



The wording is significant. A so-called "solution" to the farm problem which reduces agriculture to bureaucratic domination is far worse than no solution at all. It is to the credit of the cattlemen and other livestock producers that they have long understood this and have been leaders' in opposing proposals which would take away their



-INCOME TAX FACTS No. I-How to Save on Your Income Tax

(This is one of a series of articles on federal income tax filing. The articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Accountants and the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants.)


