheet metal pipe; and feet of wire fence.

Showers Add Inch Of Moisture and Drop Temperature

Welcome showers during the past weekend broke three weeks of hot, dry weather and helped the farming situation in general besides bringing much more pleasant working conditions. Temperature after the rains dropped to highs of about 90 after topping the hundred mark for several days in a row.

As usual pasture grasses brightened and hay crops started putting on growth for the next cutting. However corn, in general, was too far along to get any help. A few scattered fields are still green and have a chance of using the moisture to fill out better quality kernels, but most fields are too near to maturity.

Possibly as important as crop benefits was the improvement in plowing conditions. Before the showers farmers were leaving their fields one after another because of the hard ground. The soaking has prepared their land for a better and easier job.

The rain was spread over three days of drizzles and light showers, all fine soakers. However it was not at all uniform. Some parts of the community report as much as three inches, others less than one inch.

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


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
