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**A pro-family and pro-life resolution** which local people are being urged to sign for presentation to the President and the Congress seems to bear out a pioneer patriot's statement that eternal vigilance is the price of freedom. A person would think that the principles adopted in the Constitution and the Bill of Rights serve as a guiding light for all government personnel to follow in preserving the American way of life. Because of that it seems only reasonable that our part in government should be to elect good men and trust them to do a good job for us.

Unfortunately it doesn't work that way, however. In keeping with the old saying that the squeaking wheel gets the grease, it appears that many people of government listen less to conscience and judgment than the squawking of the public. When barraged by crackpot ideas they begin to listen, and common sense people have to rally in defense of freedom.

**That situation faces the nation now.** In behalf of a number of fake liberties, which violate the laws of God and man, a group of women — either pitifully misguided or maliciously subversive — are trying to pressure their wild schemes on American society. They have already promoted a meeting on the UT campus of Austin in which they railroaded a set of resolutions for a national conference to be held in Houston November 18-21.

A related fact, which does no credit to someone in Washington is that the organization fenagled a federal grant of \$5 million to finance its 50 state meetings. They not only seek to sabotage American life but they manage to have the nation finance their effort.

**All this is the reason for** an eleventh hour mobilization of decency and common sense. The silent majority is urged to speak up and get the word to the president and congress through the pro-life and pro-family coalition at Houston.

Resolutions proposed for local endorsement are the following. The pro-life principle declaring that the killing of innocent human beings is anathema to society; that a mother and her unborn child have an equal right to live; and therefore a Human Life Amendment should be adopted to protect all persons, born and pre-born.

**Another concern a federal-**ly controlled Early Child Development Program enabling the government to choose the ideology by which young lives are molded. This clashes with the principle that has been observed since the beginning of time . . . that the child is the parent's responsibility. Actually, this child care scheme is terrifying. It brings back reports on child training by Nazis and Communists whereby children were taught it was heroic and patriotic to betray parents who did not agree with the leaders.

Equally frightening is the thought of having children under the influence of a government which would adopt such an amendment. Most likely the caretakers for child care would be the kind of people who promoted the amendment in the first place. A brainwashing in anti American and anti God teachings would be assured.

**Another vital issue is** the promotion of prostitution and homosexuality as an accepted way of life, to establish the claim one's private life should have no bearing on his or her acceptance by society. This is the kind of claim to be expected from such moral lepers. They have diseased minds and should not be allowed where their moral infection can contaminate children. They are undesirable in teaching or any kind of influence over young people.

As stated by Frances Easley of Jasper at the Austin meeting, "The decent women of Texas will not vote to sanction a sin that Almighty God calls an abomination."

**The Equal Rights Amendment** is likewise involved in this thing — by exaggerating women's rights and wrecking a social relationship that has been observed for years, especially as it disrupts family life. A noteworthy observation

## Plans Are Set for SH Homecoming On November 12

## Expansion Work In Progress at Fischer's Market

With an addition of 2400 square feet to the south part of their store finished, Johnny and Butch Fischer are working now on an addition of about 1200 feet to the north side of the building.

The extension is to the northeast, taking up all space up to the property line of The Ranch. It measures 72x17 feet which will be used mostly for frozen food cases, a frozen meat room and smoke house and a cooking room.

A three door frozen case from another area of the store has been moved there and two new three door cases are to be installed. The frozen meat facility will include a blast freezer to drop temperature rapidly before meat is put in storage, as recommended in the latest meat processing methods.

The smoke room is different in that the smoke is created by hickory fire outside the room and blown in, so that some foods can be smoked without heating. The cook room will be used in preparing chili, barbecue and some sausage.

Also in the plan is moving a big meat refrigerator to the recently finished area. The general intention is to increase shelf and food case space in the main part of the store and use the other space for meat processing and storage. Both areas of the business will be enlarged thereby.

Even energy conservation figures into the plan. Heat created in refrigerating and freezing is piped away for heating another area in the winter and is dissipated outside in the summer.

## Eagles Maul Hornets 37-6

The elimination process in the District 13-A title race went about as expected Friday night when Holliday's Eagles disposed of Muenster 37-6. Going into the contests three teams shared the top spot on the list. Now it's only Holliday and Archer City.

The Eagles looked like champions as their big solid line kept their shifty seatbacks in the business of gobbling up yardage. Besides they made no mistakes. Not a single turnover, whereas the Hornets had 3. And between touchdowns they did a fine job of defense. Muenster made a few starts but could not keep going.

However the Hornets have some satisfaction in that the statistics were not as lopsided as the score. First downs were 14-9 and total yardage 332-252. In addition the Eagles have an 85 yard kickoff return that is not included in the rushing total.

MHS got off to a terrible start with a fumble on the first scrimmage play. Holliday recovered on the 23 and Jay Wright needed just three plays to put his team on the board. Mark Wells kicked the extra point. The score was 7-0 at 10:43.

Wright was not the only back making big trouble for the Hornets. A few more standouts were the quarterback Steve Lucy, Rusty McDaniel, Stanley Craddock and Numbers 12 and 32 who were omitted from the program.

The quickie Eagle TD was no more sudden than Muenster's lone score. On the line-up for first play after kickoff the Hornets used the hide-out trick. Todd Richey pretended to leave the field but was just inside the sideline, then took off for the goal as the ball was snapped. Nick Walterscheid's pass was

Household and personal items with a value estimated at \$1000 to \$1500 were stolen last Friday afternoon from the Leon Fleitman home southeast of Myra. Other clues pointed to a possible hasty exit. Some items were left out of place and some had plugs pulled out of wall outlets but were not taken away.

Principal items stolen were a TV, a portable multi band radio, an adding machine, an AM-FM digital clock radio, two lamps, kiddies banks and two jewelry boxes including some jewelry and some items of sentimental value.

The owners are hopeful that identification on some articles will aid in discovery and recovery. The loss is partly covered by insurance.

The hostess served refreshments following the business meeting.



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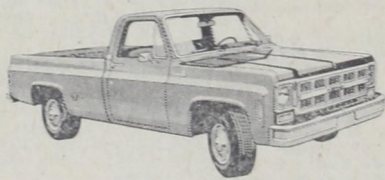

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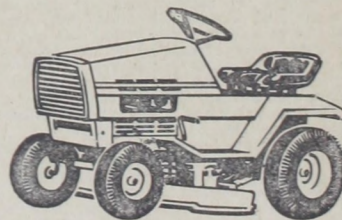

**Holiday Designs Heads Programs of Garden Club Meet**

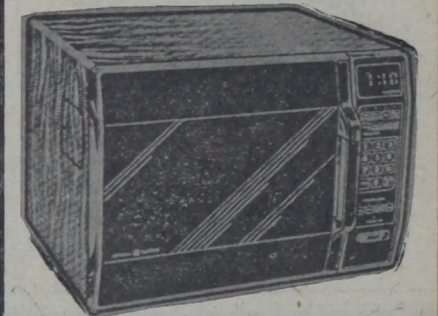

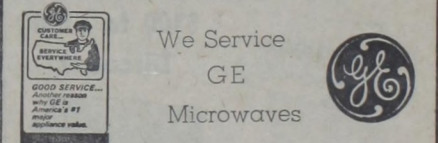

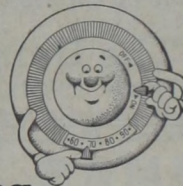

### City Gets \$668 Sales Tax Check

The City of Muenster has just received a check from the State Comptroller's office in the amount of \$668.56 as a rebate for sales tax remittances during the period ending October 7, 1977. It is one of 880 checks totaling \$24.8 million in the current mailing, according to Comptroller Bob Bullock.

Bullock says that total rebates to the cities to date is \$298.3, a healthy 20 per cent increase over last year and a good indicator of the strength of the Texas economy.

Total rebates to Muenster for the year to date are \$40,749.23, a 20 per cent increase over \$33,937.56 received during the corresponding period last year.

The comptroller's statement received with the check shows a gross collection of \$696.12 for the period. The state's 2 per cent collection fee was \$13.92 and the amount retained was \$13.64. Deducting them accounts for the check's amount of \$668.56.

Reports on a number of other cities of the area indicate that they too are enjoying a substantial increase of sales tax income resulting from an increase in business volume. Totals received through Oct. 7 and the percentage of increase are shown as follows by the Comptroller.
