The Viet Cong have proposed a 48-hour cease fire for Christmas and another of the same duration for New Year. American military men have expressed strong opposition to both proposals.

As of Monday night a report from the LBJ Ranch says we have not definitely decided what to do about it but are aware that failure to cooperate might be regarded in some countries as an indication of our insincerity in seeking a peace settlement. And a report from American sources in Saigon says that we have already agreed to the cease fire. Until the final word comes along this column will hope that the affirmative answer from Saigon is wrong and the "maybe" answer from The Ranch will develop into a negative one.

It isn't that this column would deny a couple of days of peace to the fighting men over there. Heaven knows they deserve a break and a more civilized observance of their most cherished holiday. But Con agrees with the military leaders that our fighting men should not have to pay the price that a couple of free days is sure to cost them.

Is it possible that our nation will be suckered twice, or even three times, by the same treachery? Military men recall bitterly what happened last Christmas. The feast was observed by a cease fire, an occasion used by the Cong in hauling up ammunition and other supplies for a greater effort when the fighting started again. It was not long until Americans and South Vietnamese realized that they had allowed their enemy to do some vital military chores. Everybody on both sides knows the same thing will happen again if there is another cease fire.

Are we going to permit that? Apparently it's time for American big shots to recall an old saying, "If a man cheats me once, shame on him. If he cheats me twice, shame on me."

There's a disturbing element in the report from The Ranch. It's the apparent concern that some nations will get an unfavorable opinion from our refusal to cooperate. Well isn't there also some reason for concern about opinions of the soldiers themselves, and their families in U.S. and Vietnam, and some other nations? Whatever the decision, it will please some and displease others. So whom should we disappoint? Our soldiers and their kin and the non communist world, of the Viet Cong and the communist world?

Equally disappointing is the fact that the proposal prompted such a remark. It seems the only proper answer in this case is a blunt refusal along with a reference to the Cong's method of observance last year. By way of making friends and influencing nations, which answer would have inspired greater respect, the one that denounced previous treachery or the one that can lead to repeated treachery?

Is this what one would call a propaganda blunder? We seem to have supplied the words whereby the enemy can call us a stinker for not going along, whereas we had plenty of reason to call him a stinker for even bringing up the subject.

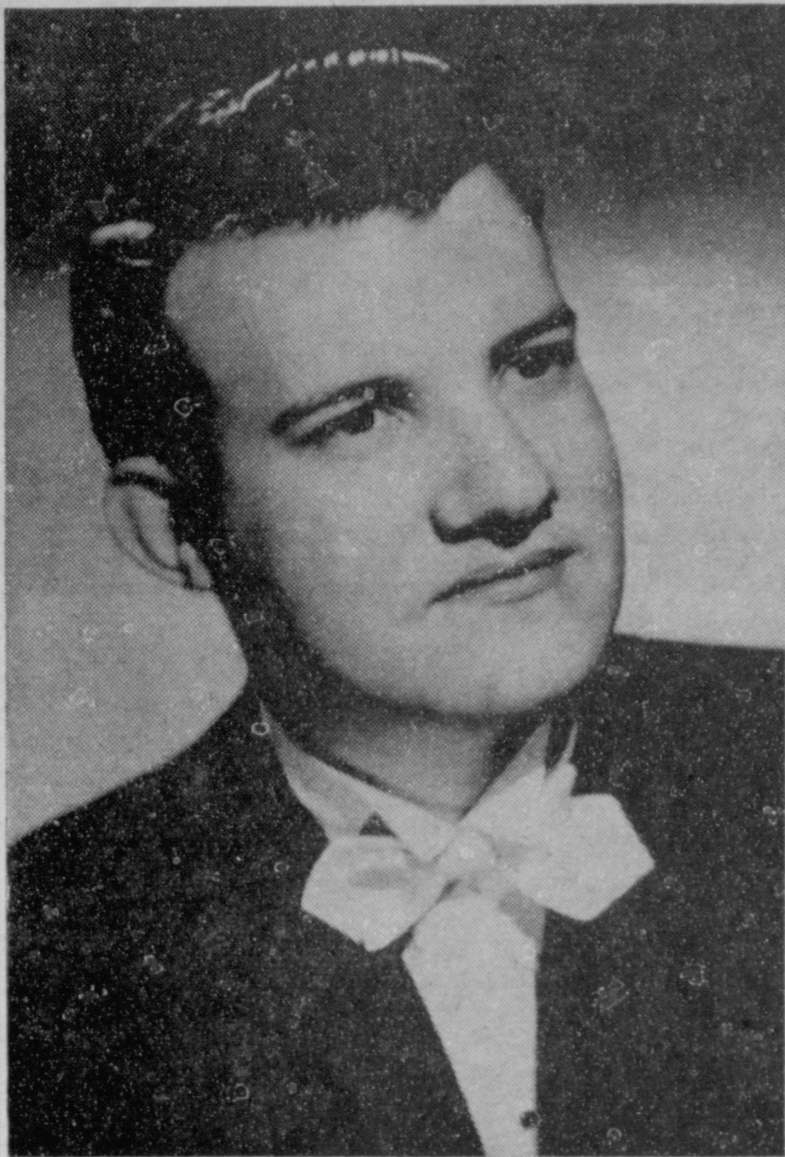
Regardless of propaganda values, however, there's another and far more important consideration about the reply. This amounts to another concession, another obvious effort to convince Hanoi and the entire red global conspiracy how eager we are to go more than half way to get a peace settlement. Gareld Payne, music director at Muenster Public School will be presented in a "Pop" concert Wednesday, December 7, at 7:30 p.m. in the Muenster High auditorium.

Payne is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene A. Payne of Weatherford, Okla., where he attended high school. He attended Oklahoma City University on a scholarship and is currently doing graduate work at North Texas State University in music education with emphasis in organ.

Payne's other musical experience includes the top drawer restaurant and cocktail circuit, two motion picture background scores, a published sacred anthem, several pop compositions, many concerts, and a six-and-a-half month engagement in Las Vegas.

He has been playing and studying since the age of five and has won many honors for musical achievement. He has been billed as "The Keeper of the Keyboards" and "The Liberator of the Organ." While performing in Hollywood he was listed as one of the top ten organists in the nation and one of the five top organists of the West Coast.

Two Hornets on 7-B Dream Team
